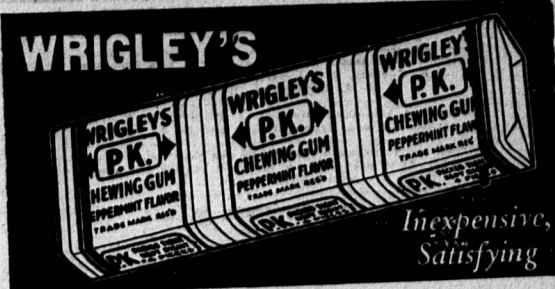
Sunday night an excellent crowd were present in the Oddfellows Hall when Evangelist F. W. Johnston talked on "How To Postpone your own Funeral and put the Doctor out of business." This was on the subject of healthful living. Taking for his text 3 John 1:2 "Be- loved I wish about all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health even as thy soul prospereth" the evangelist pointed out that any violation of the laws of health was also a violation of the law that says "Thou Shalt Not Kill." He said that people kill themselves at times in two ways. One was to take a weapon and kill themselves immediately or else abuse nature's law as to bring about the same results but gradually. But whether one killed himself instantaneously or gradually it was suicide just the same and the one who did it was guilty of breaking the command against killing. Mr. Johnston who has not had a day's sickness for over thirty five years said that God had laid down certain rules regarding the care of the body and the matter of diet which if conformed to would bring health to our physical organism. He read how that it was not God's plan for people to make of their stomach a dumping ground for all kinds of flesh foods. He said that while the old laws of Moses regarding the offering of lambs and other animals in a religious way was all done away with when Christ was crucified, yet the health and sanitary laws as found in the law of Moses were not done away with and if conformed to would bring health to the body. He read from Leviticus about the clean and unclean foods mentioning in connection with it how that God had condemned the use of swine, rabbits, lobsters, clams and all such that are today considered delicacies. The pig he said was only a walking sewer, that of all the filthy animals the pig out-reached them all. He spoke of the trichina worms that are found in all pigs. He said these worms wrapped up in little cysts and that when people took these worms into their system it frequently produced trichinosis. He said that hogs would eat all kinds of filth, snakes, rats or any kind of vermin and when people ate the hog they were eating these things second hand. He read a text from Isaiah 65:4 how that his face as a swine provoked the Lord to anger continually to his face. Also from Isaiah 66:17 where those who eat swine or mice would be consumed together as the Lord had said.

Mr. Johnston showed how that God made a distinction between clean and unclean animals for food as given in Lev. 11th chapter. He also said that although God made this distinction and allowed people to eat the clean animals, yet he said that in the last days even before the coming of Christ the former clean food would be unclean because of such disease. He therefore recommended a vegetarian diet as man had originally in the Garden of Eden and which will be man's diet in the future home of the righteous.

An excellent attendance was present on Saturday afternoon to hear the Evangelist on the subject entitled "The Protestant Interpretation of the Doctrine of Indulgence." He spoke principally from Romans 6:14. "Sin shall not have dominion over you; for ye are not under the law but under grace." The evangelist said that this text of scripture has been abused by certain religionists who because they disliked the fourth commandment that teaches to keep holy the seventh day or Saturday instead of Sunday, have tried to get rid of the fourth commandment by doing away or trying to do away with the entire ten commandments. They have tried to make out so Mr. Johnston said that all before the cross were under the law and no grace, while since the cross they say we are under grace and no law. Neither position is correct so the evangelist said. Without the law of God there could be no sin so he read from Rom. 4:15 and if there is no sin there would be no need of grace. So that the very act of grace is necessary to show that sin exists and sin could not exist if there were no law to break. Grace is only extended to those who have transgressed.

But what does it mean to be under the law the evangelist enquired? The answer is plain he said. Whenever a man breaks the law of the land, the law in the form of a policeman comes forward and takes the offender a prisoner. He comes under the law. But suppose the judge is lenient with the offender and allows him to go free on conditions that he must not repeat the same or other offence, then we can see the individual has grace extended to him. He comes under grace. But suppose the person in a short time after, goes ahead and commits another offence, don't you see, said the evangelist that he then comes under the law again. What then must an individual do who is under grace? Must he disobey the law or keep it? Grace does not give people a license to steal, kill, lie, and commit adultery nor break the Sabbath. On the contrary grace gives the Christian power to obey God, or otherwise we would not think much of grace or a person's Christianity who could commit any kind of wrong. It is a dangerous kind of grace that is preached by some preachers so Mr. Johnston said, that teaches people to break the ten commandments. Mr. Johnston showed a chart in which he proved that all the ten precepts of the Old Testament were endorsed in the New Testament including the Sabbath of the fourth commandment.

BENNETT made good before; he will do so again.

(Continued from Page 1) is a strip of coral sand some 45 miles east of Miami. Inhabitants mostly escape in fishing. At three p. m. EST the Jacksonville Weather Bureau issued the following bulletin: "Tropical disturbance is moving rapidly northeastward and was centered at two p. m. about 220 miles east of Melbourne, Fla. It is still accompanied by hurricane winds."

In Cuba, between 20 and 30 persons were reported to have died in the storm as it struck Cienfuegos, provinces of Santa Clara. Approximately 1,000 houses there were blown down or damaged. Heavy property damages in the 150 mile path of the storm was reported from Cuba.

Two died in Jamaica. Kingston reported loss to its banana crop of approximately \$2,500,000 and heavy damage to highways and bridges. Heavy rains accompanied the hurricane. Early today, when the storm was plotted as centred at Great Abaco Island, one of the Bahamas group, winds of 75 miles an hour were reported.

Later wireless reports from Great Abaco, sections of which felt the full force of the blow, said there was no loss of life but some crop and property damage. There was no report of damage or casualties from other islands of the Bahamas.

(Continued from Page 1) respecting banks holding money away from potential borrowers, Mr. Bennett was asked: "Why isn't Sir Herbert Holt in jail?" "For the same reason you are not," retorted the Prime Minister, "and probably for better reasons. Here," he added, "is a man standing in a Winnipeg audience asking why a man is not in jail without trial or hearing. It is a result of statements by men like Stevens misleading people like my poor friend down there who asks this question."

Mr. Bennett plunged at once into a discussion of policies and program of his government during the past five years. It had not been easy, he said, to carry on government during the depression, and criticism had not been lacking. He referred to a section of the press which had dealt with the government "in a manner wholly unworthy of traditions of British journalism."

But there is a sense of decency and fair play among the people of this country and it is to that sense we make our appeal. Taking up the wheat question, Mr. Bennett said it was one that affected every part of Canada. The carry-over of some 200,000,000 bushels of wheat at the end of last crop year was a result of decision on the part of former buying countries to become self-sustaining. "You know that and everybody knows it. Why advance any other reason?"

The percentage of European wheat requirements supplied by Canada had increased in the past five years, but the problem was that they were not buying so much and some former buying countries were now exporting. The Winnipeg Free Press advertising solicitors describing the 1935 wheat crop as the most valuable in years, but the editorial page told a different story in its attacks upon the Government. "They should get together on this," Mr. Bennett observed. "Ask yourself do you believe in this policy or not?"

"We do," shouted some in the audience. "They get busy and work for Conservative candidates," replied the Prime Minister. "That is the very point I wanted to make." Mr. King had criticised him for delay in seeking trade agreement with United States. "My friends, I cannot hurry the Congress of the United States, and it was only a year ago last June that the United States Congress had been empowered to negotiate."

"And they say it is only a piffling agreement we propose, that it is insignificant. If that treaty goes through it would lessen our customs duties on imports from United States on the present basis involving 700 commodities," he said, "discussing the methods adopted by other parties to meet the demands of Government, the Prime Minister referred to 'the Liberal

way" under Mackenzie King which he said had brought "Beauharnois and the Montreal Bridge."

He would give a further instance of "the Liberal way." Mr. Bennett said, by reading, without comment, a passage from John W. Dafeo's book on Sir Clifford Sifton. Mr. Bennett then proceeded to read from the book a description of Sir Clifford's method of transferring his securities from the vault of a trust company in Ottawa to those of a Toronto trust company when he moved to the latter city after serving as a member of the Laurier administration. It was shown that Sir Clifford, not caring for the usual methods of transferring valuable securities, took a trunk and two suitcases to the Ottawa vaults, "shoveled his securities into them," and checked the trunk to Toronto while carrying the suitcases to his compartment on the train.

(Continued from Page 1) obligations, it is pertinent to recall as I already have said at Geneva that elasticity is a part of security and every member of the League must recognize, as the Covenant itself recognizes, that the world is not static.

Public Sentiment

"If it is suggested that this declaration in support of the principles of the Covenant, embodied in my recent speech at Geneva, and reaffirmed in the policy of His Majesty's present government and necessarily that of their successors in office, I may point out that while my words at Geneva were in fact spoken in behalf of the present government of this country, those words were also spoken with the overwhelming support and approval of the people of this country, as has since become increasingly evident, the attitude of public opinion in the last few weeks has clearly demonstrated the fact it is moved by no variable or unreliable sentiment but is concerned with the general principle of international conduct, to which it will hold firmly so long as the League remains an effective body."

ADDIS ABABA, Sept. 29—Ethiopia can muster 2,000,000 men if forced to fight Italy, one of Emperor Haile Selassie's principal counsellors said tonight. This spokesman's promise of "crushing surprises" for the men of Mussolini came on the heels of the Emperor's warning to the League of Nations that national preservation may soon force him to mobilize all available man power. The Emperor's patience in withholding a general mobilization, his advisers said, has almost reached the breaking point in the face of what he regards as repeated threats from Italy.

Thus, in his telegram to Geneva, the Emperor called the attention of the League of Nations to the "increasing gravity of Italian aggression," and added: "The time has come when we would longer delayed general mobilization."

Call Eagerly Awaited When the Emperor's war drums roll out a warning, the royal counsellor asserted, Ethiopia will be alive with men and women rushing to meet and repel the enemy. "If Mussolini thinks our present forces near the frontiers repres-

GENEVA, Sept. 29—League of Nations officials foresaw tonight the possibility of a quick session of the League Council to consider Emperor Haile Selassie's formal warning that general mobilization in Ethiopia is imminent. The first reaction to the Emperor's communication was that it was a nature to aggravate the military situation between Italy and Ethiopia.

Italians in Geneva heard the news calmly and said it did not change anything. Mobilization already exists, they claimed. News from the council committee's sub-committee of three was discouraging. One important dele-
