## BOSTON NURSE ROBBED HER DEAD PATIENTS WHOLESAL

It was overlooked in the casual search at the time the young woman was arrested. About \$2,000 worth of the plunder was identified by Colonel and Mrs. William A. Gaston as the property of Mrs. Gaston's aunt, Miss Lockwood. Colonel Gaston is president of the Shawmut National Bank. Miss Annie J. Pecker, of Mount Vernon Street, has identified about \$500 worth as the property of her sister, Miss Mary L. Pecker, who died suddenly a year ago last July in Woodstock, Vt., while Miss Leonard was attending her as a paid companion. The rest of the plunder is still unidentified, and police clerks at headquarters are engaged in making an inventory for appraisal and advertisement to discover the owners. Caricatures, hand painted miniatures and other things of value only to the rightful owners are still in the police sealed apartment where Miss Leonard was taken into custody. Receipts for trunks deposited in storage warehouses and one pawn ticket were found. All but one of the receipts had been torn up as if in an attempt to make tracing the property difficult. The one unutilized receipt was taken to the warehouse and the trunk redeemed. It was recognized by the Gastons. All the contents of valuable lace, costly shawls and wraps, small jewelry and bric-a-brac, had been taken from the Hotel Brunswick. Miss Lockwood's monogram on many of these articles made the identification positive. The pawn ticket is for a ring set with three diamonds and a ruby, which was missing from Miss Lockwood's apartment. It is estimated that all the property taken from Miss Lockwood's apartment will amount to at least \$10,000. Letters and papers found in the young nurse's room revealed that she had shipped a trunk to Bordeaux, France, and another to England, while she was attending Miss Lockwood in the Hotel Brunswick. Horace Cooper, a Harvard student, whom Miss Leonard had introduced as her foster brother, but who, it is

alleged, is not related to her, is now a member of the faculty of letters in the French university at Bordeaux. Sobbing and on the verge of hysteria, Miss Leonard declared when submitted to a police interrogation that the trunk she sent to France contained only books which Mr. Cooper wanted. She declared she had paid his way through college and had worked ill to aid him financially. Mr. Cooper's mother, Mrs. E. P. Cooper, of Shelbyville, Tenn., was a guest of Miss Leonard in the Hotel Brunswick for two weeks in January, according to Mr. Cooper's college friends. In the attempt to trace the ownership of the unidentified property the detectives delved into Miss Leonard's past life and have been amazed by their discoveries. Several patients she attended died, and inquiries are to be made about their deaths. The body of Miss Mary J. Lockwood may be exhumed. Dr. F. S. Garrett, of Chelsea, who attended one of Miss Leonard's patients, Mrs. Willis W. Taylor, of Chelsea, says Miss Leonard was dismissed from the Whidden Hospital at Everett for administering drugs to patients.

According to Dr. Garrett and the Whidden Hospital authorities, before Miss Leonard was dismissed it was discovered that a number of the patients had obtained morphine to make them sleep while Miss Leonard was absent from her ward.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—John Hays Hammond has been selected to represent President Taft as special ambassador at the coronation of King George V. Mr. Hammond was born in San Francisco, March 31, 1855, but his legal residence is Gloucester, Mass., and his business offices are in New York. Mr. Hammond, who is an expert in mining engineering, was a member of the famous party led by Dr. Jameson, which invaded the Transvaal before the outbreak of the Boer war. He was arrested and sentenced to death but afterwards pardoned by President Kruger.

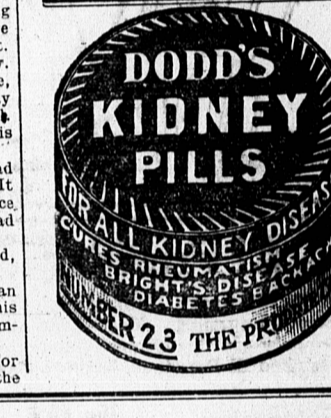
