OUR FISHERIES.

We are pleased to learn from a reliable authority that the fish-drying establishment erected by the Government at Souris is doing a good business and is likely to pay its own way. The process of steam drying there greatly improves the quality and selling value of the fish, adding it is said, one dollar per quintal to the price at a cost of about twenty-five cents. There is good money in the fish business, or it would not pay the Nova Scotian and American fishermen to come so far to fish in sight of our shores, while our own people greatly neglect the abundant wealth so near at hand. But to make fishing pay requires skill, industry, a proper outfit and the latest and best methods of curing and preparing the fish for market.

Much has been said and written of the dogfish pest, the great destruction wrought by these voracious creatures on the merchantable food-fishes which they devour and drive away, and of the reduction plants established by the Government to grind up and reduce the dogfish to make fertiliser. But we are informed by Mr. Hughes, M. P., that another and brighter prospect is opening for the disposal of dogfish. It has been found that these fish may be canned and sold at a good profit in China and Japan where their flesh is relished and found to be not unwholesome. There is an unlimited market in those eastern countries for fish among the teeming millions of population there.

Some time ago Mr. Messervy in his annual report as President of our local Board of Trade drew attention to the promising field for enterprise which is so much neglected at home while our people are going abroad in search of remunerative employment. His valuable suggestions have not been acted upon but it is not yet too late to begin. The field is still open, the sea harvest abundant and the market almost unlimited for fish properly cured. The fishermen of Gloucester and of Nova Scotia make good money and have to go much further for their catches than ours would be required to do. Of course, organisation, capital, and some one to lead the way in adopting the best modern methods of curing are required. Souris, Georgetown and Charlottetown ought each to be the home of a fishing fleet, and we hope yet to see the day when this shall be brought about.

The Glasgow Herald predicts a higher tariff for Canada as the result of the inquiry now going on, but that the preference in British goods will also be further extended. We shall see.

Ontario is greatly feeling the drain of its population to the Northwest, just as the Maritime Provinces are feeling it and the Toronto Globe is moved thereby to talk in the same strain with The Guardian, that good chances at home are being neglected. Of the young men who have gone west The Globe says:

"Had they estimated aright the situation at home, the undeveloped possibilities, the new lines of enterprise, the effect of modern methods on old conditions, and had they gathered up their scattered energies and put their strength into their work with the intelligence and unreserve they displayed in the West, they might have found ample scope and large rewards."

If section thirteen of the Prohibitory Law can be reasonably construed to interfere with the administration of the Lord's Supper all will agree that it ought to be amended. Such a construction is obviously contrary to the object and intention of those who framed the law.

It is announced that the progressive Dominion Atlantic Railway Company has purchased the Midland Railway, thus extending its lines from Yarmouth to Truro, with the intention of making a further extension to the Straits of Northumberland, and so opening up a new route to and from Prince Edward Island.

Boston Herald calls attention to the fact that the revelation of the contributions by the three big insurance companies was preceded by the sworn statement of Mr. Banta the cashier, Mr. Thompson the comptroller, and Mr. Whitney the auditor of the New York Life Company that to the best of their knowledge and belief no moneys of the Company had been contributed to the Republican campaign fund. President McCall afterwards swore before the Armstrong Committee of Inquiry that he had made large contributions to the Republican campaign and that he felt that he was justified in doing so.

It is something of a novelty when an avowed opponent of prohibition displays a sudden zeal in the matter of enforcing the law. This appears to be the attitude of Rev. James Simpson of St. Peter's Church who says he has laid information against himself for dispensing wine at Holy Communion, which he believes to be a violation of the law as it now stands. He has also laid information against the Committee of the City Council, who, it is alleged, provided intoxicants for the entertainment of Prince Battenberg. Many persons will not think that Mr. Simpson's charge against himself belongs in the same category with that against the civic committee. However, Mr. Simpson's avowed object is to test the law, and it will be interesting to note what shall come of it.

NO ARMISTICE YET IN KOREA.

SEOUL, Korea, Oct. 6.—A Japanese staff officer today said that after three meetings the terms of an armistice in North Korea are still unarranged, although no further fighting has occurred. The Russians insist that the Japanese give up their present positions, but the latter refuse to create a neutral zone by evacuating places they occupied after hard fighting.

"DAVID HARUM" SOLD WELL

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Oct. 5.—"David Harum," the novel written by the late Edward Noyes Westcott, of this city, netted the author's estate about \$125,000, according to a statement made in Surrogate Court when the final accounting of the executrix of the estate was filed. Mr. Westcott, who was a banker, died seven years ago, and the estate was held open to derive the benefits from the sale of the novel.

Phoebon W. Beat General Fiske

Match Race at Sussex on Friday was an Interesting Contest.

SUSSEX, N. B., Oct. 6.—Phoebon W. defeated General Fiske in a good race at the Sussex track this afternoon. The weather was cold, and a high wind blew across the track. In the first heat General Fiske led the pole, which he kept until the last half, when Phoebon commenced to gain, and at the last quarter he took the pole finishing about a length ahead. Time, 2:17.

In the second heat which was exciting, General Fiske took the pole at the first quarter which he kept and finished about a length ahead. Time, 2:18.

By this time things were getting very exciting as each horse now had a heat. In the third heat Gen. Fiske had the pole, but Phoebon took it from him on the back stretch of the last half. This was almost an even heat, Phoebon sticking his nose under the wire only a few inches ahead of the General. Time 2:21.

At the close of this heat the driver of General Fiske was cautioned by the judges for supposed holding his horse. His reply to the judges was "Gentlemen, I will just sit in and ride, and at the end of the race will take the money." In the fourth and last heat Phoebon had the pole and kept it.

At the first half there were only a few inches between the horses at the wire. But Phoebon finished first, and won the race by half a length. This heat was most exciting, and the race was for blood. There was considerable of the whip in evidence by both drivers. Time 2:21.



Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY unnumbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, or the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased by the homesteader reside upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
