been presented for said bridge during last session. (c) Has the Government received a petition from the residents of Bell River and adjoining districts asking for a short road to be opened on the west side of Bell River Harbour and what is the intention of the Government in the matter. (d) Is it the intention of the Government to compensate John A. McDonald of Bell View for land taken for public highway, a petition having been presented for same during last session. (e) Has the Government received a petition from Angus A. Beaton and others of Iris asking for a change in road from Pleasant Valley Road to Murray River Road to avoid some steep hills.

THE PREMIER, in the absence of the Hon. the Commissioner of Public Works, replied that the matters referred to were now being considered by the Government and that if the cost of providing the roads referred to is not excessive they will be opened.

On motion of Mr. A. A. McDonald the Bill to incorporate The Inland Black Fox Co. Ltd. was read a third time and passed.

On motion of the Premier the Bill to increase the allowance to Petit Jurors, the Bill respecting the Legislative Assembly, and the Bill to incorporate the Lewis Granite and Marble Work were read a third time and passed.

HON. W. S. STEWART moved that the bill authorizing the Dominion Trust Company to extend and carry on business and exercise its corporate powers in the Province of Prince Edward Island be read a second time.

A discussion followed as to the powers of the Provincial legislature to extend corporate powers to a company incorporated in another province, after which the bill was ordered to be read a second time and the House went into Committee of the whole with Mr. A. A. McDonald in the chair. The bill, with the exception of clause 3 was read a second time.

A bill to incorporate the trustees of Calvin Presbyterian Church was read a second time with Mr. L. L. Jenkins in the chair.

A bill to incorporate the East Bedford Silver Black Fox Company was given the second reading, with Mr. Myers in the chair, and reported agreed to with amendments.

—THE ARSON CASE.—John Murray, charged with arson was again brought before Stipendiary Wright for preliminary examination yesterday morning. The witnesses examined were Mr. Robert Tanton, a constable at St. Eleanor's, Mr. Arthur Barnett, of Barnett Road and Mr. Nelson McDonald of Portage. On January 1910 Constable Tanton went to Elmsdale to arrest Tom Murray and Chas. Burke. The night of the arrest they stayed at Jacob Murray's. Early that evening Tom and John Murray drove away from the house and did not come back till nearly midnight and he was almost sure that Burke did not leave the house that night. Mr. Barnett's evidence confirmed the evidence of the previous witness. He happened to be staying at Jacob Murray's that night and told the same story about Tom and John Murray going to O'Leary and coming back about midnight. Chas. Burke was in bed before they came home and the witness was sure that Burke could not leave the house without the witness knowing it. Mr. McDonald told the same story. He was working for John Murray at that time. When John O'Leary they came to John Murray's first and the witness was ordered to hitch-up and follow them over to Jacob Murray's. John Murray only stayed in the house about five or ten minutes and then they went back home. As this was all the evidence Mr. McCallum asked that the case be dismissed as the only evidence given against the defendant was that of Chas. Burke. Stipendiary Wright said that there was enough evidence in that to send him up to the Supreme Court. Bail was refused. J.

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 29.—John McLennan, accountant in Molson's Bank here, has disappeared and foul play is feared. His accounts are perfect. McLennan's home is in Cornwall, Ont. Last year he rowed in the regatta for Winnipeg.

ROME, March 29.—Admiral Gozzo, who recently boxed the ears of Admiral Pasquale Cattolica, minister of marine, because the latter retired him from the navy, was arraigned in court yesterday for the street fight. Admiral Gozzo was sentenced to serve three months in prison and to pay a fine of \$50 for striking a cabinet officer. He was released, however, under the "conditional law," and was bound over to appear again, if called for.

BANDIT ELECTROCUTED

RICHMOND, Va., March 29.—Floyd Allen and his son, Claude, the only two of the Hillsville gunmen to pay the death penalty for the Carroll court house murders a year ago, were electrocuted in the state penitentiary shortly after 1 p. m. yesterday, after a dramatic eleventh hour attempt to save them had been thwarted by Governor Mann unexpectedly returning to the capital and thus preventing the lieutenant-governor from acting upon a request for a commutation.

The old mountaineer, once terror of a whole section of the Blue Ridge, and his strapping young son were electrocuted within ten minutes of one another. The old man, who went to the chair shaken but brave, was pronounced dead at 1.26 o'clock. His son, namesake of a United States senator, was dead at 1.35.
