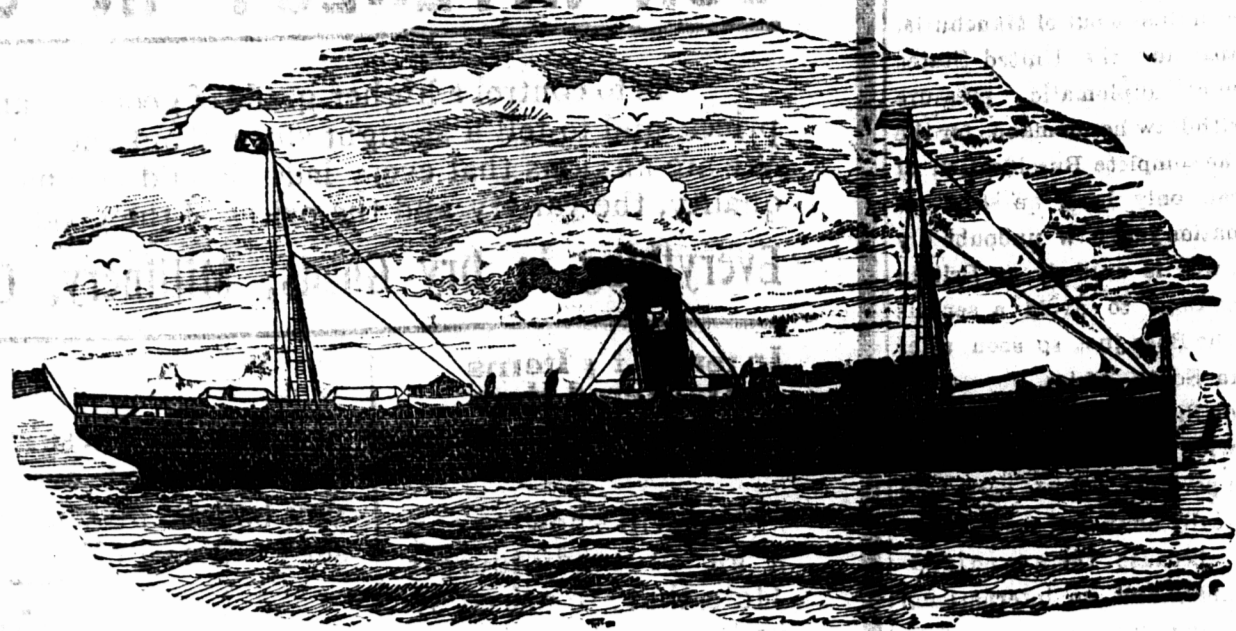

MARVELLOUS GROWTH OF CANADA'S IMMIGRATION SHOWN BY LATEST FIGURES

The Arrivals for April of this Year Number 21,254—and the British Settlers are Three Times More Than Last Year's.

OTTAWA, May 3.—(Special).—The vigorous immigration policy which is pursued by the minister of the interior is shown by the returns of the department for the four months ending April.

These figures show that the arrivals in Canada from Britain alone in four months have increased by three times those for the same time last year and no less than five times those for the same period in 1901.

The arrivals for April alone number 21,254 as follows: British, 9,400; continent of Europe, 4,796, and United States, 7,058.

For the first four months of the calendar the arrivals for the past three years are as follows:

United States	3,347	5,186	16,457
Continents of Europe	5,081	9,890	13,770
Total	5,015	7,476	10,448

The homestead entries for the first four months of 1903 totalled 10,274, compared with 5,022 for the same period in 1902.

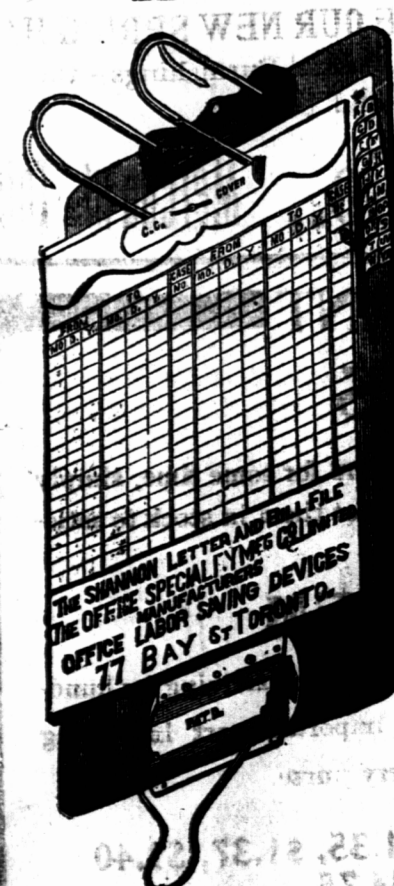

GRAND CONCERT AT VERNON RIVER.

The concert given in the C. M. E. A. Hall, Vernon River, on the evening of May 2nd was an epoch marking one. The Hall, which is one of the largest in the Province, was filled to the doors. The Rev. Dr. Doyle presided with his wonted happy grace.

The great drawing card of the evening was the presence of Misses Lefurgy and Comstock, whose very names are synonymous with a full house and a delighted audience. This was the first time that Vernon River had the honor of hearing these talented ladies, and the audience literally went wild as they were charmed and uplifted by Miss Comstock's beautiful expressive contralto voice, or swayed and fascinated by the matchless elocution of Miss Lefurgy.

But even beside the meteoric brilliance of these great stage luminaries the local talent of Vernon River shone forth with a clear and scintillating radiance that was all its own; and small wonder, for among them were such "stellae clarse" as the Misses Eliza O'Neill, Myrtle Hayden and Annie McKenzie and Messrs John Green and Alex Irving.

The elocutionary effort of Miss Walsh was one of the features of the evening and she was rapturously encored.

Joseph B. Haley, the talented vocalist of Waterside, sang a solo and the thunderous applause which greeted him showed that he is as great a favorite as ever with the music lovers of Vernon River.

Miss Mable Rice again charmed the audience with the rhythmic beat of her swinging clubs.

A unique number was a solo by Claude Wilde a boy of eight years.

When the last number had been presumably given, Dr. Doyle came forward and introduced Mr. March from St. John and, as he sang and played and entertained the audience in his inimitable way, it seemed from the enthusiastic encores "as if increase of appetite had grown by what it fed on." The accompanists of the evening were Misses Mary O'Neill and Beatrice Gay.

The concert was closed with a grand tableau in which England, Scotland, Ireland, Canada and Spain were represented by Misses Mary O'Neill, Dottie Hayden, Rose O'Neill, Myrtle Hayden and Miss O'Neill; but no words of ours can picture the grandeur and classical loveliness of the scene presented by the rosette glow of the tableau light.

TORONTO, May 3.—A Bradshaw, head of the wholesale dry goods firm of A. Bradshaw & Co., died suddenly Saturday night, of heart failure.

GRAND TRUNK FLYER PLOWS THROUGH CROWD OF 1,000

Excursionists in Detroit Street Struck by Express—Long List of Killed and Injured—A Terrible Scene.

DETROIT, May 3.—The Grand Trunk Pan-American flyer from Chicago ran into a crowd of 1,000 people at the corner of Dequinder and Canfield streets at 8.30 this evening, killing at least seven men and seriously injuring about 30 more. The majority of the killed and wounded are from Toledo.

Fifteen hundred Polesanders from Toledo came up to Detroit this morning on a special Lake Shore train to celebrate a holiday. They left the train at the corner of Dequinder and Canfield streets and went over to St. Joseph's church where they spent the day with that congregation.

The Lake Shore tracks run out Dequinder street and a special train was to stop for the Toledo excursionists at Canfield avenue at 8.30. Accompanied by hundreds of their local friends, waiting for the train, the excursionists jammed Canfield avenue some time before the train was

due, in readiness for it. When the train was sighted the crowd pushed across the track and onto the Grand Trunk tracks which adjoins those of the Lake Shore, just as the Grand Trunk Pan-American flyer came thundering in from the west. The people were thrown into the air and dashed to either side of the track. Many of them were ground under the wheels. The police department was notified and all the ambulances in the city rushed to the scene. The victims were scattered along the tracks for a distance of two blocks, lanterns were procured and the work of rescue begun immediately. The scene reflected by the light of the lanterns was horrible. Gradually the mangled and crushed bodies were recovered and sent to the hospitals when there was a flicker of life left and to the morgue when there was none.

At 10 o'clock the police had identified four of the dead.
