COAST OF CANADA

LONDON, Feb. 13.—There is the prospect of British capital being invested in several Canadian enterprises in the not distant future. A wealthy syndicate is expecting to revive a recently abandoned wood pulp venture in British Columbia, while a number of fishery experts on the North East coast of England are looking with keen interest to the shores of the Pacific and are now waiting the return of a special commissioner sent by them from Scotland to report upon the fishing grounds of British Columbia. Before very long it may be that a British company will have steam trawlers along the west coast of Canada with curing stations about Vancouver, from whence they will go into the markets of the Dominion and California and the States bordering on Canada.

MILLIONAIRE M'NEILL
AND HIS LOVE AFFAIRS

HALIFAX, Feb. 13.—Mrs. Teresa Hazalum has brought suit at Boston for breach of promise to marry against Neil McNeill, a wealthy Dorchester builder and even-tenor, who is a native of Cape Breton, and has a handsome summer residence near Baddeck. It is a romance of the cards says the Globe, according to Mrs. Hazalum the courtship began with Mr. McNeill's visit to her apartments to gather information as to what the fates had in store for him. Mrs. Hazalum is a business medium and card reader. Mrs. Hazalum seeks to recover \$100,000, that being the amount for which Mr. McNeill's property has been attached. She places no pecuniary value on the loss of the affections of Mr. McNeill, however, as she says the action is brought only to vindicate her in the opinion of her friends who knew from her attentions of Mr. McNeill. As to the money, Mrs. Hazalum says she would willingly marry Mr. McNeill tomorrow if he were without a cent. But to show that hers is no ordinary affection the restitution demanded is placed at a substantial figure.

DOWNFALL OF THE MIGHTY
INSURANCE COMPANY M'N

NEW YORK, 10.—The utter and complete discrediting of the management of the three giant insurance companies that together formed the greatest financial force in the country has been revealed by the report of the New York Life's own investigating committee. President Alexander, of the Equitable, replaced, and broken down in a sanitarium, President McCurdy, of the Mutual, replaced, disgraced, and about to exile himself to France; President McCall, of the New York Life, replaced, heart-broken, and in such a mental and physical condition that no one sees him but members of his family, is the record of one year. All were believed to be too strong to touch. McCall went before the legislative investigating committee with the slogan that "the New York Life needed no counsel." His own company's committee recommends that he be sued for the million paid out of the company's funds to "Andy" Hamilton, the company's "legislation agent." He has already paid \$23,000. It is doubtful if he can pay much more. Hamilton, safe in France, will not come back "to explain." It is pointed out that each and every one of the twenty-five trustees of the New York Life is responsible, and might be sued for the missing monies. It isn't likely that they will be. And the net result is that the master mind of finance, J. Pierpont Morgan, can direct the destinies of the "big three" with their unimaginable hundreds of millions of assets.

BRITAIN AND GERMANY NOT GOING TO FIGHT

BERLIN, Feb. 12.—There are already signs of reaction in the German press with regard to the movement between Great Britain and Germany. Several papers declared that the movement is gradually growing ridiculous, that there is no use of going on protesting that there is no ground for a quarrel, and that everybody wants peace. It is intimated that these newspaper articles are in reality favored by the Emperor who while he does not want war or trouble with England does want a large army and navy and finds it necessary to appeal to national pride and international prejudice to secure the money required for these two arms of the service. Scolding at France has become like playing with fire and the Kaiser is said to have concluded that the English will stand almost anything in a way—at least so far as talking to or about is concerned—and while they may talk back through their newspapers they will not resent it enough at least to go to war about it.

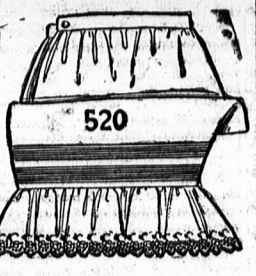
