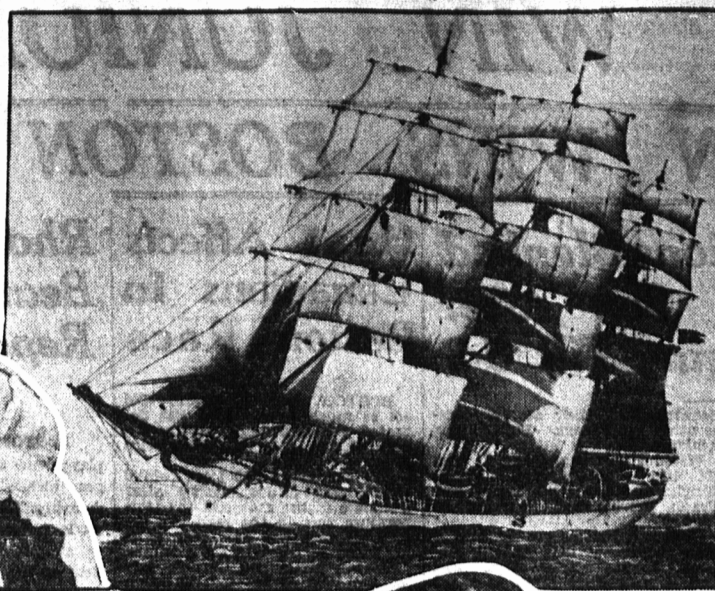


NEWS of the WORLD in PICTURES



This airplane, designed especially for flights into the stratosphere, crashed last week on its maiden flight near a Brussels Belgium, airdrome. Pilot Van Damme was killed in its sealed cabin. The tragedy was witnessed by the designer, the Belgian inventor Renard, and by Prof. Auguste Piccard, stratosphere balloonist.

Gen. Wilhelm Zehner (right), former Austrian army commander who was head of the tribunal which sent a number of Nazis to death in the 1934 Putsch, was reported reliably to have taken his own life. He is shown with former Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg, who is under "protective arrest" and facing trial by Nazis for attempting to call a plebiscite unauthorized by Adolf Hitler.



Dr. Mitchell J. Piese, a dentist of Amityville, Long Island, N. Y., is shown above with his "impact indicator" which he claims to be able to measure the force of each stroke within a few yards of what actual tape measurement show. A close up of the mechanical golf club is shown in the upper left picture. The little disc on the side of the club is the head of the piston which absorbs the impact of the ball against the club and causes the pointer to move across the scale. The inventor has secured patent rights for his "impact indicator" from the U. S. Patent Office.

The ... of the King ... engaged in "jurisdictional difficulties."

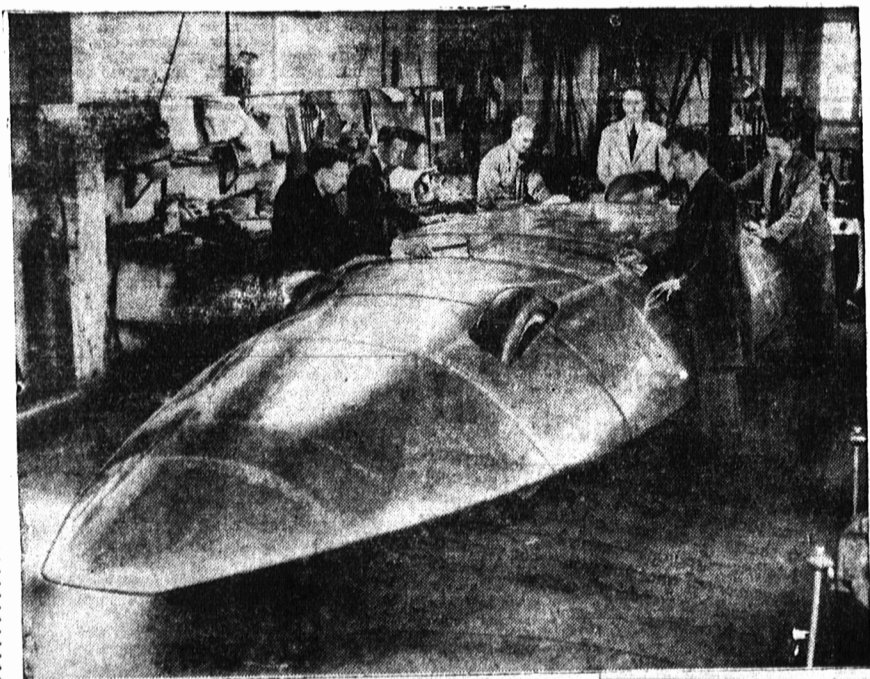
For six months the Danish government training ship Denmark has been on the high seas and abroad (Upper Centre). On its tour it called at ports in both North and South America. Watchers near Copenhagen got this view as it sailed back into its home harbor recently. Also welcomed home recently were the Soviet scientists who studied weather conditions at the North Pole all winter. Mikail Koltun (Lower Left), chairman of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the U.S.S.R., presented the Order of Lenin to M. Fiodorov and other members of the party. The scientists themselves were all honored although the nation is still hearing charges of "sabotage" on the part of administration officials. Lord and Lady Cadogan took their infant daughter to London's Holy Trinity church where they were married, to be christened recently. On her way to the ceremony, Lady Cadogan posed for this picture (Upper Left) with her daughter who was christened Sarah Primrose Beatrix. The baby's godmothers were two of Lady Cadogan's bridesmaids. At hearing of the murder charge against Vernon Spencer (Upper Right), former National League baseball player, his star witness collapsed with a mental breakdown. Spencer is on trial at Sault Ste. 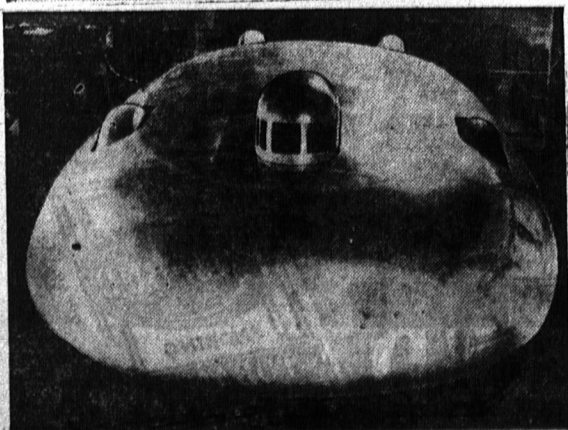
Thirteen people were killed and 40 injured in the wind and rain-storm which left most of Aliceville, Alabama, desolated, April 9. The town was caught in the worst April storm in the history of the United States. Twenty thousand people were left homeless in the flood area, covering great sections of Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi, which followed a tornado's attack. This man, driven from his Aliceville home returned to find it a pile of wreckage.



His highness, the 37-year-old Sultan of Muscat and Oman, completed his tour of the United States recently and sailed for England. He has been a government guest. Much of his time he has spent inspecting national defenses. A few days ago he flew from London to see the Royal Air Force station at Hornchurch, Essex. With Air Vice Marshal Gossage (at his highness' right) he looked over the newest warplanes not on the secret list, which Britain possesses. The sultan is due to return to his own land in southeastern Arabia shortly.



This terrifically streamlined auto has been built by John Cobb, famous British racing driver, for an attack on the world's land speed record on Utah salt flats next August. Our top photo shows a back view of the machine, which weighs only three tons, and below is a front view and Mr. Cobb. The front and back wheels are propelled by two 1,200 horse-power engines and mechanics can be seen here putting the finishing touches on the queer looking vehicle which will soon be shipped to the United States.



Rt. Hon. Leslie Hore-Belisha, Britain's dynamic War Minister, seen here boarding his plane, has flown to Malta to inspect the defences there and later in the month will visit Il Duce in Rome. It is regarded as significant that the British Minister will see Mussolini between the time the accord with Italy is signed and the official visit of Hitler to Rome.
