SOUTH FORTUNE.—August 30.—Next winter will be featured by heavy snowfalls in the north country, according to old timers in this bush reporting here. They base their prediction on the fact that wasps and hornets' nests are plentiful in the woods this year that they are something of a menace, and they declare that the presence in numbers of these insects is an unfailing sign of much snow.

WANT TO LOWER RATE ON FLOUR

OTTAWA, August 30.—Asking that the government take steps to equalize the shipping rates on flour as compared with wheat, a large deputation, including members of the Dominion millers' association, transportation companies and a representative of the Canadian Merchant Marine, met the government this afternoon. Members of the Cabinet present at the conference besides the Prime Minister, were Sir George Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, Sir J. D. Brydon, Hon. J. R. Reid, and Hon. C. J. Doherty. The deputation explained their views to the government and the millers were asked to place their case in the form of a memorandum for further consideration. The conference that the millers requested the government to take steps toward leveling the rates on flour and wheat. At the present time wheat is favored in regard to rates of exportation, in this respect the millers were dealing with the export situation only and the suggestion was made that the government might through its merchant marine set a lower rate for flour. In that way the other transportation companies will have to fall in line. The rates for export to the United States by rail, it was stated, were not concerned in the request of the deputation today.
