FIRE ECHOES.—The amount of insurance carried by the Summerside firms who suffered in the fire was greater than at first estimated. It will be about \$231,300, spread over thirty different companies. The following amounts had been put on by the different agencies in this city: Hyndman & Co., \$50,000, W. K. Rogers and Co., \$80,000, E. T. Higgs \$30,000, D. B. Stewart \$8,000, J. A. Webster and Co., \$25,300, Col. Davison, \$13,500, E. R. Brow, \$10,500. Summerside agencies will have about \$20,000 (estimated). This brings the grand total up to \$281,300. The Guardian is indebted to Messrs. Sinclair & Stewart have rented the Sharp Building on the North Side of Water Street, West. THE HALIFAX.—The S. S. Halifax sailed from Charlottetown for Boston at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, taking probably the largest cargo of produce she has ever carried from this port. It comprised seven thousand bags of potatoes and turkeys or about twenty thousand bushels. The steamer had no passengers outward. This is her last trip here this season. The public will be pleased to learn that the report that the Plant Line intended to cancel all further sailings in future to Charlottetown is untrue. It is the intention to have the Halifax sent to Charlottetown as early in the season next spring as possible.

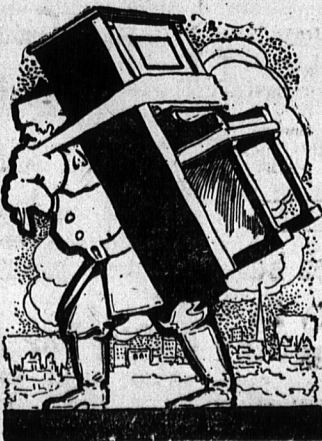

On Tuesday evening, the members of the French-Acadian Society, L'Association, met at 104 Euston St., City, the home of Mrs. Chaisson, mother of the wounded soldier, Pte. L. Chaisson, who returned on Saturday last, to tender to him a reception on behalf of the Acadians of this city.

Mr. J. F. Arsenault presided. After he had made a few remarks explaining the purpose of the gathering, the following address was read:

Dear Mr. Chaisson,—We, your friends and compatriots, feel that we would be remiss in our duty and poor friends, indeed, if we failed to convey to you some slight expression of our admiration for you and an appreciation of the great and noble sacrifice you have made in our behalf.

For we fully understand, that you were under no greater obligation than we, to take your place in the ranks and go forward to fight for king and country; but out of your love for right and freedom, you generously donned the "khaki" and for many long and weary months battled nobly and valiantly in the cause of justice and liberty. We realize, too, the great sufferings you must have undergone—the hardships of the camp, the terrible work in the trenches, and finally your wounds, which in one less brave and vigorous would have meant early death. Then came the long and weary days in hospitals, among strangers, far away from friends and relatives. All this, and more, you have nobly endured; that we who remained at home, might enjoy peace and freedom. So now, that you have returned to your friends with feeling of great deeds done and high resolves accomplished, we gladly extend to you the glad hand of welcome and friendship, and hope and pray that your

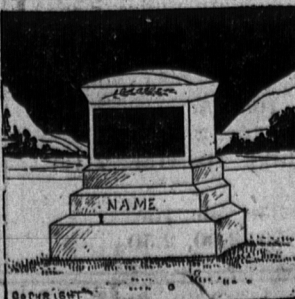
