RURAL MAIL DELIVERY.

The Guardian has long advocated free delivery of the mails in the country districts and is pleased to learn that the federal Government is now committed thereto. The project is not new; it has been tried for years past in some thickly settled portions of the United States and has been found to work well, though it has proved expensive. Anticipating a gradual introduction of the system we had advocated a first trial in our own thickly settled Province.

The plan outlined by Hon. Mr. Lemieux embraces the entire Dominion. It proposes a box at every farmer's gate along the routes of the mail carriers, with a collection of boxes at cross-roads for those who live off the carrier's route. Each farmer will thus receive his mail matter in his own locked box, and will place his outgoing letters in the same box to be picked up by the mail driver when next he comes along. The plan will reduce the work of country postmasters and increase the work of the carriers. Registered letters will not be thus distributed, so there will be no temptation to rob the roadside boxes.

But it will be a great convenience to the rural population of the country who have hitherto not shared in the benefits of an overflowing revenue in proportion to the residents of cities and towns, who have had their papers and letters brought to their doors. Few may be disposed to raise the question, but it seems surprising that so large and costly an undertaking was not formally authorized by Parliament in a vote of money for the purpose. The cost will be very great but the postal revenues will also be largely increased from this source in a few years.

No one will mistake this service as a gift from the Government to the people. The people will pay for it all themselves, of course, but it will be a wise expenditure (if economically handled) and will serve the convenience of more people than a dozen such schemes as the Hudson Bay Railway. Mr. Lemieux is proving himself a very progressive Postmaster General, and The Guardian cheerfully gives him due credit. Already, it is said the boxes are being got ready to make a start in the rural delivery in the country districts surrounding Montreal.

No one will blame the Postmaster General for beginning at home, if, as he claims, the system is to be speedily extended to every Province and to serve 50 per cent of the rural population of the Dominion. Rural free delivery is one of the blessings of the twentieth century to the countries that have it, and we shall all be glad to have Canada fall in line with other progressive countries in this matter. The next great step will be to yoke the telegraph and the telephone systems to the post office under one management. In that respect Canada is far behind the British Isles and even behind Newfoundland.

It is an age of progress and we must move with the world. The Canadian postal service has for years

past yielded a handsome surplus and it is now high time that this was returned to the patrons of the post office in the form of increased facilities and conveniences, of which rural free delivery is one. But we cannot stop there. The postal telegraph and the postal telephone must follow if Canada is to keep step with other progressive nations in the march of progress. We must wait a while for these additions, but we cannot wait long.

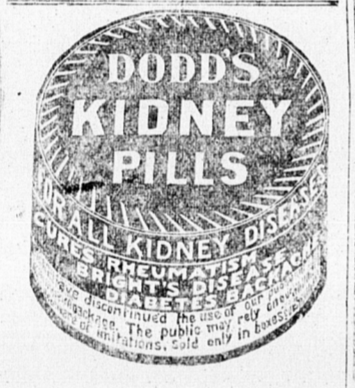
