Orillia Journalist Describes Visit To Prince Edward Island

The following article is reprinted from a series of sketches of the Maritime Provinces by Mr. J. R. Hale, of the Orillia Packer and Times, Orillia, Ontario. Mr. Hale visited Charlottetown last summer and evidently spent a most enjoyable time. In earlier articles he described at length his trip over the C. N. R. lines from Central Canada to Tormentine, thence by way of the car ferry to Borden and Charlottetown. We quote from his articles at this point:

One afternoon Mr. Mould, manager of the Canadian National hotel, and Mrs. Mould, took me for quite a long drive into the country and I saw something of the Island. The Island is not absolutely flat and the rise and fall adds to the attractiveness of the scenery. And from time to time one gets a glimpse of the sea. For quite a distance we ran along in view of the ocean and some small islands jut out from the shore. They were used by fishermen. We stopped at one place long enough just to drink in the view over the sea. It was a lovely day and it was so peaceful, quiet and restful. The farms are well kept and while there are no large homes, and the barns are not large, yet the buildings look comfortable and give one the impression that the farmers are comfortably off. During the trip we ran through the Bonshaw Hills, which made a pretty winding drive. There are summer resorts just outside Charlottetown and I twice passed through the grounds of Beach Grove Inn, on the sea shore. An automobile trip over the Island would not take long, but would make a nice trip.

POULTRY IN COLD STORAGE

Over half a million pounds of chicken was the largest item in poultry in cold storage on November 1. The total poultry was 1,932,483 pounds of which turkey was 347,137 pounds. Turkey on the same date last year was only 48,675 pounds. Broilers, chickens and poultry are much less than usual but ducks, geese, as well as turkeys are in much greater supply.
