of Canada and 67 years old as a Dominion. By the Act of Confederation, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick comprised the first limits of the Dominion but to which was added the Province of Manitoba in 1870, and Prince Edward Island in 1872. It also included what was known as the North-West Territories. An agitation for this confederation had gone on for nearly sixty years before its consummation.

Young Canada has added much to the world's achievements in the comparatively short time since Confederation. To quote from a recently published list:

"The first federation of provinces in the Empire was formed. It was in Canada that Graham Bell invented the telephone. The making of paper from pulp-wood was originated. The Pullman cars were built. The first electric stoves were invented. Originated electric heating. Originated Marquis and other varieties of wheat. The use of insulin was discovered. Frank Yeigh's 5,000 facts about Canada record Canada's wealth as thirty billions and over."

"That temperance agitation had existed before Confederation is assured by the fact that in 1864—four years before Confederation—Upper and Lower Canada obtained local option through the Duncan Act—a bill introduced by Christopher Duncan. In 1878 the Canada Temperance Act superseded the Duncan Act, and in the same year, local option, under the Scott Act applied local option to all of Canada.

In 1891 a Royal Commission was appointed to report for or against prohibition. The majority was against but there was a stout minority reported in its favor, some four years after the Commission was appointed.

In 1898 a Dominion plebiscite resulted in a majority of 13,687 for prohibition but no governmental action was taken.

The Great War brought Canada face to face with the meaning of a licensed liquor traffic as nothing ever had done before. Its close found a dry Canada with the exception of the Province of Quebec. The provinces went rapidly dry in the following order: Saskatchewan in 1915, Manitoba, Nova Scotia, Alberta and Ontario, 1916, New Brunswick and British Columbia in 1917.

At this time Quebec had 1,097 dry municipalities and 90 that were wet.

In 1918, by a federal Order-in-Council, war time prohibition was enacted for the duration of the war and one year thereafter.

In 1919, during the second session of the Dominion Parliament, an amendment to the Canada Temperance Act submitted a vote on importation. The aggregate vote on this issue amounted to 91,238, and the majority against importation was 166,874.

Madame Curie Dies In France

SALLANCHES, France, July 5.—Mme. Marie Curie, the little woman whose work with her husband in a makeshift laboratory gave humanity the priceless gift of radium, died today.

For many weeks she had been under treatment at a sanitarium here for an anemic condition. She was 66.

Pierre Curie, the young Paris professor who was the co-discoverer of the element, died in 1906. Struck by a truck only a short while after he and his wife had won lasting fame.

Although honored by countless governments and societies as one of the most distinguished scientists and women of all time, Mme. Curie shrank from public view. She stayed at work in her laboratory whenever possible.

Twice she was given the Nobel Prize in chemistry. In 1922 she became the first woman elected to the French Academy of Sciences, 12 years after she had been defeated for membership in the body.

Thousands of victims of cancer have benefited from the Curies' discovery of radium, one of the world's rarest and most valuable substances.

Only a few ounces of it have been segregated. It is obtained from pitchblende. The effect of radium on human tissues has opened entirely new medical and scientific fields.

OUR RESPONSIBILITY TO GOD
Some years ago I read an article by Rev. F. W. Boreham, from which the following extracts are gleaned.

He gave three pictures: 1st. A glimpse of the beautiful grounds with a sparkling stream at the Abbey of Fontaines in 1317 A.D., where the Venerable Abbot Augustine, the beloved aged Abbot, bent nearly double with the weight of more than 80 years, paced slowly the pathways on his last day of service.

A young monk was brought to him and leaning heavily on the young man's arm he said: "Find time for God, my son. Vigils and fastings, matins and vespers, are not God." "Service . . . is not God. These things may lead thee to Him, or they may rear thee from Him.

Let nothing intervene between thy soul and Himself. Find time for God, my son, find time for God." This story was oft-told when this young novice—Hilaris—later became the Abbot and repeated it to the monks under his authority.

2nd. A prosperous business man, Harold Grierson . . . interviewed his son, who told of his purpose to enter the ministry instead of becoming his father's partner. The father was too good and too brave to thwart his purpose, so after a bitter struggle with his disappointment, he said: "Ah, well, my boy I've only one thing to say to you . . . You'll leave me behind in the dusty old world where I belong . . . a world of stocks and bonds and shares and wages and losses and profits—but when you are a minister find time for men—for men like me. We men of the world need all the help you can give us . . . this contact may do you good and help to keep you human and it will do

us good. Find time for men, my boy, find time for men." 3rd. A picture of an old vine-covered cottage where a dainty old lady with a youth's heart, said to him as a student: "Find time for yourself. Is not this a complete life picture of our responsibilities?"

During this holiday season, we think of the time given for ourselves not only resting but our playtime.

Both in work and in play in all our contacts of life we must show that the Spirit of Christ rules our lives. If we ever find time for God as we should, His Spirit will guide our contacts with men and they will see in our work and in our relaxation a spirit of fairness and honesty of purpose that can come only through Him.

The following poem by Burton Braley, entitled, "The Prayer of a Sportsman," expresses very fittingly the theme of this topic:

Dear Lord, in the battle that goes through life, the field that is fair, A chance that is equal with all in the strife, A courage to do and to dare; And if I should win, let it be by the code, With my faith and my honor held And if I should lose, let me stand by the road, And cheer as the winners go by.

So grant me to conquer, if I conquer I can, By proving my work in the fray; But teach me to lose like a regular man, And not like a craven, I pray; Let me say, "There they ride, on whom laurels bestowed, Since they played the game better than I."

Let me stand with a smile by the side of the road, And cheer as the winners go by.

The true test for our holiday time must be: Does it build up tired muscles and brain and nerves and recreate us physically? Does it develop patience, self-control and character? Is the influence helpful on our religious life and that of others? If so, we will bring back to our task the blessings God expects us to win and leave behind an influence on other lives as well.
