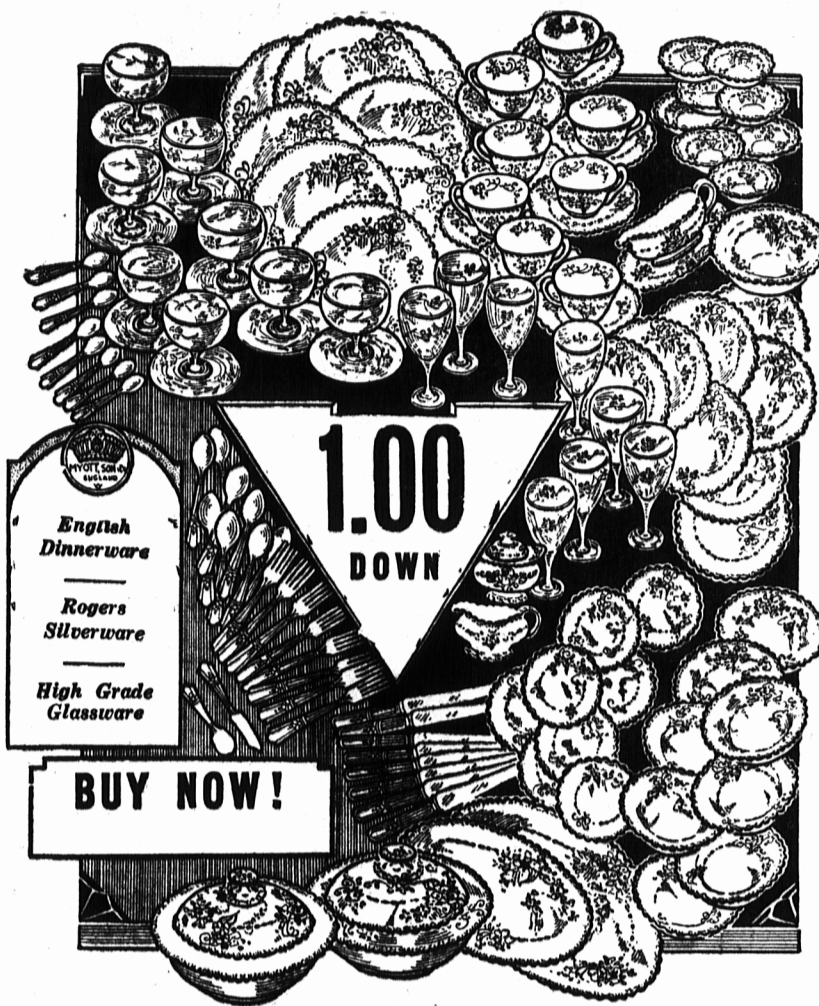

Miss MacLeod was born in Quincy. She received her early education in the John Hancock and the South Junior High schools, and graduated with honors from Woodward Institute in June 1937. She had planned to attend the Moody Bible Institute in Chicago, this coming September, where she would begin to train as a medical missionary, hoping eventually to go to Africa. She was a faithful and ardent worker in the church of which she has been a member since about six years of age. For the past two or three years she has been the superintendent of the Junior Christian Endeavor Society; she has also been a Sunday School teacher, and was until recently the president of the Young People's Society of the Christian Endeavor. She was also interested in the Quincy City Mission where she was always willing to give her testimony and played the trumpet with the group of Trumpeters. Many groups of young trumpet known as the Jericho Christian workers who were associated with Louise in and around Boston were shocked at her sudden death and attended the funeral. The pall bearers were Charles MacLeod, Donald MacLeod, Wesley Hayes, Edward Pratt, Mounie Hills, Willis Slaven, Warren and Lorne MacLellan. The church was filled to capacity, and the Floral Tributes were profuse and showed the high esteem of which Miss MacLeod was held in the community. The remains were laid to rest in Mt. Wollaston Cemetery, beside her infant brother, and her grandmother, Mrs. James Stewart who died six years ago.

Gift of Canadian Maple Sugar to H.M. The Queen

When Their Majesties King George VI and Queen Elizabeth visited the Canadian Pavilion after formerly opening the British Empire Exhibition at Glasgow on May 3, they were particularly attracted by the display of maple sugar and maple syrup in the section of the Dominion Department of Agriculture and Her Majesty graciously accepted a gift of maple sugar. The maple sugar and maple syrup on display in the Department of Agriculture section was supplied by four well known producers in the Province of Quebec, from which province last year about 90 per cent of the total Canadian output of maple sugar and maple syrup was produced. Part of the display is in half pound pieces in the shape of maple leaves. The display is decorated with thousands of coloured maple leaves, which were especially selected in the woods last fall. F. O. Nunnick of Ottawa, Director of Publicity and Extension, Dominion Department of Agriculture, is in charge of the Department's section in the Canadian Pavilion.
