Funeral Of Late Mr. Geo. L. Simmons

The funeral of the late George L. Simmons which was held yesterday afternoon from the Baptist Church to the People's Cemetery was very largely attended.

The Sons of England under whose auspices the funeral was held, attended in a body.

Services in the church were conducted by the pastor, Rev. R. C. Eaton, who paid an eloquent tribute to the memory of the late Mr. Simmons.

Mr. Eaton was assisted by Rev. Archibald Murchison who read an appropriate passage from the Scriptures and by Rev. A. A. McLeod who offered prayer.

The following hymns were sung by the choir and people: "Hark, Hark my Soul," and "Peace, Perfect Peace."

Temnyson's Crossing the Bar was rendered by the choir.

At the grave the impressive Sons of England ceremony was carried out by the President, Theodore Sentner, and the Chaplain Howard Ward, prayer being offered by Rev. Mr. Eaton.

The pall bearers, all deacons of the Baptist Church were: J. P. Gordon, T. B. Woodman, J. A. Clark, Henry Oalbeck, Percy Proud and Ross Bethune.

There were many beautiful floral tributes.

Address by Rev. Mr. Eaton: Our task this afternoon is a particularly sad and difficult one. We are called upon to say farewell and lay aside the mortal remains of a highly honored and dearly beloved father, citizen and friend.

This duty is difficult because of the distressing circumstances responsible for his passing, making it difficult for us to reconcile ourselves to what has happened. This is a sad occasion because we all realize the greatness of our loss in our brother's passing.

We are going to attempt no explanation of the sins, mistakes and blunders of men whereby the innocent suffer with and on account of the guilty. We would only express a strong faith that somehow in the long reaches of God's eternity what seem to us as wrongs and injustices shall be made clear and right.

We would declare our belief that all things work together for good to them that love God. This afternoon in a spirit of calm resignation we would leave things with God.

There are mountain peaks whose grandeur and sublimity defy description. There are fine paintings whose lines and exquisite coloring call for the deepest emotions and yet words of praise fall so faint and lifeless as inadequate.

There are lives developed along such noble and ideal ways that any human appraisal seems hopelessly idle. This afternoon we feel somewhat as we imagine the great Lincoln felt as he stood in the presence of the fallen brave of his nation and attempted

a dedication of hallowed soil, impossible to dedicate, impossible to consecrate by words or add to their glory.

"The world will little note or long remember what we say here" but it can never forget or lose the ennobling influence of a man such as was George L. Simmons.

His life was built on grand dimensions, deep, strong, spacious, broad, beautiful and high. It was embedded deeply and strongly upon the foundations of truth, integrity, honor and righteousness, those eternal verities which time cannot shake or destroy.

He was a man of broad sympathies and wide outlook. His interests were many and useful. He was an ideal father, a worthy citizen, a man who belonged to no particular class or denomination or creed in any narrow sense.

He belonged to us all. His life was kindly, beautiful, serene, noble, friendly and generous. He was a tall man, majestic, reaching always upward toward the ideal things while in intimate human touch with the common ways of life.

Modest, humble and quiet, yet a man of sterling worth, he went his way amongst us and we scarcely realized his greatness until he was removed from us. We presume that he had his faults but personally may I say in all sincerity I do not know them, nor in the intimate knowledge and acquaintance of over six years can I recall any one ever uttering a word of reflection upon his good life and character.

It would be an idle attempt for me to appraise the far reaching effects of such a life. We shall miss him sorely and yet in a vital sense, and real he is still with us in example, influence and inspiration. His spirit can never die.

Naturally in his own home he will be missed most keenly, and then in the gatherings of this church whose roof shelters us today. For long years he has known and loved him. He is part of us. He has occupied the most responsible positions. For as our Sunday School Superintendent, than whom we have never had better, a teacher of boys and girls whose life exemplified the truths imparted, a Deacon for the past five years up till the time of his death.

There comes to mind the poem of Robert Browning, descriptive of the funeral service of the Grammarian, one who had lived a noble elevated life. They are carrying him up to a mountain peak as a fitting place for his earthly remains in keeping with the nature of his worthy life. They come to the hallowed spot -

"Here's the top-peak; the multitude below for they can there; This man decided not to live but know Bury this man here; Here, here's the place, where meteors shoot, clouds form Lightnings are loosened Stars come and go; let joy break with the storm. Peace let the dew send; Lofly designs must close in like effects; Lofly lying. Leave howl after still than the world suspects. Living and dying." We leave him, yea lofter than the world suspects in the care of God and his body in the friendly bosom of the kindly earth. Farewell.

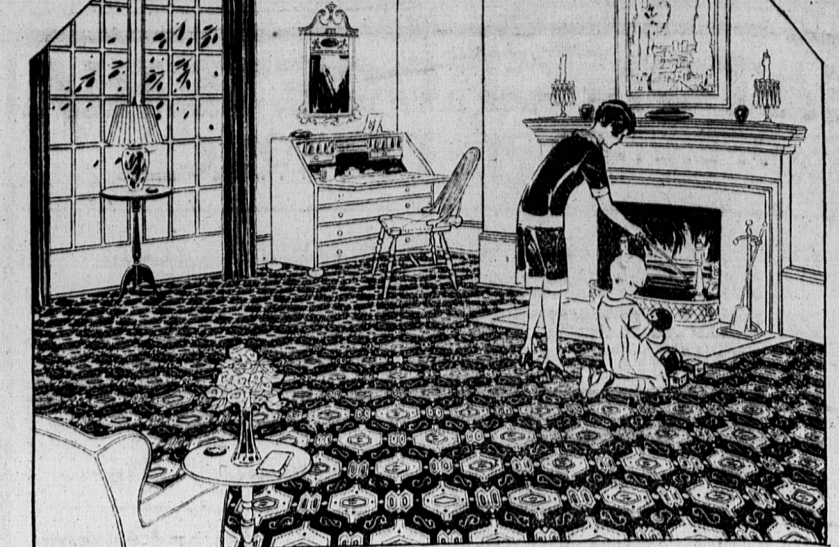

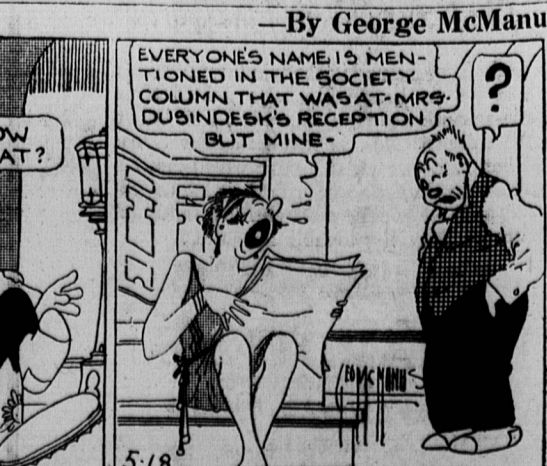
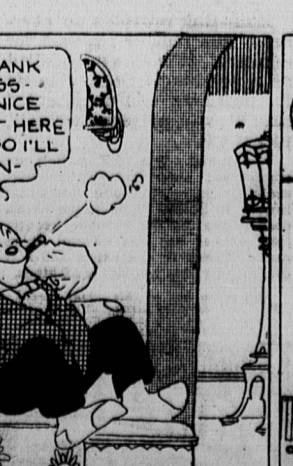
