Three Of Five Deputies Not War Veterans

OTTAWA, Feb. 12 (CP)—A J. Brooks (PC-Royal) protested today in the Commons that three of five deputy ministers approved by the Federal Government Jan. 14 were men without overseas service in either of the world wars. Prime Minister Mackenzie King replied that the Government had tried to discover veterans for the jobs.

In an announcement last month, Mr. King disclosed that W.G. Millard had been appointed Deputy Minister of Defence and that his associate deputies would be Alex Ross and Col. Paul Mathieu. At the same time it was disclosed that Hugh Keenleyside had been appointed Deputy Minister of Mines and Resources and Stewart Bates Deputy Minister of Fisheries.

Col. Brooks, a veteran of the two world wars, did not say who among the deputies did not have overseas service. He said he was criticizing the merit on the basis of qualifications but felt that among the 1,000,000 or more men who had served in the two world wars the government could have found suitable men for the posts and thus comply with provisions for granting veterans preference in civil service appointments.

B. C. To Bonus Old Age Pensioners

VICTORIA, B.C., Feb. 12 (CP)—Old pensioners in British Columbia will receive a 45 cent of living bonus retroactive to Jan. 1 this year, a joint announcement by Premier John Hart, Finance Minister Herbert Anscombe and Provincial Secretary George S. Pearson said yesterday.

The Premier said that while in Ottawa last November, he was assured that the King that at the moment a sufficient number of provinces had signed agreements, he would call a conference to discuss the question of implementing the social security measures and public investment program submitted to the Dominion-Provincial Conference in August, 1946.

"It is now my intention to press for a convening of that conference and I have every hope that more generous treatment will be accorded those in receipt of old age pensions," Mr. Hart said.

The new bonus will cost the province \$900,000 annually. Total amount now paid out in pensions to B.C. old pensioners is \$3,700,000 annually of which the Dominion's share is \$3,761,000.

Bank of Canada Governor Discusses Price & Cost Control

OTTAWA, Feb. 12 (CP)—Graham F. Towers, governor of the Bank of Canada, stressed in his annual report to Parliament today the importance of Canada having a well-balanced price and cost control structure during the transition period.

"It is particularly important that Canada should try to come through the transition period with a price and cost structure which will not be a drag on her post-war development, either externally through hampering her exports, or internally by creating a lack of balance among the various sectors of her economy," said Mr. Towers.

He did not express an opinion on which controls should be kept and which should be discontinued. One of the principal dangers of the reconversion period has been that prices and costs would be distorted by post-war inflation resulting from temporary shortages of goods on one side and a great accumulation of demand, backed by war-time savings, on the other," he said.

"Any excessive run-up of prices and costs would set the stage for a subsequent deflation. It would affect different economic groups very unequally, and the resulting distortions would necessitate fresh adjustments before the basis would exist for a balanced and stable prosperity."

"Price increases in Canada since the end of the war have been moderate. Despite a reduction in government subsidy payments, the general wholesale price index on the latest available calculations for December, 1946, was only eight per cent higher than on V-J-day, (Aug. 15), and the cost-of-living index was only five per cent higher."

"In the United States, early removal of controls was accompanied by much larger price increases than in Canada. By December, the general wholesale price index was 33 per cent higher than on V-J-day, as compared with a 41 per cent increase in the index over the preceding six years. The foods component of this index increased by 42 per cent between June last and December. The cost-of-living index increased by 15 per cent during the same period."

It was obvious that the spread between Canadian and United States prices could not be maintained indefinitely, even if controls were retained in Canada.
