Interpreting the War News

The mounting fury of German air and sea attacks on British ports and the North Atlantic sea lanes may be designed as much to hamper development of a major British offensive against Italy as to starve Britain out.

Serious as the British cargo losses may be or the damage to shipping and rail facilities at Bristol, Liverpool, Southampton, Plymouth or other important British ports, there is small reason to believe that these losses could bring Britain to her knees soon.

The accentuated German drive at ports and shipping could impede, however, whatever offensive operations Britain is planning in the east. And there is fresh and specific evidence from British leadership that such a stroke is in preparation to cap Greek, British triumphs in Albania and the Mediterranean.

In announcing relaxation of sugar and tea rationing for tea drinking Britain, Lord Woolton, British food minister, also said that further restrictions are impending on imports of other non-essential commodities. He explained that cargo tonnage must be spared from Britain's own supply lines, and added that greater privations must be endured at home, in order that Britain might take the offensive against Italy.

Balked at present from a march to Italy's rescue by the internal conflict in Rumania, and by doubt as to the future role of Bulgaria, Turkey and Russia, Hitler obviously has been compelled to change his objectives if not his methods in the west. There is no better indication of British public fighting elan than Lord Woolton's announcement. He relied confidently on British popular readiness to face new hardships uncomplainingly if they serve to let Britain abandon the defensive for the offensive against her foes.

The first savage air attack on Coventry was followed promptly by similar mass assaults on other industrial centres in the Midlands. These showed a definite change in German strategy, a concession to the submission by bombs.

If it is true that the main Nazi purpose at the moment is to prevent diversion of supplies destined for British offensive in the east, Hitler is on the defensive for the first time since the war started.

Carry On News And Views

 And nearer, clearer, deadlier than
 before!
 Arm! arm! it is—it is—the cannon's
 opening roar!

Napoleon, that great military genius, had marched his legions through the length and breadth of Europe, every nation at his feet, every nation except England—that same grand and glorious nation which today is Europe's last fortress of freedom, the one remaining stronghold of liberty, citadel of a free and democratic people.

Just as those gallant men of Wellington's army danced that night, and the next day fought and won imperishable glory in the great battle of Waterloo which forever destroyed the power of the conqueror, so our gallant lads, who danced with such pleasure and jollity, will one day, please God, on land and sea and in the air, write another glorious page in Britain's book of heroic deeds and prove to the world the myth of German invincibility, will show that Hitler's mantle is not gold but the reflection of his natural yellow streak.

Here was true democracy, where all were gathered in a happy, hilarious throng; all classes and creeds united to make merry and dance the hours away.

He was a people of a people living and breathing the very air of liberty, equality and fraternity; a striking contrast to that regimented horde in Germany, fed in the mad hope of a perverted mysticism. Here was a people enjoying to the full the pleasure of life, but ready and determined as in Pitt's day to save England by her exertions and Europe by her example.

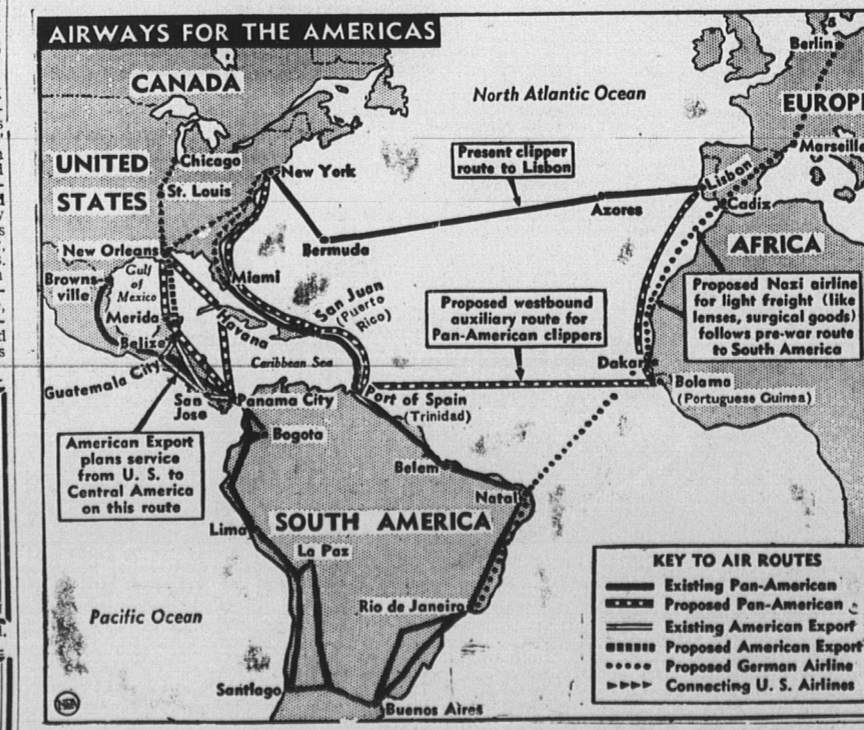
LONG CREEK WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

New air links are proposed for the Americas to offset any Nazi commercial aerial activity across the South Atlantic. American Export Airlines is completing a survey of a route to Central America, has purchased the TACA lines operating between Mexico and Panama. Pan-American, already operating a Central American line via Mexico, is reported considering similar trans-Gulf connections, as well as a winter route from Lisbon to New York that would parallel German's pre-war trans-Atlantic airline.

Work in Research Aid To Producers

As a basis for the framing of effective regulations concerning the inter-provincial and export movement of farm products, research is undertaken by the science and experimental services, Dominion Department of Agriculture, on methods of processing, storing and transporting foods for human beings and animals. The marketing of perishable foods such as fruit and vegetables, butter, cheese, eggs, honey and meat, continually presents new problems that demand solution in the best interests of producers, distributors and consumers. The recent development in the production and marketing of apple juice made from surplus apples is an example of this type of work. Economic research relating to farm management and marketing is also a function of the department. It is not the intention to increase production without regard to consumer preferences and potential markets. Agricultural research is aimed at lowering the cost of production and maintaining the flow of high-quality products to available markets. This service is absolutely necessary for the maintenance of a well-balanced Canadian economy.
