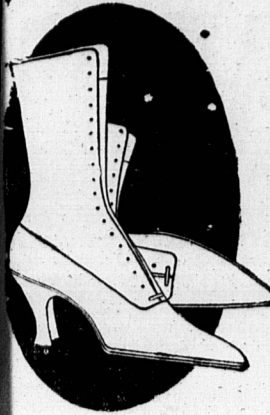

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I beg to announce that I will be a candidate for the Mayoralty at the coming election, February 8th., and take this means of soliciting your support.

Four years ago, the citizens of Ward five honored me by electing me as councillor; at that time I promised that if elected, my efforts would be directed towards the improvement of our streets; the members of the City Council honored me still further by selecting me as Chairman of the Street Committee, and during my term of four years in this capacity, we have put down three and one-third miles, or 60,000 square yards of paved streets which are the equal of any in America, and it is a pleasure here to note that the cost per square yard has been lower than that of any City in Canada.

Whether I have carried out my pre-election promises or not is for you to say.

I believe good streets are one of the best assets any City can have, and I believe that the introduction of this system of paving is the most progressive movement that has taken place in our City since the installation of Water Works and Sewerage, and I think I can safely claim the credit of having introduced the system here.

With the present serious unemployment conditions prevailing I believe it is our duty as a City to provide work, where possible, for our laboring men, and if you honor me by election, I will use my best efforts to have the work of paving continued.

Our City never was, nor never will be a large manufacturing centre, and while I am in favor of offering every inducement possible to manufacturers to locate here, I believe we should cater more to the tourist trade, and the making of our City attractive by the building of good streets, is one of the best inducements we can offer them.

What we need in Charlottetown is more civic pride from both the individual and civic standpoint. Nature has done her part for us with a lavish hand, our shores are laved by the waters of three beautiful bays emptying into a spacious land locked harbor, while within our civic jurisdiction we have one of the most magnificent parks in the world. Our forefathers with a vision that was prophetic laid out our limits with wide streets and open squares which to day evoke the admiration of the visitor, it is therefore now for us to do our part, and if elected to the office of Chief Magistrate it shall be my object and aim to make this Capital City a larger, better and more beautiful Charlottetown.

In addition to my position as Chairman of the Street Committee I have also been a member of the Light Committee, and when the new contract was being arranged with the Electric Light Company, I was instrumental in having a clause inserted, which, when put into effect will, I believe very much improve our street lighting.

I am strongly in favor of Meat and Milk inspection, and while I do not claim the credit for having introduced this measure, I do claim that it had my unqualified support, and if elected I will endeavour to have it extended and enlarged so as to more fully safe guard the public health. It is not my intention to make a house to house canvass, I believe every man and woman in our City is intelligent enough to judge for themselves as to whom they desire to see elected. My record for the past four years is before you, and if you decide that it is such as to entitle me to be elected Mayor, I will appreciate the honor most highly.

Thanking you in anticipation of your support, and assuring you that if elected I will use my best efforts for the welfare of our City.

WINE SHOP FOR THE WOMEN OF MONTREAL

Quebec Liquor Commission Report to be Planning Establishment

MONTREAL, Jan. 17.—It is understood that the Quebec Liquor Commission plans to open a wine shop for women, which will be managed by female employees. This novel establishment is to be situated at 125, Catherine Street, between Mountain and Diamond Streets, in the centre of Montreal's uptown district, in the immediate vicinity of the principal stores in which women are wont to do their daily shopping. Wine is to be the only beverage sold. The purpose of this store is to make it possible for women to purchase wine without being compelled to "rub shoulders" with the throng of men who frequent the ordinary commission's liquor depots.

It is suspected that many of the city's female citizens refrain from purchasing wine because of this, so the commission, realizing their backwardness, makes its novel move.

It is understood that a delivery system will also be attached to this new enterprise.

N. S. Captain In A Run Running Trial

BOSTON, Jan. 19.—The alleged run running expedition of the British schooner Golden West, stopped by her seizure outside Acushnet by the coast guard cutter Acaushnet was before a federal jury yesterday on charges against five persons, said to have been associated with the venture.

Elipo Bruno, a wealthy former saloon-keeper, was the promoter, the prosecution contended in the opening outline of its case. It was he, it was stated, who bought the boat at Halifax, bought 18,000 gallons of alcohol at St. Pierre and directed the schooner to the New England coast instead of Nassau, as her manifest indicated. Capt. D. Ameco, a Nova Scotian, and three of the crew are being tried with Bruno.

Details of the alleged landing of the liquor at Plymouth by the fishing boat Star and two other vessels, and of the finding of a large quantity of it in a loft there were recited.

Important experiments have been conducted in the neighborhood of the Lizard, Cornwall, and are believed to have met with success.

If the principle of the wireless beacon is accepted by Trinity House it will, of course, be an untold boon to our coastwise shipping. The number of wrecks will be reduced, but at the same time there will be an end to the romance of the lighthouse-keeper, and navigators will have to seek inspiration for their sea stories elsewhere.

The chief advantage of the wireless beacon is that in any weather, by day or night, in fog or blizzard, it can be picked up by a ship fitted with wireless as easily as a lighthouse in clear weather. The operator in his cabin will be able to tell his captain exactly where he is without getting in touch with big land stations and without any delay.

Should the wireless beacon replace the lighthouse it would be a great benefit for all ships to be fitted with wireless, and small and comparatively inexpensive installations with a range of a few sea miles would be sufficient. In this way the safety of coastwise shipping in all weathers should be enormously increased.

A tall single mast placed at a dangerous part of the coast preferably near the existing lighthouses would be fitted with a revolving coil which would throw out a wireless beam of varying length. This beam would be picked up by a ship and by measuring its length it would be able to determine its bearing. That roughly is the principle of the wireless beacon.

The wireless beams would radiate from an antenna in the same way as the sailing rays from the lighthouse. The beacon would mean a revolution in coastwise navigation, and to picturesque old lighthouses would become nothing but a day's memory, or as absolute as a Martello tower.
