Young Sydney Youth Wins Golf Title

Findlay Defeats Armstrong For Maritime Crown

Eighteen Year Old King's College Boy, Student And Athlete, Takes Premier Honors. Prizes Awarded

CHARLOTTETOWN, Aug. 11.—Sub-par golf on two strategic holes sent the Maritime amateur golf championship to Cape Breton today as young Allan Findlay, junior member of the Lingan Club, defeated Fen Armstrong of Riversdale, Saint John, two up and one to go.

CLOSE MATCH

It was deadly close all the way between the Sydney redhead and the smiling, quiet youth from Saint John. The cards show Findlay 87-78-165 for 35 holes. Armstrong had 86-81-167. Findlay was one up at the end of the first nine; Armstrong was in the lead by the same margin on the 18th green, and led the Cape Bretoner through the 27th. But Allan squared it on the 29th, went one up on the 31st, and forged ahead to take the match after the Riversdale ace won the 32nd.

CONSISTENT GOLF

While the finalists, except for one or two lapses, played consistent golf, Earle Turner of Fredericton stroked his way to a bright slice of the honors as he toured the course in the first division consolation final to establish a new record of 69 for the par 72 layout. The best previous amateur score was 75, and no professional has done it in less than par.

Sport Briefs

Lou Brouillard who won the world's middleweight championship at Madison Square Gardens, New York, last Wednesday night, is a French Canadian who has made very rapid progress in his profession. He started his career in a preliminary bout at Madison Square Gardens in 1931. Since that time he has won fifty bouts by knockouts, outpointed twenty-three opponents and incidentally won and lost the welterweight crown along the way and in his last bout won the middleweight championship from Ben Jely.

STARTS COMEBACK

Right there Findlay started his comeback, taking three holes in a row. He was near the fifth green in two and rolled a 40 footer up to the cup's lip for a par four. Armstrong drove a trap and used five. Allan got on in one on the sixth and got his par three while Armstrong hit his first into the water and took four. They went to the seventh all even and played the wildest golf of the day. Both got good drives and seconds on this hole, a 545 yarder, but Findlay sliced his third out of bounds. He had a seven while Armstrong took four putts for an eight, the Cape Breton boy going one up for the first time. They halved the eighth and ninth and tenth, Armstrong's six was good enough to win the 11th when Findlay got in the rough. Allan had a slight advantage in length from the tee throughout the day, but Armstrong was more accurate with his woods until later in the match when Findlay added exactness from the tee to his usual precision with the approaching irons.

FOURTH PAR HOLE

The 12th was halved in par three, and they played orthodox golf on the 13th for par fives. Findlay laid Fen almost a dead stymie on the 14th green, and won the hole with a five to go one up. The 15th was a standoff, and it marked Findlay's fourth straight par hole.

Island Tennis Tourney Reaches Finals To-day

Best Tennis Ever Seen In Province Displayed In Semi-finals. Great Matches Predicted For Today.

There remains but five matches to be played in the big tennis tournament at Victoria Park—the finals in all events.

Perfect weather again prevailed yesterday as all semi-finals were contested. Never before has such tennis been seen in Charlottetown. Commander Edwards qualified for finals in Men's Singles by defeating W. L. Rennie in an exceptionally brilliant exhibition—without a doubt the greatest exhibition of tennis ever witnessed here. Edwards clearly showed his superiority but never before did Rennie play such a match in this Province. It looked like an easy victory for the player de luxe—Comdr. Edwards—as he won the second straight set but then Rennie opened out with everything to win the third as Edwards did to win the deciding fourth.

In the other match Doug Grant, Halifax No. 1 ace, played wonderful tennis to defeat R. T. Barnard, Montreal, in three straight sets.

For tennis thrills unsurpassed in all former tournaments here the men's doubles semi-finals featured. It took the fifth set in each match to decide the finalists; teams for today, Aitken and Donahoe sprung a surprise by turning what looked like defeat in the third set to brilliant victory in the fourth and fifth, in defeating Edwards and Condon.

Hon. P. Aitken, who was put out in singles by Dr. Gagnon on Wednesday, showed that he could play real tennis with a fast coming champion, Bob Donahoe, in a manner that kept the large gallery in a fever height of excitement. Young Donahoe was also brilliant and played his best match here and perhaps ever.

In the other men's doubles match Roper and Grant, Halifax, won a spectacular match against Peters and Barnard of Montreal. Roper, who is defending his title, won here last year with Bev Piers, is no less brilliant with his new partner Grant, who is this season's tennis sensation. The Montreal team fought gamely against their heavy opponents. Peters like Donahoe rose to unusual heights. It is doubtful if two finer matches were ever seen in any Canadian tournament.

In ladies events Mrs. Edwards won her way into the finals by defeating last year's champion, Miss Currie, in straight sets—the first being the longest of any in the tournament to date. It is unique that both Mr. and Mrs. Edwards are finalists in singles and doubles events. "Birds of a feather" surely applies to them. They certainly know how to play tennis.

Mrs. Beer was extended to the extra set in eliminating Miss Billing and qualifying to meet Mrs. Edwards in finals. In doubles the strong New Brunswick team of Misses Keating and Jardine put up a wonderful fight against their more experienced opponents Mrs. Beer and Miss Billing.

The mixed doubles was also productive of extraordinary tennis. The versatile Doug Grant and Miss Currie qualified for finals by

At 11 a. m. the final in the Ladies Doubles event will take place. Last year's champions, Mrs. Beer and Miss Rykert, will defend their title. Their opponents will be the efficient team of Mrs. Edwards and Miss Etile Billing, the latter of Montreal.

At 1 p. m. the most spectacular event of all, the final match in Men's Doubles, will take place. Turner, a native of Massachusetts who has been teaching engineering at U. N. B. for several years, has played in his state's tournaments on several occasions. Today he had eleven par and five birdies.

All races to be raced on the three heat plan, viz: 5 percent of each purse will be awarded the winner, the remainder to be divided in three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat winners, they shall race a fourth heat to determine the winner of the event.

All purses divided 40, 25, 15, 12, and 8 percent. Entry fee 5 percent of purse, 5 percent from first and second money winners, and 3 percent from third and fourth money winners.

Six horses to enter, four to start.

All drivers must wear a driver's uniform that will be satisfactory to the judges and management, and will not be allowed to drive without uniform.

In event of lights going out, or other causes that should hinder the Officials from seeing heat, right reserved to have heat raced over again.

Right reserved to change program, reject any entry, bar any driver, and to declare off on account of bad weather, or failing to obtain a satisfactory number of entries or starters, to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible, reopen or substitute another class without re-advertising, and alter or extend racing dates.

Additional entries of an individual ownership may be made in any class by the payment of one percent on closing date, but entries of separate ownership, although in the same stable must pay instalments in full.

Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race, providing the full 5 percent is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the Judges.

Eligibility based on N.T.A. money winning classification.

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Congratulations to the McIntyre boys, George and Jim, and to Joe McGregor, operating Montague race track, for the very successful meeting last Wednesday.

The fastest heat paced there was by Darcy Grattan, 2:07 1/2, which lowered the track record from 2:10 held by Hush, made last year, and equalled the Provincial record of 2:07 1/2 made at Charlottetown last Exhibition by both Marjorie M. and Nell Frisco.

There were ten heats paced in three events at Montague Wednesday, the fastest being the 2:10 of I'm Alone and the slowest 2:16 1/2 of Silver Doctor, winning the third heat of the 2:28 mixed. The ten heats averaged 2:14. There were three heats trotted, the fastest being the 2:14 1/2 heat of Pixie and the slowest the 2:16 1/2 the third heat in the same race, made by Captain Cope. The average of the three heats trotted was 2:15 1/2.

Three new performers entered the list at Montague, August Queen taking a record of 2:15 1/2 pacing and Silver Doctor 2:16 1/2 pacing, while Captain Cope entered the trotting list by winning the third heat in 2:16 1/2.

I'm Alone, who won the second heat at Montague in 2:10 flat, is a son of Colorado L. 2:13 1/2, who was sired by Colorado E. 2:04, world's champion three year old trotter at the time his record was taken. Colorado L. was brought to this province by the late Hammond Kelly and raced by him to a record of 2:13 1/2 at Charlottetown. He was afterwards sold to Chaffes Thompson, North-Sydney, raced there for several years and also utilized in the stud. The dam of I'm Alone is Annie Laurie and he was bred in Cape Breton, and is the fastest performer ever bred there.

In the many years of horse racing in Prince Edward Island, only three Maritime bred horses ever entered the charmed 2:10 list as follows—Jacqueline, a daughter of Laocopia, pacing in 2:10 at Charlottetown, Hush, a son of Longset and out of the thoroughbred mare Silence, pacing in 2:10 at Montague and I'm Alone referred to above.

The number of 2:10 miles paced here have also been very few. John R. Braden was the first to do the trick when he lowered the Charlottetown track record in 1921 to 2:08 1/2. Eula H. was the next when in 1931 she paced the Charlottetown track in 2:08. On the same afternoon Volo Rico won the third heat in 2:08 1/2. The next year, 1932, at New Annan, Marjorie M. paced her first heat in 2:09 1/2. Then at the Provincial Exhibition later Marjorie M. and Nell Frisco each paced in the same notch, miles in 2:07 1/2, which is the Provincial record. At Northam this year Darkey Grattan paced the first heat in 2:09 1/2 and the second heat in 2:09 1/2 and at New Annan he paced the first and third heats in 2:10 flat. These and the three miles of Hush, Jacqueline and I'm Alone are all the 2:10 or better miles we have record of in the Garden of the Gulf in races. No miles have ever been trotted in 2:10 on the Island, the nearest is 2:10 1/2 of Abbe Worthy.

The three new performers that entered the lists Wednesday are bred as follows—Captain Cope by Laocopia, August Queen by Captain Aubrey, Silver Doctor by Edgerton 2:15 1/2, dam Helen R. 2:15 1/2.

Congratulations to Dr. Frank Bonness of Kensington on his good three year old, Clare Napoleon, which making her first start since coming to this country, in fact the first start she has ever made, paced close to 2:13.

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
