TORONTO, Aug. 19 (CP)—Industrial stocks registered a sizable decline today on the Toronto exchange while selling in comparatively small volume.

Brazilian traction was adversely affected by the possibility of a declaration of war by Brazil against the Axis powers and the price weakened 5-8 to 10 1-2.

Miss Constance I. Young Dean Of Mount A. Red Cross Corps Is Recruiting Additional Members

The Charlottetown Detachment of the Canadian Red Cross Corps which is now comprised of over 100 active members under the leadership of Mrs. E.M. Bagnall, Detachment Commandant, will have courses commencing on September 1st, for some recruits who have recently enrolled and is anxious that more women should become members.

The Detachment is composed of four Sections namely: Section I—Motor Transport Service; Section II—Nursing Auxiliary Services (V. A. D.'s); Section III—Office Administration Service; and Section IV—Food Administration Service. Such subjects as Military Law, Drill, A.R.P., Anti Gas, First Aid are given to all Sections but each Section receives particular instruction in its own subject.

All members of the Detachment are most enthusiastic about the training they have received since the inauguration of the Corps in June, 1941. This training is preparing them to serve in time of emergency and in addition to this they are rendering splendid services to the Red Cross which calls for assistance of different kinds from time to time.

Any ladies desirous of joining the Charlottetown Detachment of the Red Cross Corps should be between the ages of 18-45 and may be interviewed at Prince of Wales College on Monday and Thursday evenings between 7-9 or at Red Cross House any day during the week. They will then be asked to fill out application forms which are afterwards passed on by the Corps Committees before the applicants are finally accepted. There is a real need for trained personnel such as this and the Red Cross provides. This is an opportunity to assist with the local war effort and to prepare to be a well-informed and useful citizen.

Principal Young is a native of Kentville, Nova Scotia and is a graduate of Mount Allison University and Columbia University. She was Director of Religious Education in St. Andrew's United Church at Moosejaw, Saskatchewan for three years before returning to Mount Allison in 1935 as Principal of the Mount Allison Ladies College.
