Scotland Yard Investigating

(Canadian Press)
LONDON, March 22.—Scotland Yard is leaving no stone unturned to discover stores of guns and ammunition believed to be hidden in London. All available men are busy investigating the usual places where persons likely to be engaged in this illicit traffic hold out. One man, on whose premises several revolvers and a quantity of ammunition were found was arrested and charged in the police court this morning with possessing arms without authority. The Evening News says it is known that members of a gang are smuggling arms from the continent, and thence to Ireland, and that there are 250 active members of the Irish Republican army here, controlled by the inner council, whose operations are directed against the Irish Free State Government. Their work in London, adds the paper, consists of purchasing and smuggling service weapons to Ireland.

C. N. R. Revenue Increased By \$3,200,000

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Ont., March 22.—Sir Henry Thornton informed the Railways and Shipping Committee of the House today that the gross revenue of the Canadian National Railways had increased \$3,200,000 in 1927 as against 1926.

The increase, continued Sir Henry, during the consideration of the Canadian National Railway System, was largely accountable to a greater volume of business. The amount of \$3,200,000 represented a relatively small increase as compared to the whole and the small increase was due to a late crop. Grain which would have ordinarily moved would have been handled in 1928.

There had been an increase of \$9,000,000 in expenses. Wages in creases represented \$4,500,000 of this amount, reduction in freight rates represented \$1,500,000.

The Railway administration, said Sir Henry, did not "begrudge these increases in wages." The amount of \$3,200,000 represented a relatively small increase as compared to the whole and the small increase was due to a late crop. Coolidge Declines To Be Candidate

WASHINGTON, B. C., March 22.—Coolidge has declined to be a candidate for re-election. He declined today to accede to a request of the coming Republican State Central Committee that he waive his personal reference and consent to continue for an additional four years that leadership which has brought honor and prosperity to this country.

He made known his decision in a letter from his secretary, Everett Sanders, to L. C. Hinkle, Chairman of the Committee. "The President has received your letter of the seventeenth enclosing a copy of the resolution adopted by the Republican State Committee of Wyoming on March 10," said the Sanders letter to Hinkle.

"While he of course, very greatly appreciates and thanks you for the expression of confidence the President directs me to say that he must decline to grant the request of the Committee."

Two Dead Aboard Destroyer Whitney

Diocesan Meetings

The 31st Annual Meeting of the P. E. I. Diocesan Board of the Women's Auxiliary (Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada), opened Wed., March 21st, with Divine Service in St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, the Rev. H. L. Haslam, of Yarmouth, N. S., delivering the sermon. The following clergy assisted the Rector: Rev. H. D. Raymond, in the service and attended many of the meetings throughout the two days: the Rev. Canon Malone, Rev. G. T. Spriggs, Rev. H. Coleman, the Rev. C. F. Johnson, and the Rev. C. Rand.

For the Diocese, reaching from the Pacific Coast to the Atlantic, the P. E. I. Board and Representatives from the City Churches also brought greetings from their respective Missionary Societies—from the United Church, through Mrs. Thompson; St. James, Mrs. Bruce Muir, from Zion Church, Mrs. Muir; from the Baptist Church, Mrs. Clarke.

Mrs. Raymond, Pres. in her report, outlined the work done and that yet to be accomplished and the several Secretaries of the various departments of the Board in their reports, showed what a far-reaching arm there is in the Missionary Field.

Delegates were present from nearly all the parishes in this Diocese throughout the Island, and spent two very busy days, if they attended all the meetings and Conferences.

Of special interest to all were the addresses given by Miss Robbins, our Missionary from Honan, China, and Miss Burgess, Dominion Secretary of the Junior dept. Miss Robbins, coming from China so recently, was able to give first hand information with reference to the unrest in China today. Miss Burgess' chief aim was to lay stress on the importance of educating the younger generation with the Missionary side of Religious Education.

The Rev. H. L. Haslam, in the evening session, laid before the audience, the work being done in the Diocese of N. S. by those interested in the Maritime Girls' Home, the Feeble-minded and the Immigrant or White Setter.

Thursday opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion in St. Peter's Cathedral, the business being resumed in the School-room at 10:15. Election of Officers, Resolutions were passed and the remaining business was disposed of.

Tea on Wednesday at St. Paul's, Luncheon on Thursday at St. Paul's, the Reception at 4 o'clock in the Rector's were occasions where opportunities were given for the delegates and others to become acquainted.

Thursday evening, a public Missionary meeting was again held in St. Paul's Schoolroom, at which Miss Robbins and Miss Burgess spoke, the latter illustrating her address with Lantern Slides. The Junior branches of the W. A. of St. Peter's and St. Paul's gave Missionary Plays and Recitations, delighting the large audience present, bringing to a close two very successful days of great importance to those interested.

POULTRY NOTES

DIRTY EGGS.
Spring is here. To the producer and dealer in poultry products this means large quantities of eggs to be thrown on the market. Producers are penalized for dirty eggs by receiving approximately ten cents a dozen less than the price offered for extras.

These conditions are detrimental to the poultry industry of the province. For example, there are approximately four million dozen eggs marketed in P. E. I. in the course of a year, and if 10 per cent of these are dirty, which if clean would have been extra, means a direct annual loss to his province of \$40,000. These figures are based on the dealer paying ten cents a dozen less for dirty eggs than for extras. This loss, to a certain extent, is preventable.

Dirty eggs are a drag on the market. Producers will not buy them, therefore the retailer or wholesaler must lower the price of these eggs, so they will be an attractive buy to certain classes of consumers, or h'soul factories. It is not the dealer who fixes the price on eggs, it is the consumer. The consumer's wants and desires are many and varied, and any dealer who does not cater to these demands will not stay in business very long. Don't blame the buyer.

Dirty eggs are a problem for the producer himself to solve. The dealer will be only too pleased to pay the top price if your eggs are the right grade.

Spring weather brings to mind dampness and mud, to the poultryman, muddy poultry runs which largely account for dirty eggs.

Clean and dry litter in the house are important points in the production of clean eggs, as hens track in dirt and this will assist in collecting some of the dirt, before they enter nests. Clean nests are very essential. Nests should be filled with straw, or wood shavings. As soon as the nesting material gives indication of becoming dirty, replace it with clean material.

Supply plenty of nests for your birds. One for every five birds. Collect your eggs frequently, say two or three times a day. Birds that spend the night in nests are responsible for the greater number of dirty eggs. This can be prevented by having a hinged board that runs the full length of the nests, in front, if birds enter from the front, or rear if they enter from the rear. This board can be so arranged as to bar the entrance to the nests at night, and removed early in the morning.

WASHING EGGS.

The washing of eggs is a serious offence to the industry. A washed egg will not keep in storage, or any other place. The egg becomes a dead loss and these losses are reflected back on the producer following spring in reduced buying prices. Therefore, under no condition, wash eggs. Montreal produce men, who are this Province's best customers, state we wash too many of our eggs.

The harm in washing eggs is that when water is applied to them the pores of the shell and prevents evaporation, dissolves, and leaves the gelatinous covering which fills the pores open for the egg to evaporate, and foreign substance to enter, which spoils the food value of the eggs. DO NOT WASH EGGS.

If eggs are dirty try using a stiff bristle or wire brush to remove mud or dirt. Another plan is to use a piece of sand paper. If methods according to these suggestions do not remove the dirt, market them dirty. You will be assisting the industry in its endeavor to only place quality eggs on the market to increase the consumption of eggs in Canada. Increased consumption will be reflected on to the producer in enhanced prices for his product.
