They will spend Sunday with Mr. Thompson's mother, Mrs. Mary Thompson, Princess street, Charlottetown, and on Monday will proceed to the Island.—St. John Sun.

The engagement is announced of Miss Grace Beatrice Silliker, youngest daughter of C. J. Silliker, President of the Silliker Car Co., Amberst, to Allison Hart Borden, Adjutant of the Royal Canadian Regiment, youngest son of the late Rev. J. R. Borden, of Canning, N. S., and a graduate of Mt. Allison.—Wesleyan Miss Silliker has visited in Charlottetown and Tryon, Roy Lea, formerly of Tryon, now of Calgary, being married to her sister.

One of the respected citizens of Miscouche, Daniel McMillan, died on Monday evening, Oct. 21st. He had been ailing for some time and the end was not unexpected. Mr. McMillan was the last survivor of six brothers, among whom was Rev. Michael McMillan, of Cardigan. Born at Clermont in 1836, he has reached the age of 72 years. At the age of 20 he married Miss Elizabeth Mullin and settled in Kensington. Thirteen years ago he purchased the Baker farm at Miscouche and moved there with his family, where he has lived ever since. Besides his widow, who survives him, he leaves a family of five daughters, all married, and two sons, Joseph, on the homestead, and John, in Vancouver.

Further particulars regarding the sad drowning of Ray Robertson in Wintipeg on Sept. 25th, are as follows:—After five days of diligent searching the body of Ray Robertson, who was drowned in Parson's Slough Saturday, was found by a searching party at five o'clock Sept. 30th. The body was found about fifty yards from the shore and about twenty five yards from the spot where the boat went down. Dr. Crawford, coroner, was immediately notified and he drove to the scene of the tragedy, accompanied by Sgt. Wilson. On examination he considered an inquest unnecessary and gave permission for the removal of the body to the city. Mr. Robertson was a grand son of Mr. Robertson of this city while his mother is a daughter of William McKenzie, Hillsboro. The deceased lived for five years in Moncton where he was well known.
