Dr. MacMillan and Mrs. MacMillan, the visitors were entertained at luncheon yesterday afternoon at the home of Hon. John A. MacDonald, M. P., Cardigan, and later visited the war monument at Brudenell before returning to Charlottetown.

Receipts for the evening:

In the evening an informal reception was held by Colonel MacLaren and Mrs. MacLaren, accompanied by Miss MacLaren, in the Confederation Chamber of the Provincial Building. There was a large and representative attendance of ladies and gentlemen, who were introduced by the Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan.

At the conclusion of the reception Colonel MacLaren gave a short address, expressing his appreciation of the delightful time they had had since coming here. It was a quarter of a century since he was previously on the Island—a pretty considerable time considering the close proximity of his home to the Island, not to mention its magnificent attractions. It was known, he believed, as the Garden of the Gulf, and the experience he had had that day and the previous day in travelling over the Island convinced him that that was not a misnomer. Indeed, he had informed Hon. Mr. Sharp that it seemed hardly necessary to have a Minister of Agriculture here, for evidently all any one had to do was to turn over the soil and plant the seed, to get the desired results.

As he had informed a member of the press who called upon him that morning, Colonel MacLaren could be described as an Islander "once removed," his father having been born in this Province. Naturally he was proud of this connection, or who would not be proud of the land of his forebears?

He was not going to make a political speech on an occasion such as this, but being in an agricultural province he would remark that the Government of which he had the honor of being a member was giving particular attention to farming problems at the present time. The Federal Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Mr. Weir, seemed particularly well fitted for the position he occupied, and was at present engaged in developing an organization to be known as the Farm Produce Marketing Board. The idea was to find out the amount of products in each Province, the amount required for home consumption and the amount of surplus for export. The Farm Produce Marketing Board would have nothing to do with the home markets but would confine its attention to the developing of export markets. The details had not yet been fully worked out, but the intention was to ascertain in what form products should be put up in order to attract the highest prices in the export market. In the past our producers had been in the habit of putting up their products in the way best suited to them without much regard to the requirements of the purchasers. As an example, Colonel MacLaren cited apples. The customary way has been to put apples up in barrels and ship them abroad to fetch what price they could get in that form, whereas he understood that the export market required apples to be put up in a quite different form. It would be one of the objects of the new organization to ascertain in respect to every kind of product the best manner in which they could be shipped to obtain the highest prices.

It was necessary, he said, to realize that it was the exporting of our surplus at profitable prices that tended to raise the price of the articles for home consumption. It may appear to some that it was a good thing to get cheap farm products at the prices, for example, that are being paid for eggs, butter and potatoes today. But that was really not so. If they did not pay a reasonable price for farm products to enable the farmer to have a reasonable profit, the whole community suffered. Great hopes were being entertained for the success of the Farm Produce Marketing Board, which would be run pretty much on the co-operative marketing basis as carried on on a smaller scale in this Province.

Colonel MacLaren concluded by again expressing his appreciation of old friends and making so many new ones, and assured his hearers that it would not be such a long time before he made his next visit to this Province.

Colonel MacLaren and party leave this morning for Saint John, N. B., where they will remain until June 15.

The occasion, it was recalled yesterday, was the first on which a Minister holding the portfolio of Pensions and National Health had visited the Province.

Resort To Martial Law

TEGUIGALPA, Honduras, June 9.—(A.P.)—The tension of campaigning for the October Presidential election has snapped into revolution in the north, and 51 men have been slain in conflict.

The clash became known today in an announcement that General Justo Umana and 500 Government troops clashed with a slightly larger rebel force at La Barranca yesterday.

The Government said the revolutionaries carried the colors of General Tuburolo Carlos Andino, Nationalist candidate for the Presidency, and that after an engagement of several hours they were routed.

The loyal troops were pursuing the rebels into the mountains northward today.

General Carlos this morning issued a statement condemning the revolt, and asserting that he and his Liberal followers had nothing to do with it.

Meanwhile President Mejiasco Indenes declared martial law in the departments of Cortes, Santa Barbara and Copan to cope with the situation there. The rest of the country was said to be quiet.

MacLaren, having been a native of the Province was mentioned by the Minister, who recalled that his father's birthplace was at the Hermitage, now the Inman property, Royalty. "My father," he added, "was very proud of the fact that he was an Islander, and frequently mentioned the privilege he enjoyed of being a student of the late Dr. Mackleson, a noted educationist of the Province. Later my father finished his studies at Edinburgh University. I believe he was the first Prince Edward Islander to do so. I am not sure how long he practiced his profession here, but he removed to Richibucto about the year 1841 and from there went to Saint John in 1860, where he remained until his death."

This Province was about twenty five years ago. He noted with great pleasure the beauty of the countryside, the rich farm lands and well-kept homesteads. Naturally, he sees many changes, especially in the absence of many old friends, among whom were the late Dr. MacLeod, Dr. Conroy, Dr. Warburton and Dr. Jenkins. He had the pleasure, however, of renewing his acquaintance with Dr. Harry Johnston, and also with the Rev. Mr. Legate.

Questioned with regard to the forthcoming Imperial Conference at Ottawa, Colonel MacLaren said there was intense interest in the outcome, not only in Canada but throughout the Empire. "I think everyone looks forward to the conference with hope and expectation," he said, "but it is well not to expect spectacular results. The benefits, I believe, will be great and far-reaching, but they cannot be brought about overnight."

The pensions cases, with which Colonel MacLaren's department is chiefly concerned at this time, are being overtaken. The number of these cases has entailed enormous work, but improved organization has done much to facilitate matters, and definite progress is now being made.

Yesterday the Minister, accompanied by Hon. Dr. MacMillan, Provincial Minister of Health and Education, and Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, M. P., called upon His Honor Lieutenant Governor Dalton and Premier Stewart. He also visited the Provincial Sanatorium and the Prince Edward Island and Charlottetown Hospitals, and commented favorably on the evidences of good management in these institutions.
