Stabilization Coal Bill Headed For U.S. Senate

(By Clarence M. Wright) (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—The Guffey Coal Stabilization Bill was squeezed through a breathless House today and headed toward another close vote in the Senate. Despite presidential insistence upon the controversial measure, its backers were able to route only 194 votes for it to 198 against, a plurality of 26. Two members voted "present." (The bill is designed to stabilize the coal industry by establishing a national bituminous coal commission which would administer a wage, hour, trade practice and price-fixing code. Those who live by the code would get a 90 per cent "drawback" on a 15 per cent tax levied against the value of their coal at the mine mouth.) In the Senate, one of the leading backers—Senator Guffey, Pennsylvania Democrat—predicted passage.

Labatt Suspects Remanded For A Week

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Ont., Aug. 19.—Featured by a surprise announcement by Crown Attorney Norman P. Newton that he had received new information "just a few minutes before court opened," the John Labatt kidnaping case against three men was adjourned for another week today. Michael McCordell, Jack Bannon and Gerald Nicholson, held in connection with the case, appeared in county court and were remanded for a week at the request of Mr. Newton. The Crown attorney did not divulge the nature of the new information. At the opening of today's hearing, Mr. Newton paid tribute to Nelson B. Cline, 37-year-old special United States investigator, who was shot to death Saturday in a gun duel with a robber suspect at College Corners, O. "Officer Cline played a large part in the Labatt investigation across the border and the province of Ontario and the Dominion of Canada are indebted to him," said

IN MEMORIAM

JAMES B. PROFITT James Bothwick Profitt died suddenly at his home in Kensington on July 23, 1935. Previous to the time of his death no suspicious symptoms were in evidence, hence his death came with shocking suddenness. His funeral was held on July 25 from his home on Broadway, Rev. DeWolfe White, in the absence of the pastor, Rev. B. Freeman, conducting the service. The honorary pallbearers were Messrs. C. J. Clarke, M. F. Schurman, James Pendergast, William McKay, William McLean, and Heath Boswell, and the active pallbearers were nephews, Messrs. William J. Profitt, Ellis Profitt, Keith McLeod, William D. Profitt, James Tuplin and Byron Thompson. The profusion of flowers placed upon the coffin nicely expressed the feeling of sympathy experienced by his many admiring friends. To mourn are left his widow, in maidenhood, Miss Grace Warren, daughter of the late Edward Warren and the late Mrs. Rosele Warren; daughter, Miss Jean; his sisters, Mrs. Andrew McLeod, Irish town, and Mrs. Chesley Tuplin, New Annan, and one brother, Mr. George, Burlington. The deceased lived his boyhood years in his native home, Burlington. Here he was married to Miss Myra Graoe, daughter of the late Mr. Edward and Mrs. Warren. The young couple started their married life in Springbrook, where Mr. Profitt followed the profession of husbandry. Later they took up residence in Kensington, where he became a partner of the firm of M. F. Schurman & Co. and became manager of this part of the business. Not only did he maintain the standard that the business had reached, but by energetic endeavor and careful supervision, he increased the volume and sublimated the reputation, so that he became one of the most successful members of the firm. His funeral was a living testimony of confidence that his many friends had placed in him, and of the profound respect that the citizen body of Kensington and of the supporting pastoral communities had placed in him and in the enterprising firm of which he was an energetic member. He maintained a social disposition that was at once mild and engaging, and a business principle that was prompt and firm. His customers were pleased to call even when no material business prompted them. He has left a heritage to his successor that will be hard to maintain.—Y.

Well Known Newspaperman Dies In Boston

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Aug. 19.—Ernest Beaufort, a well-known newspaperman and art critic, died yesterday in Boston, it was learned here today. He was an associate editor of the Christian Science Monitor for 15 years. Beaufort came to Canada from England 50 years ago, joining the Calgary Herald. Later he went to the Winnipeg Free Press as dramatic and art critic. During the war he was attached to the Intelligence Staff. After the war he became Canadian correspondent of the Christian Science Monitor and a member of the Parliamentary press gallery here. After two or three years he was transferred to Boston. His death was the result of a motor accident a month ago.
