The University of New Brunswick has shown marked progress during recent years. The attendance at the regular sessions including the Law Faculty in Saint John is now approximately four hundred. This year saw the largest graduating class in the history of the institution. In the Arts department twenty-eight received the B. A. degree and nine the B. Sc. degree. Five graduated in Law, in Applied Science fifteen received the degree of B. Sc. in Civil Engineering, sixteen in Electrical Engineering and eight in Forestry.

B., quaffed here today in the 52nd renewal of the Royal Canadian Henley Regatta. Walked 500 Miles To Get Schooling For Indian Youth

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., July 28.—(CP)—How Shingwauk, last hereditary chief of the Ojibway Indians walked nearly 500 miles from this district to Toronto in 1871 to arrange for the education of his young Indians is recalled by the construction of new building at the Shingwauk Indian Home here. The present construction is part of the Dominion government's public works programme and will remove one of the city's oldest landmarks. The main building to be torn down for the new was built in 1874, and officially opened by the Bishops of Huron and Algoma in 1875. The building was not the first school in the Sault district. It was preceded by a school built in 1873 through the joint efforts of Chief Shingwauk and his son, Bukhujene. It was in that connection the old Indian leader walked from the Sault to Toronto and asked that a "big teaching wigwam" be constructed so that young Indians would have opportunities for education. In 1872 the chief's son, accompanied by Rev. E.F. Wilson, went to England and collected about \$4,000 to build a home. Six weeks after the new building was completed in 1873, it was destroyed by fire. Then came the present building, which is the stone of which was laid by Lord
