# The Lea Government Defeated And The Conservatives Were Returned With Magnificent Majority Yesterday

## GREAT VICTORY ACHIEVED: CONSERVATIVES ELECTED WITH EIGHT OF MAJORITY

Party Under Leadership Of Hon. J. D. Stewart Returned With Handsome Majority In Every County. Five Members Of The Lea Government Were Among The Defeated, Premier Lea Himself Escaping By A Narrow Margin. Election Returns Received With Great Enthusiasm In Charlottetown, Where Dr. MacMillan And Mr. W. A. Stewart Scored Signal Success

The Province gave its verdict on the "R.O.P." of the Lea Government yesterday when it sent it to defeat to the tune of nineteen to eleven after one of the Lea Government yesterday when it sent it to taken place in local history.

Premier Lea himself narrowly escaped defeat, while his colleague, Hon. Horace Wright and his chief financial advisor, Hon. B. W. LePage were among the fallen.

Other members of the Lea Government to meet disaster were the Hon. Peter Sinclair, the Hon. Russell Clark, the Hon. Dr. McNeill and the Speaker at the last legislative Session, Hon. Allen Stewart.

The entire Conservative Opposition in the last House was re-elected.

Probably the outstanding features of the election were the splendid victories of the Hon. J. D. Stewart and his colleague, Mr. Howard MacDonald, in the Georgetown District, and that of Dr. MacMillan and his colleague Mr. W. A. Stewart in this city.

In Summerside Mr Leonard MacNeill rolled up a splendid majority against the redoubtable Doctor John of the same name, while Mr. Shelton Sharp was again returned in the almost inviolable Liberal District of Second Prince.

Hon. Horace Wright, who, it was generally anticipated, had been slated for the portfolio of Agriculture had the Lea Government been returned to power, was badly defeated by Mr. Heath Strong.

One of the most popular victories was that of Messrs. Jenkins and Bethune in the Second District of Queens, they carrying the seats against Hon. B. W. LePage and Mr Angus MacPhee — two of the bitterest and most vigorous campaigners in the election

Messrs McKenzie and Wigmore more than accounted for their opponents in the First District of Queen's and had the unique distinction of defeating two members of the Government in a single constituency.

The two "unbeatable", Mr. Harry MacLean and Dr. A. A. MacDonald easily disposed of their opponents in the First District of Kings, and will return to the House, the former as the "father" of that institution although personally one of its youngest members.

Messrs. J. A. MacDonald and W. M. Wood in the Fort Augustus district, were signally victorious over their opponents, Hon. Russel Clark and Mr. Mark R. McGuigan.

The people of Cardigan made no mistake in electing the only two returned soldiers who were candidates, Messrs. H. F. MacPhee and Leslie Hunter.

In the Egmont Bay District two experienced parliamentarians, Messrs. Adrian Arsenault and Thomas MacNutt, were victorious over their Liberal opponents, thus again giving the District a full Conservative representation in the House.

### DOMINION TO WIDEN MARKETS IN THE EAST

### Hon. H. H. Stevens Discusses Present Depression — Gold Standard.

MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—Canada is to embark on a campaign to grasp the splendid opportunities for trade with China and the Orient generally which are opening up in the near future. Up to last year Canada has not been getting her proper share of this trade, Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce stated this afternoon before a luncheon tendered him in the Ritz Carlton Hotel by the Board of Trade of Montreal, the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and La Chambre de Commerce of Montreal.

The new trade policy of the Dominion Government, Mr. Stevens said, was to go after this trade with energy and secure as much of it as possible, at least a fair share, for Canada.

### MUCH TO BE DONE

There were difficulties of a general nature which affected China's trade with the world generally and these difficulties came rather within the purview of international conferences and expert study. But there was much to be done to see that Canada got her share of the growing trade in the Orient.

To this end, the Canadian Government was opening up two new offices in China, which would make four in all there, and was arranging a system of co-operation between the Ministry of Trade and Commerce and the two great Canadian transportation systems so as to facilitate trade between Canada and China, and also to co-ordinate the efforts of Canadian firms and trade organizations for the greater benefit of all.

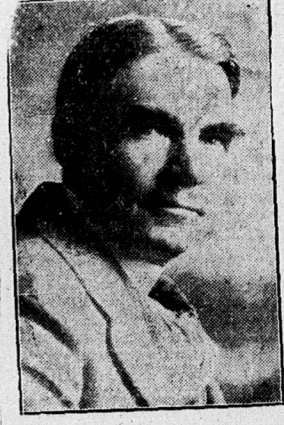
Canada's trade as shown by the figures for 1929, was not at all well balanced, Statistics which Mr. Stevens quoted showed that in that year a heavy proportion of trade went to the United States as compared with what came to Canada, and he showed a long list of lines in which Canada could very well

## WELL KNOWN GANGSTER IS CAPTURED

### Said To Be Member Of Notorious Gang Of Murderers

ST. JOSEPH, Mich., Aug. 6.—Trapped by an automobile accident in which he was seriously injured, Gus Winkler, alleged member of a gang charged with a dozen murders and many robberies in four mid-western states, lay with a fractured skull in Mercy Hospital here tonight. Confronted with fingerprints showing him to be Winkler, the injured man admitted his identity late today to Sheriff Fred J. Cutler and state police. Previously he had been registered as Jerry Kral, a licensed airplane pilot of Chicago.

A man injured in the same accident, identified by cards in his pockets as John B. Moran, of St. Louis, also is under guard in the hospital and an effort was being made to

link him with the same gang which numbered Winkler and Fred Burke, notorious killer, among its members. Among the spectacular crimes to Winkler and his gang are the Moran gang massacre in Chicago, in 1929, the gang execution of Frankie Uale in New York, the machine gun slayings of three men in Detroit apartment house in 1927, the slaying of an officer in a \$200,000 mail truck robbery in 1925, and the killing of an officer during a bank robbery in Louisville, Ky., in 1925.
