Greyhound Racing One of England's Greatest Sports

BY JACK SULLIVAN Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, Jan. 30.—(CP) —Greyhound racing—20 years ago an idea in the mind of a Canadian promoter—now has become a \$100,000,000 industry class.

Calgary-born Brig-Gen. A. C. Critchley with bank loan of 14,000 (\$63,000) and the knowledge that an attempt to draw customers to watch greyhound chase a mechanically-propelled "hare" had failed dismally in 1916, decided to "shoot the works" in Manchester.

He had hoped for a crowd of 10,000. The first night 2,100 turned out. The second night, attendance dropped to 1,500. Then the boom began. For the next 38 meetings, six figures averaged 11,000.

Gen. Critchley extended his enterprise to London, where 150 tracks throughout the country attract more than 30,000,000 spectators annually while one machine took in £70,452,951 (\$17,038,325) last year and hundreds of thousands of unrecorded pounds changed hands through bookmakers.

Huge stadiums, devoted entirely to greyhound racing, have mushroomed across the country.

Bring Big Prices: Prices of dogs soared with the war. The hound which would once have been worth no more than £50 (\$22.50) now costs about £150. Well-bred puppies are worth £100 to £250, potential champions £1,000. The best greyhound race has topped the £2,000-mark. Stud fees have gone as high as £100, compared with the pre-war price of £15 to £20.

Long-term planning, pays a big part with owners and trainers. It is not unusual for an entire litter of promising pups to be entered in 1946, but to be ready to race two years ahead. Disappointments are weeds out of an entire crop, but a survivor may bring glory to his family and something more sold to his owner.

Greyhound racing, governed under an act of parliament, passed in 1926, was restricted to eight Saturday meetings during the war. But the act was rescinded under terms of the act and now each track is permitted to hold up to 104 meetings a year, an average of two meetings a week.

Gen. Critchley gave up his post as managing director and chairman of the Greyhound Racing Association in 1944. He became director-general of British Overseas Airways Corporation, but resigned from the post recently.

Former Moncton Coach Returns To Great Britain

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 31.—Perce Nicklin, coach of the Moncton Hawks when that club ruled the roost of Canadian amateur hockey, sailed from Saint John today on his return to London to visit of several weeks in Canada. One of 11 passengers on the freighter, he plans to make his permanent home in England, where he is director of the Harringway Sports Enterprises. Nicklin did not visit Moncton to see any members of the old Hawkgang, but he went as far west as Winnipeg.

Asked about hockey prospects overseas, he said big game hockey would not return there until a couple more years had passed but in time the game of play would be on a par with that in Canada.
