There was also a very good attendance at the Tyne Valley meeting on Wednesday evening, at which address were given by Prof. Zavitz and the Commissioner of Agriculture. At these meetings Prof. Zavitz spoke in an interesting and practical way regarding the results of experiments carried on for a number of years at the O. A. College and naturally gave a lot of very valuable information. As it is not often that the services of men as able and experienced as Prof. Zavitz or one who is able to impart so much valuable information on the production of field crops can be secured, every one who possibly can, should make it a point to attend these meetings.

He was a loving brother, a kind neighbor and was loved by all who knew him. His death has cast a gloom over Hunter River and in many other places as well. He will be missed in the community, but it is in the home where the loss is felt most keenly. His death was somewhat sudden, but "God's ways are not our ways," and now to witness the saddest scene and hear the saddest words, "Father is dead," after being comforted by all the consolations and holy rites of religion, administered by Rev. Dr. Channon, P. P. On Tuesday his remains were laid to rest in St. Augustine's Cemetery, Rustico, with the solemn blessings of the church whose Sacraments had prepared him to meet his Lord and God. Two brothers and four sisters are left to mourn. May his soul rest in peace.
