NAZIS TO BILL PRAGUE FOR "REPARATIONS" CHURCHILL LEADS ATTACK ON CHAMBERLAIN

Concentration On Rearmament Is Advocated

Follows Speech By Sir John Simon Defending Munich Agreement.

(By J. F. Sanderson, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, Oct. 5.—Drawing on all the bitterness and force of his oratorical ability, Winston Churchill swept today into the leadership of parliamentary forces arrayed against Prime Minister Chamberlain's bargain with Chancellor Hitler as incorporated in the Munich agreement.

President Benes Resigns Office

Says Resignation Designed To Facilitate Reshaping Of Nation's Destiny.

(By Alvi J. Steinkopf) (Associated Press Foreign Staff) PRAGUE, Oct. 5.—Eduard Benes, who helped found the Czechoslovak republic 20 years ago, stepped down from the presidency today and left to a new government the task of leading the shrinking nation through dark hours ahead.

The former Liberal and present-day Conservative rebel took the floor a few minutes after Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, had asked members to place themselves in the Chamberlain's position at Munich and decide whether they would have rejected the terms of the Czech-German settlement and "destroyed the last chance of averting war."

C.P. FULLERTON PASSES AWAY IN WINNIPEG

Former Judge And Railway Chieftain Was Native Of Amherst, N. S.

(C. P. Guardian's Special Wire) WINNIPEG, Oct. 5.—Charles Percy Fullerton, who climbed from lumber camp clerk to judge and railway chieftain, died here today at the age of 68. His death, after a lengthy illness came at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. C. McMillan.

Stricken early in June while in Toronto, Mr. Fullerton was brought to Winnipeg two months ago to live at his daughter's home where he died at six o'clock this morning.

(By Louis P. Lochner, Copyright, 1938, by The Associated Press) BERLIN, Oct. 5.—The International Sudetenland Commission today arrived at an agreement on additional Sudetenland territory to be occupied by German troops outside the four existing zones by Monday, Oct. 10.

The new delimitations were decided upon as Germany prepared to bill Czechoslovakia for "reparations" dating back to the birth of the republic. Observers considered the demand a power lever to force Czechoslovakia into Germany's economic system.
