The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Veterinary Medical Association was held Wednesday evening in the Canadian Legion Rooms, the President Dr. I. E. Croken, presiding.

After his opening remarks the President feeling referred to the loss sustained by their association in the deaths of Dr. Bousfield, who was secretary-treasurer; Dr. Mills, Dr. Henderson and Dr. John T. Cosgrove.

Several important matters were discussed, on which later action will be taken.

Durinn the general discussion it was pointed out that veterinary science, among other achievements, has eliminated the B. out of the stables of Prince Edward Island, over 100,000 cattle had the T. B. test applied on 13,000 farms and only 530 re-actives were found. Those were in due time re-tested and as a result only three re-actives were found, which leaves the cattle in this province absolutely free of T. B.—something no other province in Canada can boast of.

Great credit was accorded the veterinary profession for the manner in which the recent outbreak of foot and mouth was eradicated.
