**BATTLING SIKI AND CARPENTIER.**

PARIS, Oct. 12.—Prospects for the departure to the United States of "Batling Siki", Senegalese, conqueror of George Carpentier, now appear remote as the boxer is reported to be near the breaking point with his manager, M. Heiers and to be intent upon avoiding whatever arrangements that have been made previously.

The contest between Siki and Heiers will expire on November 30th, and it has become known that the former is not desirous of renewing it.

In the meantime, French boxing promoters are manoeuvring to bring Jack Lempey, world's heavyweight champion, here for a battle with Siki in December. In sporting circles, it is reported that the directors of the new Buffalo Velodrome, where Carpentier's eclipse occurred, have made overtures to Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, for such a contest.


