Bears register Third straight

MONTREAL, April 22 (AP)—Newark Bears, behind six-hit pitching by Hank Borowy at Newark, registered their third straight victory over Rochester Red Wings today, 10-2. Borowy had a four-hit shut-out going into the final inning and was credited with his second triumph of the young season.

At Baltimore, Buffalo Bisons unleashed a 17-hit attack against Durr Oriole hurlers to score an 8-6 victory.

Freddy Hutchinson failed for Buffalo and held the record in all except the fifth and sixth innings when the Birds got to him for six of their 10 hits and scored five times.

At Jersey City, the Little Giants led in its four-game series with Montreal Royals by capturing the third game 6-3.

The Royals outbit the Little Giants 14-12 but the locals bunched late blows effectively to score all their runs.

The Toronto-Syracuse game was postponed because of cold weather.

Tigers ruin Dietrich's effort For no-hitter

NEW YORK, April 22 (AP)—Bill Dietrich, 31-year-old Chicago White Sox pitcher, stood at the door of baseball's hall of fame a second time today only to have Detroit Tigers slam it shut and force him to settle for a 6-3 victory.

Dietrich, who pitched a no-hitter to beat St. Louis Browns 8-0 June 1, 1937, had his second such achievement in the majors within grasp at Detroit until with one out in the last of the ninth inning Greenberg singled and York homered after an error put a runner on.

In Washington the Senators defeated Boston 12-5 while young Walter Masterson headed the American League-leaders in check after a shaky start.

Masterson gave up eight hits, four of them in the first inning, but held the Red Sox scoreless after the second.

At Cleveland, Eldon Auker pitched St. Louis to a 6-3 triumph over the Indians for his second straight victory of the season. He gave up eight hits and five walks but was tough with most of the bases.

New York Yankees continued their home-run swatting in Philadelphia but fell apart every other way as Philadelphia Athletics edged out a 6-5 triumph on Dick Siebert's single with the bases loaded in the ninth inning.

Les McCrabb held the Yankees to six hits, of which three were homers accounting for all New York's runs.

No-trade rule Backfires on Club owners

NEW YORK, April 22 (AP)—The no-trading-by-the-champion rule enacted by the American Baseball League in a moment of alarm about a year and a half ago still lingers at the club owners responsible for it.

Every time Babe Dahlgren raps a home run for the Yankees he had three last time we looked—the club owners who were aiming at the Yankees when they passed the rule are reminded that the kick of the gun was more damaging than the spray of buckshot. Every time Joe Beggs saves a game for the Reds, they are haunted.

Ed Barrow was riled when the rule, apparently a modified break-up-the-Yankees measure, was passed. So, they weren't going to let him do any trading in the league, did they? Well, wouldn't you be trading with the league, even when the rule no longer applied to his club?

As a consequence there are four ex-Yankees in the National League now who possibly might still be in the American loop had the club owners not figured that the only way to hold the then-champs down was to sit on them around a conference table.

That Babe Dahlgren would be a welcome addition to more than one American League club is taken for granted. Likewise Joe Beggs. And more than probably Monte Pearson and Bump Hadley, despite their so-so records of last year.

All went out of the league on waivers, and all but Beggs since a deal by the Yankees with another American League club again had become legal.

Castilloux Battled to Draw by Hurst

MONTREAL, April 23 (CP)—Harry Hurst of Montreal, less than a year ago a sparring partner of Dave Castilloux, battled the Canadian lightweight champion to a draw in a 10-round title bout before a crowd of about 7,000 here tonight.

Hurst, who held a one-pound advantage over his 134-pound opponent, made up in aggressiveness what he lost in experience to the ring-wise Castilloux. At the end of the action-packed bout, the verdict was greeted with a great cheer.

It was the first defence of his title for Castilloux, shifty French-Canadian who was awarded the crown when Maxie Berger moved to a heavier class. He is slated to box Sammy Angott, the N.B.A.'s world champion, in Louisville, Ky., May 2.

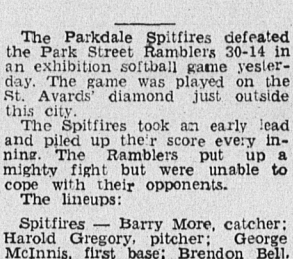
