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## "King" Clancy Wants His Maroons Tough—Guides Them In Stiff Workouts

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Oct. 21.—(CP)—Ensnored in his Adirondack Mountain hideout, "The Little King" is quietly banding together the men he will lead this season in quest of National Hockey League spoils.

And in the words of King Clancy himself they're going to be a hard-boiled, powerful and tricky outfit, this new machine of the Montreal Maroons.

That's the way he's training them to be. He wants them tough. They've got to be tough, he told them in training camp today, if they expect to get anywhere against such promising outfits as New York Rangers and Amerks.

And Clancy told the boys also they should not forget that little flock of Redwings from Detroit—because, they happen to be world champions.

### Misses Conacher

Coach Clancy admits readily enough he would feel more comfortable about his lineup if he could count on old Lionel Conacher being back there on the defence. And he would be glad, too, of advice from the deep-voiced counsellor who abandoned hockey for a seat in the Ontario Legislature.

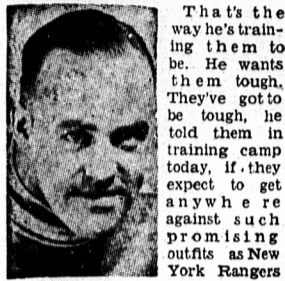
"But we'll get along all right," says the King, whose honorary title is acknowledged by everyone in town, even by those who never have seen a hockey game. "We've got lots of material to work with—and don't think it isn't good. Our defence is going to be good. We've got a good goalie in Billie Beveridge. He's looking a lot better than last year. Carl Voss is the best I've ever seen him. Our forward lines are going to be fast. Altogether, that adds up to a pretty good team. And I think we'll be right in there with the best. Mind you, I don't think there's going to be any walk-a-way this year. There's some pretty solid looking outfits in there, and to me it looks as if we're going to have a good season."

All "Regulars"  
One thing about which the King is emphatic—and he's emphatic about plenty—is the idea there are certain regulars on the team.

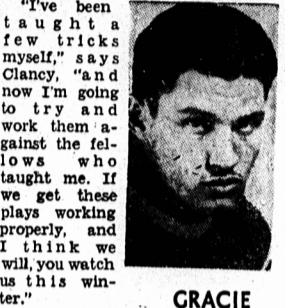
"That's bad for a team," he said. "The boys all are regulars. I don't want any of them to get the idea about there being regulars and there being subs. That's not going to go on our outfit. We've got a swell bunch of boys here. And boy, are they enthusiastic? Well, just watch them on the ice."

On the ice they looked just as described by the hard-driving coach who dons his outfit and goes with them through the workouts. Aside from the exercising grinds which include dashing and stopping suddenly as Clancy plays traffic cop, Maroons are concentrating on power plays.

"I've been taught a few tricks myself," says Clancy, "and now I'm going to try and work them against the fellows who taught me. If we get these plays working properly, and I think we will, you will watch us this winter."

### Runge May Get Call

"Almost definitely chosen" for the defence, the Maroons have battered Cy Wentworth and Steve Evans; Allan Shields and a partner to be chosen from Paul Runge, Roger Jenkins and Des Smith, former Maritime amateur who played last year in England with Wembley Lions. Clancy hopes to break in the fast-breaking Runge who played centre last year to fill the left defence position left vacant by Conacher.

Clancy thinks he has a great puck manipulator and play-maker in Tommy Cook who will be centred between Baldy Northcott and Jimmy Ward. Bob Gracie has not signed his contract and if he fails to accept terms Russ Blinco or Jerry Shannon will fill his place on the line with Herbie Cain and Gus Marker, the team's leading point garners last year.

Carl Voss, slowed up last year by an illness contracted on the pre-season tour, will be pivot man between Dave Trotter and Earl Robinson.

"That's the way things seem to be shaping up right now," Clancy says. "Of course I'm not counting in young Buddy O'Connor, or any of the other amateurs we have trying out with us. That's all to be talked over and we'll decide something later. Smith, O'Connor and Mel Carey (goalie) of Toronto all look like big calibre."

## "Kid" Lulu Wins Decision

BATHURST, N. B., Oct. 21.—"Kid" Lulu of Bathurst retained his Maritime Lightweight title here tonight when he slugged out a ten round decision over Joe Hinch, Nova Scotia champion in the first defence of his crown. Lulu won the Maritime championship from "Kid" Har of Moncton.

Lulu forced the fight and took eight of the ten rounds. The fourth and sixth were even. Hinch showed gameness throughout but at no time was dangerous for the "Kid". Lulu took every round from the sixth on by wide margins.

Ray McIntyre of Saint John took the nod from Joe Thompson of Richardsville, N. B., in the third round of the semi-final when Thompson claimed a foul. Pat Mettalic of Resigouche, Que., who was scheduled to meet McIntyre, failed to appear.

In the preliminaries "Spider" Dick of Bathurst won a decision over Calude Willett, Dalhousie. N. Landry and E. Cameron, both of Dalhousie also swapped punches with Landry getting the decision and Aurele Drysdale of West Bathurst scored a third round decision over Albert Doirin, also of West Bathurst.

## Less Whistle Blowing In Majors Sought

TORONTO, Oct. 21.—(CP)—National Hockey League referees have it from President Frank Calder that what is wanted in the N. H. L. this season is a lot less whistle blowing.

It was up to them to speed up play, the President told the referees gathered here yesterday for the annual rules conference. League Governors had decided to leave it up to them to use their own judgment in cutting whistle blowing to a minimum, Calder said.

Main rule change was made concerning the blue line into the attacking area. In future if a play-off precedes the puck into the area the play will not be called if the puck is intercepted quickly by the defending team.

Another new rule makes it necessary for the puck to be carried over the defending blue line into the centre zone by the same player. Previously a player could pick up a pass in the centre zone if he was in the defensive zone when the puck was passed.

Too bad Lionel Conacher, hockey's "big train" had to retire from Montreal Maroons or there might have been three Conachers in the big league at the same time and all playing for different teams.

Brother Charlie is with Leafs while brother-the-youngest Roy is trying out with Boston Bruins at Hershey, Pa. Roy, a Toronto amateur, is after a left wing spot with the N. H. L. team.

Here's a hot tip: Look for a fast start from Toronto Maple Leafs when the season gets under way. Manager Connie Smythe likes his team to lead in front, then there's no making up ground in the March stretch drive. For that reason, the Smythian strategy is to work his players into perfect condition in camp.

A note in high C: Archie McTeer, Calgary referee who gets a chance as an arbiter this year in the N. H. L., will handle the whistle in all six games for the tour by Rangers and Amerks of the prairie provinces. The teams open the tour Saturday at Calgary.

Coach King Clancy of Montreal Maroons is looking for Maurice Croghan, a young Montreal amateur, to step into the spot vacated by Conacher on the defence. "It's said, too, down at Lake Placid, N. Y., where Maroons are training that the King is "high" on centreman Buddy O'Connor, another youthful Montrealer.

There's hardly been a peep from the Camp of Montreal Canadiens yet, but there's a reason. Canadian fans still are hard at work on conditioning. Cecil Hart, who guides them, will have them out on Montreal Forum ice tomorrow for the first time.

That united holdout front of Maroons "green line" has simmered to a one-man stand. Gus Marker and Herbie Cain have agreed to sign up but Maroons still have to catch Bob Gracie, fleet centreman and high scorer of the ace line.

## Lou Gehrig Accounts For Six Of Ten Major League Records To Be Broken

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Lou Gehrig's announced campaign to eclipse some of the marks Babe Ruth and Ty Cobb set up for the record didn't get far during the 1937 season, but it was a big year for the "iron horse" nevertheless.

The Yankees' iron man first baseman revealed his ambition after the 1936 campaign. Through the recent season he succeeded only in wiping out two of the Bambino's all-time highs, and tying another.

But he was still the year's leading record-buster, accounting for six of the 10 big league marks that were bettered, and one of the 10 that were equalled.

### Three of Ruth's Marks Fall

All told three of Ruth's records went by the board. Gehrig bagged the Babe's mark for the player driving in 150 or more runs for the most years, turning the trick for the seventh time in his career, and for the better hitting for a total of 300 or more bases for the most years, collecting that total for the twelfth time to end a tie with the Babe.

The other Ruthian swat standard to go was shattered by the Tigers' rookie walloper, round-house Rudy York when he clouted 18 homers during August, one more than the previous one-month top which Ruth set up during the September of his record-smashing 1927 season.

By scoring 100 or more runs for the twelfth year in his career, Gehrig deadlocked Ruth at the head of the record books. In addition, larruping Lou stretched his consecutive-games playing record to 1965 games. Played 150 or more games for the eleventh year in his career for another new mark; set a new high for 20 homers with the bases loaded during his playing career; topped his own mark by scoring 100 or more runs for the twelfth straight year, and broke a tie with Al Simmons for a new mark of 12 years in a row for driving in 100 or more tallies.

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## Murdoch To Be Given Chance To Boost Total Of Straight Games With Rangers To 600

WINNIPEG, Oct. 21.—Before officially reporting to Philadelphia Ramblers, Murray Murdoch, hold-over of the most remarkable endurance record in hockey annals, is to be given a chance to run his unbroken string of consecutive games played in New York Ranger regalia to an even 600.

Lester Patrick announced today he is taking Murdoch along with Rangers on their exhibition tour of the Canadian Prairies during which they will play six games with their National League rivals, New York Americans.

The series begins at Calgary Saturday, alternating with games at Edmonton and again at Calgary before heading eastward. Both teams meet once on Saskatoon ice and at Winnipeg.

Murdoch, member of the original Ranger squad organized in 1926, has never missed a game—league, playoff or exhibition—in which the big blue team has engaged in eleven seasons. When Rangers completed their Stanley Cup finals with Detroit Red Wings last April, Murdoch had run his streak to 594 games.

The six games billed for the pre-season tour will enable Murdoch to make it an even 600 games—a mark that never has been approached in hockey history.
