U.S. ANXIOUS AT NEWS OF EMPIRE PARLEY

(By Ken Clark, Canadian Press Staff Writer)

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 10.-If the British Empire as a result of the Imperial Economic conference to which Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald accepted an invitation, should erect a tariff wall against the rest of the world, the United States would be deprived of a valuable market, representative Henry A. Rainey, of Illinois, high in Democratic councils, told the Canadian Press tonight. Representative Rainey said the United States ought to move immediately toward making reciprocal tariff arrangements with other nations.

He suggested that if the Democrats, as seems probable, get control of the House of Representatives on December 7, action should be taken as soon as possible toward a drastic but provisional lowering of the Hawley-Smoot tariff rates. His plan, for which preliminary investigations are already under way, looks toward a reduction in duties to the approximate level of the Fordney-McCumber Act, the new duties to become effective upon the President being informed that similar reduction in the case of any one commodity or group of commodities had been made by another nation.

Asked whether he contemplated suggesting reciprocal arrangements with Canada such as were proposed in 1911, Rainey said, "I would be delighted to see reciprocity with Canada. Canada was justified in its reprisals, but we should get together."

Intimations today from representative John N. Garner of Texas, heir-apparent to the House speakership, and Senator Pat Harrison, Mississippi, Democratic leader in the Senate, that the party would undertake a definite legislative program when congress convenes, lent some support to the theory that a general attack on high tariffs was pending. But when the presidential veto power was considered and the behavior of many Democrats in voting for high rates on behalf of their own constituents during the last tariff battle was taken into account, the prospect appeared to observers to be rather for Guerrilla warfare.

A Political Move

Sir Arthur felt a great mistake had been made by the League in inviting a representative of the United States of America to join the council board. That political move seemed to have loomed larger in the eyes of the League than the struggle itself, "or did they know that the League would fall and wish to have the United States of America associated with the failure. Whatever happened at Geneva, Japan in her dispute with China adopted war as an instrument of national policy, despite her agreement to the Kellogg-Briand Pact. So much for international agreements of the kind mentioned.

"We must have something else if we are to have peace." The "madness" of tremendous expenditures on armaments must stop "or the world will plunge headlong to destruction." The question of disarmament must be placed on the high plane of universal requirement and dealt with in a spirit free from prejudice and selfish consideration, the speaker concluded.

never have to undergo a similar horrible experience had been shattered. "The prospects of permanent peace are no more assured today than they were in 1918," he stated.

"I am sure you will join me," Sir Arthur stated, "in praying that the next disarmament conference is a success, that it succeeds in bringing about an honest and universal reduction in the killing and wounding power of arms. It will do no good, in fact, it would have the opposite effect, if one nation disarms honestly and others do not. Disarmament must be honest, must be mutual, must be universal. Nations, if they only realized it, are all in the same boat. They sink or float together, in the end. The question of disarmament must be placed on the high plane of universal requirement, and dealt with in a spirit free from prejudice and selfish consideration."

Many Memories

On Armistice Day many memories crowded the soldiers' minds. "There is one of which I would speak. It is the memory of the fervent prayer of thanks to the Great Ruler of the universe that the terrible conflict was over, that the cruel slaughter had ceased. Having killed eleven million of their fellow men, having seen twenty million others mutilated and smashed by bullets, shells and bombs, having made nine million war orphans and five million war widows, having rendered ten million homeless, men swore that those things must not happen again. And they believed they would not happen, for had not chauvinists on both sides, and pacifists, too, declared that it was 'a war to end war' and the only path to an enduring peace. That was the belief that had sustained men in the darkest hour of the struggle."

opes Shattered

"Thirteen years have gone by and how great has been our disillusionment. Our high hopes have been shattered, and the prospects of permanent peace are no more assured today than they were in 1918.

Promotion of Peace

"It is true we have tried to do something which we hoped would prevent war. For ten years we have had the League of Nations, whose definite purpose is the promotion of peace and the settlement of international controversy by peaceful means. All of the great nations, with the exception of Russia and the United States have pledged their word to support these laudable aims. We have our Locarno and Washington pacts, we have the Kellogg-Briand Treaty which registers the determination of over sixty countries including the United States and Russia-to condemn recourse to war for the solution of controversies and renounce it as an instrument of national policy.

Broke Her Word

"The history of the past has taught us, and the history of the present confirms most emphatically, that these solemn engagements are easily disregarded. Witness what is now happening in Manchuria between China and Japan. Whatever the irritation by China, and I have no doubt it has been great, Japan has broken her word and prostituted her pledge by her warlike actions in the last month. With inexcusable effrontery she has defied the League of Nations which seems to be as powerless as it has been weak."

OPTIMISTIC ADOPT POTATO OVER FUTURE SELLING IDEA OF CANADA

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 11.-By The Canadian Press)-Ten bags of potatoes in the cellar, or other place of storage, for every Ontario family. That is the objective of the Ontario Growers' Markets Council in an intensive potato selling campaign now in progress throughout the province. A. H. Wilford, representing the Council, has secured endorsement of the scheme by various organizations of employers. The idea is to take the large stocks of potatoes off the farmers' hands at the present low prices and deliver them to consumers. The support of manufacturers and others at the head of large industrial concerns has been secured with a view to distribution of large consignments of potatoes to their employees at current prices. In some cases the cellars of factories have been devoted to storage of these consignments where the individual employees are not ready to receive them. The promoters of the scheme express themselves as highly pleased with the success so far achieved.

Hon. George S. Henry, Premier of Ontario, paid tribute to the Minister of Labor as a man of outstanding ability. Then he said the Dominion Cabinet had "ordered" Senator Robertson to take a rest. The Minister of Labor then related his version of the incident. He was speaking to Prime Minister R. B. Bennett when the latter told him to "go to Atlantic City for a rest," or words to that effect. "I told him I wouldn't," said Senator Robertson, "because for one reason I wouldn't pay \$1.15 for a good Canadian dollar." He added, however, that he had made arrangements to take a trip to Jamaica and hoped to return in a month, much improved in health. Senator Robertson was optimistic about conditions in Canada. There would be a substantial improvement in financial prospects within a month, he predicted.
