**PRICE OF GASOLINE DOWN 1/2c GALLON**

TORONTO, Aug. 6.—Gasoline throughout the Dominion was reduced in price yesterday 1/2 cent a gallon, and is now selling at 34 cents wholesale and 38 cents retail. Refined oil was lowered one cent, the new wholesale price being 20 cents a gallon.

The cuts are the natural result of recent declines in the price of crude oil. A prominent Toronto oil man said last night that crude oil prices had dropped because of over-production in the mid-continent field, and that there was an attempt to discourage further production until consumption kept pace with output.

**FEAST OF TRANSFIGURATION**—Yesterday, Aug. 6th, was observed throughout the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada as the feast of the Transfiguration. The observance of this festival may be considered a new feature among Canadian Anglicans, for although the day was marked in the calendar of the old prayer book (the present English Book of Common Prayer), no special service was assigned for it. But the revised Canadian Book of Common Prayer has raised the Transfiguration to the rank of a "red letter" day with special Collect, Epistle, Gospel and Proper Lessons. In this respect the Canadian Church has followed the example of the American Episcopal Church which has observed the feast of the Transfiguration in this manner for about thirty years.

men of today to see if another war is to begin, and why it is to begin; for the burden of war falls upon our youth, and it is the duty of our young men to face the future, and therefore to face the present trend of modern life. You often hear it said that war brings out the noblest qualities in men. Why should the best that war brings out not continue into times of peace, instead of being allowed to slack off into what is often man's worst? Is there no need of discipline, self-control, courage, comradeship, in days of peace, as well as in days of war? As far as we know, military training is the best means of cultivating these. I do not want a militarist nation, straining always at the leash for aggressive war. But neither do I like to see a nation of softies, weaklings, unmanly un-disciplined, self-indulgent, loose-living, with no ideals, no aims, no enterprise, no comradeship, except where self is concerned. I like to see many men, healthy-minded men, men banded together with some other object in life than self. It is better to go head up, shoulders erect, through life, than to slouch through it, as if weighed down by a heavy load. I have seen in Australia a form of universal service which has been long in force. Introduced by the Labor Government, where every young man undergoes a course of manly discipline at the age of seventeen, before he has cultivated the inclinations and habits of a slacker or a parasite. The one danger of this fair Canada of our is its casualness, want of thoroughness, absence of self-discipline, the easy going theory that anything will do if we can get away with it. Anything, casualness, carelessness, easy-goingness, will NOT do. The day will come when we cannot get away with want of thoroughness. In life, as in the army, the only man who is fit to command is the man who knows how to obey.

**Will Not Cancel All Her War Debts**
