AND THE PRESIDENT HAVE THE BEST POSSIBLE TREATMENT.

It must always remain a matter of doubt whether President McKinley's life could have been saved after the terrible wounds which he received on the afternoon of September 6th. None the less it is of importance and interest not only to surgeons and medical practitioners, but to lay readers as well, to know whether the best that surgical knowledge and skill could effect was done to save his valuable life. It may be premised that American surgery at its best in dealing with grave internal injuries is admittedly second to none in the world, and among the surgeons attending the wounded President were men foremost in their profession in the United States. Doctors, McBurney and Parker especially stand eminent for their skill, experience and judgement in that regard.

The disposition of all to do their best cannot be doubted. They would have given their lives, if need be to have saved the life of the President. Still there was the possibility of error through haste, neglect of some needed precaution, misjudgment of symptoms as they developed, and wrong treatment surgically, medically or in regard to the nourishment of the patient. All that the world has to go upon in forming a judgment is the bulletins and statements from time to time given to the press and signed by the surgeons and physicians in charge of the case. A city physician and surgeon says we have no evidence that these bulletins were ever seen by the doctors or authorized by them. On the contrary a score of bulletins issued from the President's bedside were signed by all the doctors in attendance and further attested by the signature of the President's Secretary.

The doctors in charge must therefore stand approved or condemned by their own record of the case and its treatment. Unfortunately for them the record does not show that in all cases the best possible was done. Notably was this the case in closing the long incision made in the President's body. A shred from his coat had been carried into the wound and was actually stitched in, where three days later the wound had to be reopened for its removal. This was no good surgery and the high reputation of the surgeons in this case cannot possibly save them from censure in that particular. Moreover one such neglect or omission, even though it may have contributed little or nothing to the fatal termination, seems to suggest the possibility of other and graver failures during the progress of the case.

Unfortunately there are also many strong indications that the doctors failed to realize the gravity of the President's condition when there was every reason for the most serious apprehension. The exterior wound did not heal by the first intention, but suppurated. At no stage were his temperature, pulse and respiration if taken together, indicative of satisfactory progress toward recovery. Yet for days, and down almost to the end the doctors proclaimed a steady improvement, and they told that the wounds in his stomach were entirely healed, when as we now know mortification had already set in. Such a misjudgement of a patient's condition cannot be considered creditable to our much boasted modern surgery.

We pass by the mistake of giving the patient, whose stomach was already gangrened, copious draughts of beef tea, with coffee and toast. That did not kill him, for he was probably already beyond recovery at the time. But this food, with the purgation by successive doses of calomel, castor oil and enemata given to get rid of it, further prostrated the patient and no doubt hastened the end. Such is an outline of the history of the case from facts supplied by the attending doctors, and we submit, as a purely lay opinion, that it must place them in some measure on their defence before the profession and the world at large. In this view of the case we are fortified by the opinion of local surgeons and physicians who have been called to deal, and have dealt successfully, with injuries as grave as those from which President McKinley died almost within a week of being wounded.

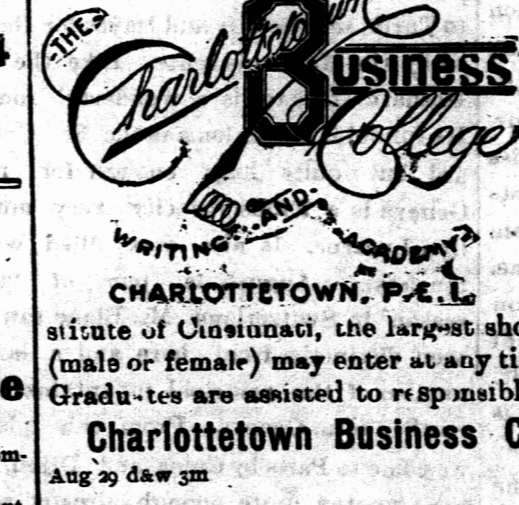
