Bankruptcy Trustees Are Appointed

OTTAWA, Jan. 28.—Bankruptcy trustees, numbering 265, have been appointed by W. J. Reilly, Superintendent of Bankruptcy, under a amending legislation passed at the last session of Parliament. Official announcement to this effect was made late today. The list includes trustees to whom licenses were issued up to January 30. Subsequent lists will be issued in due course as the work of licensing proceeds. Press Gallery Row Suspends Sitting Of Saxon Diet

DRESDEN, Germany, Jan. 28.—An uproarious fight in the press gallery of the Saxon Diet today caused a suspension of the session during debate on last night's Communist disorder in which nine men were killed and 11 wounded. Communist Deputies said that a Nazi reporter in the gallery made insulting remarks which were heard in the ground floor below. Two Communist Deputies then rushed to the gallery and pounced upon the reporter. A general disturbance ensued which necessitated the suspension of the meeting.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—A large part of "being educated" is the love of books, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, first lady-elect of the U.S., said at a dinner and reception to "authors of the year." She announced last night that she will continue after March 4 her association with the editorial board of the Junior Literary Guild, assisting in selecting the most meritorious child's book each month. Other such editors are: Angelo Patri, Carl Van Doren, Helen Ferris and Mrs. Sidonia Gruenberg. "I think of politics as being very much influenced by books," said Mrs. Roosevelt. "Writers have perhaps more to do with citizenship in a country than they realize or than politicians realize. "Education, to my mind, is far more an ability to read and care about books than the actual technicality of attending school. We should go on through life being educated and, by being educated, I mean that we should learn to love books."
