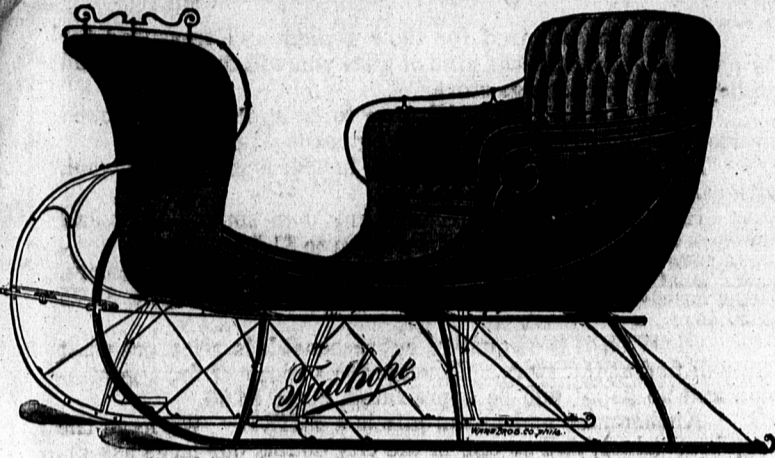

Maritime Religious Education Council

The Annual Report of Boys' Work Secretary of the Maritime Religious Education Council contains some interesting information. After telling about his continuous travels from place to place in the three provinces, stimulating new or renewed action and assisting the leaders in Christian character work with boys, he tells of the twelve boys' conferences at which there were present 285 leaders with 1154 boys from 158 communities representing eleven denominations.

At these conferences 801 resolutions for a forward step were recorded and 133 boys expressed their desire to unite with the church.

It is difficult to estimate the results of this effort in the lives of the boys throughout the Maritime Provinces, but from the earnestness with which they entered into the spirit of the conference, one cannot help but feel that the effort accomplished a great deal in laying the foundation of a higher and nobler Christian citizenship for the future.

During the first part of the year a large number of Father and Son "Get togethers" were held, the secretary being only able to attend twenty three of those at which there was a total of 2,698 fathers and sons in attendance. These gatherings have interested large groups of business men in Boys' Work.

The National Athletic Meet was promoted throughout the Territory. The Portland Methodist "Tuxis Boys" of St. John have the honor to be the winners of the National Trophy for the whole of Canada.

Moncton and St. John held Training Courses for the Mentors and as the need for leadership is so apparent, greater and more concentrated effort should be put into this type of work.

The three Provincial Tuxis Boys' Camps were held as usual during the summer and proved more popular than ever. Nova Scotia Camp enrolled 54; New Brunswick 46; Prince Edward Island 36, divided denominationally as follows: Anglicans, 9 boys; 5 leaders, total 14.

Baptists, 21 boys; 3 leaders, total 24. Methodists, 24 boys; 9 leaders, total 33. Presbyterians, 54 boys; 8 leaders, total 62.

Christians, 2 boys; total 2, making grand total of 110 boys; 25 leaders; total 135. There is no doubt but that more camps should be held in different parts of the Territory, as the expense is far too great for most boys to attend a Provincial Gathering.

A wonderful opportunity and abatement rests upon those whose duty it is to carry on throughout the years to come this character building programme. To prepare the men of tomorrow to take their place in the highest rank of Christian Canadian Citizenship.

The Girls of Charlottetown held their first supper gathering in St. James Hall last week and after a general good time, the several groups discussed plans for Christmas work and many interesting suggestions were offered. The following resolution was passed.

The officers elected were as follows: President—Margaret McInnis. Vice president—Mary Rogers. Secretary treasurer—Mabel Calbeck.

Britain And France Have Agreed On Oil Fields

LAUSANNE, Dec 17.—Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation to the Near East conference had a long conversation last night with Marquis Curzon who reiterated the statement made during the day that the Valayet of Mosul containing the city of Mosul and the much discussed oil fields could not be conceded to Turkey as a majority of the population are Arabians. The districts belongs naturally to the Arabian kingdom of Irak.

It is further reported that Great Britain and France have reached an agreement over the Mosul oil question.

BRITISH ENTERPRISE IN NEW-FOUNDLAND

Armstrong Whitworth's New Paper Mills—Sir Patrick McGrath On "The Gesture of Neighborliness"—Women Who Want London Fashions.

Enterprise that may pave the way for a new influx of British capital and British labor into Canada and Newfoundland is foreshadowed by the Hon. Sir Patrick T. McGrath, President of the Legislative Council of Newfoundland who is at present on a business visit to this country. "Trade between Newfoundland and Britain in recent years," said Sir Patrick, in a recent interview with a press representative, "has shown a progressive decline. It seemed as if Britain did not desire to do business with us at all. Certainly they made no attempt to cater for us. Whilst the United States filled the country with commercial travellers who carried attractive samples, studied our requirements and worked hard to satisfy them, Britain contented herself with shipping goods on the "take or leave it" principle.

"Newfoundland, as you know, is heartily supporting the British Empire Exhibition. We do so because we regard it as a gesture of neighborliness on the part of Britain; as clear proof that the mother country is at heart really anxious to increase her trade with us. "The women of Newfoundland may live a considerable distance from Paris and London, but are by no means unmoved by pretty things, and far from indifferent to fashion. Yet British importers seemed to consider that anything would do for them. The result was that America won almost a monopoly of supplying frocks, as distinct from mere clothing. Newfoundland women might be anxious enough to buy from their fellow British citizens in Britain but if they did, they had to do so at the expense of their artistic sense. America made her wares attractive. Britain did not trouble to do so.

End of the Bad Old Days.

"The project of a great Exhibition which will display only Empire products—raw materials and manufactures,—which will bring Dominion buyers to Britain to tell British manufacturers what they want, we regard as proof that the bad old days are over. Britain wants our custom, and is actually anxious to find out what we need. After the Exhibition, if it is energetically followed up, our old trade with the mother country should be restored. We shall see representatives from British firms in Newfoundland showing their samples, booking orders, and learning our likes and dislikes; and in return we shall sell our raw materials in Imperial markets instead of in foreign markets as we have been compelled to do in the past.

"With a little encouragement we shall reorganize our fishing industry, adopt the principle of mass production, and sell fish products to Britain. Iron ore will go home instead of to Germany. At the present time the British Empire Steel Company, mining in Newfoundland, is compelled to market ore in enemy countries. In the current year, despite the difficulties which have beset the industry, we have exported 750,000 tons of iron ore to Germany. Only British apathy could have brought about such a state of affairs.

Unemployment and Emigration.

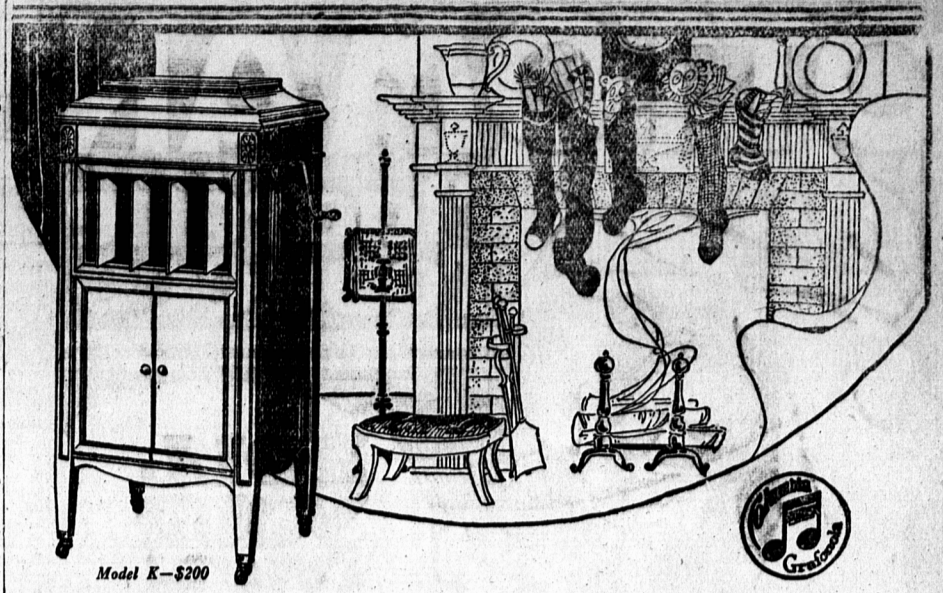
"It is evidence of an industrial awakening that the Armstrong-Whitworth Company is already planning to erect in Newfoundland a new paper mill which will produce double the output over even the great Northcliffe establishment in our country. Such an enterprise should pave the way for a great influx of British capital into the country, and a new tide of British immigration.

"Newfoundland needs settlers and in that direction also, the British Empire Exhibition will help. The special Overseas Section will carry out a great publicity campaign on behalf of all the Dominions, informing intending emigrants exactly what each part of the Empire requires of them and what it has to offer. At the same time it will make certain that only suitable men and women, healthy and energetic, are accepted.

"Newfoundland, therefore, welcomes the British Empire Exhibition because it sees in it a fresh opportunity of developing our trade, of attracting new capital and providing us with desirable additions to our population.

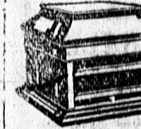

The weakness of the fur market in this country will, no doubt, be reflected at the London January Sales, and while the European market is undoubtedly in a position to absorb large quantities of furs at a slight reduction from Oct. prices, shippers are cautioned to be as conservative as possible in their purchases.

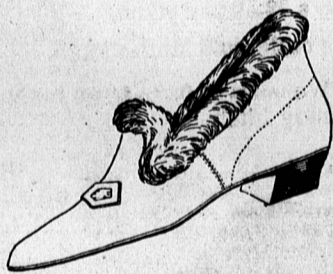
