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IN MEMORIAM

ARCHIBALD McKINNON

Mr. Archibald McKinnon, Bellevue, P. E. I., passed peacefully away at his home Wednesday morning, July 1st, after a prolonged illness, at the age of 71 years. He bore his illness and suffering with true Christian patience and fortitude and an ever-present faith in his Saviour and Redeemer. His was a life of service and sacrifice. Those who knew him found him responsive and charitable. His unostentatious nature abhorred any semblance of show, but in his quiet way he went about doing good. The large funeral procession bore eloquent testimony to the high esteem in which he was held. There was a short funeral service at the house, and from there the remains were removed to the Ulg Baptist Church of which he was a faithful member, and in which he so regularly worshipped. The services were conducted at the house and church by the Rev. Mr. McLellan, Valleyfield, and Mr. Colwell, and were very impressive. The pall-bearers were: F. Bruce, S. E. McLeod, John R. McLeod, Kenneth McBeth, Murdoch McDonald, John A. McPhee. He leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing widow, two sisters: Mrs. Katie McLeod, Vancouver, and Mrs. Annie Murray, Lynn, Mass., also one brother Angus, of Vancouver, B.C.

MRS. JAMES TURNER.

The passing of Mrs. James Turner of the Reliance District, brought something of a shock to the people of that community, for until very recently it was not known that her illness was serious. Mrs. Turner was one of the old-timers of Reliance, having come to live here immediately after her marriage to Mr. Turner in 1912. Her early life was lived at Bedford, Ohio, where her parents and only sister, Mrs. Collins, still reside. During her residence here she has made many friends and has won for herself the respect and esteem of the whole community, taking an active part in many of the activities of the district. She will be missed by a large circle of friends.

For some years Mrs. Turner has been in poor health, and for nearly three months she has been taking treatment at Moose Jaw, but not till very recently was it known that a cancer had been the cause of her trouble for a long time. She was taken to Vanguard hospital last week that she might be nearer her friends and for a while she seemed better, but Sunday afternoon she passed quietly away to that rest from which there is no return.

She leaves to mourn their loss, a husband (who is a son of Mr. Geo. Turner, of Winsloe, P.E.I.) and three young daughters, Evelyn, Francis and Dorothy; her father and mother, also Mrs. McAfee, of Bedford, Ohio, and one sister, Mrs. W. Collins, of Akron, Ohio. The funeral service was held in the Aneroid Union Church on Wednesday afternoon, June 3, and was conducted by her pastor, Rev. Walter Sangwine, of Wallard. Interment was made in the Aneroid cemetery.

MR. LEO GILLIS.

The death took place at Clear Springs in the city by hour of Thursday, June 11, u.c., of Leo Gillis, at the age of 48. Deceased was a son of the late Angus A. Gillis, and is survived by his aged mother (nee Jane McDonald), three brothers, Michael, in Savannah, Ga. Clement, in Montana, and John A. contractor, in Cleveland, Ohio; also two sisters, Eliza A. in Boston, and Margaret at home, also by two children, the latter's mother (nee Cecelia McDonald) having died in January, 1917.

The late Mr. Gillis was one of the most progressive farmers in that section of the country, having been one of the first to realize the possibilities of the potato and seed potato industry, as well as other known lines of agriculture, and he also operated a lobster canning plant quite successfully until failing health compelled him to make a change in the conduct of his affairs.

Hoping that a change of air might benefit him he spent some time in the United States but this proved of no avail. He returned to his old home and there for the past few years put up a brave but gradually losing struggle against the insidious malady to which he eventually succumbed.

All that expert medical attention could accomplish in the case was provided, and this was supplemented by the untiring care of his immediate friends, towards all of whom sincere sympathy has been extended, both before and following his demise, particularly to his sister, Margaret, to whom now is left the care of her orphaned mother and his orphaned children. But to one of her well tried fortitude the promise shines with ever increased effulgence through the lowering clouds "I will not leave you orphans," and the recollection of how the deceased bore all his trials with unflinching resignation and died fully prepared for the long journey by the Viaticum at the hands of his pastor, Rev. K. C. MacPherson, must be a source of enduring consolation beyond the strength of words.

The funeral took place to St. Margaret's on the evening of Thursday, June 12th, and was one of the largest seen in that part of the province for years.

Messrs. Chester McDonald, Frank McDonald, Wilfred McDonald, Stephen McDonald, R. C. McPhee and Joseph E. McPhee, acted as pall bearers, and after the solemn service at the church the remains were tenderly laid away in the adjoining cemetery, there to await the summons of resurrection.
