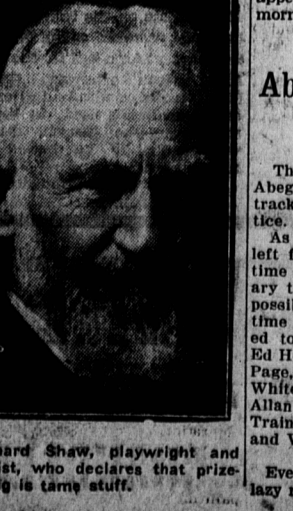

Sharkey is claimed by many to be as good as any of them right now and his admirers are satisfied that if he gets the best of Dempsey he will have removed the most dangerous obstacle from his path to the wearing of the fistic crown.

Both fighters are confident as fighters before a battle and that confidence will remain with each until the K. O. or judges' decision, knocks the confidence out of either one, this bout will be looked forward to by the fans with much interest, a good account of which will appear in The Guardian Friday morning.

Connie Talmadge Scores Big Hit At The Prince Edward

When Constance Talmadge scored such a success in "Her Sister From Paris" her millions of admirers said she'd never make a more satisfactory all round picture.

But she has, and local audiences discovered the fact yesterday at the opening of "The Duchess of Buffalo" a gay story of Russia, which lifts Miss Talmadge to new heights as a comedienne.

The picture has everything—gripping plot, a wonderful love story, dramatic thrills, scenes of splendor that dazzle the eye and a perfectly balanced cast.

The story concerns the amorous adventures of an American girl (Miss Talmadge), who goes to Europe and wins fame as a stage dancer. All classes pay homage to her beauty and terpsichorean genius. In Russia she promises to wed a gallant young military aide (Tullio Carminati), but his commanding officer, a grand duke (Edward Martindel), wants the dancer for himself and has the junior officer imprisoned.

Fleeing to another city after a sensational happening in the imperial theatre, the American girl resolves to sacrifice her love to save her sweetheart, believing that the grand duke will pardon the youth if she leaves. Instead, the lieutenant goes, A. W. O. L. and follows Constance. So does the grand duke—and the duke's jealous wife (Rose Dione).

Constance, mistaken for the grand duchess, goes through with the deception in an effort to shield her sweetheart, who poses as the grand duchess' adjutant. In the midst of the daring masquerade the duke appears on the scene, and while he is trying to force his unwelcome attentions upon the American girl his haughty spouse, arrives. From then on it is a series of exciting episodes up until the unique denouement.

Carminati, a comparatively new face on the American screen, but famous all over Europe and South America, makes a dashing leading man. Martindel injects plenty of sophisticated humor into his role of the pleasure loving grand duke. Miss Dione's portrayal of the bona fide duchess is entirely adequate. Chester Conkin has a great comedy part, which he makes the most of. Others who give creditable performances are Lawrence Grant, Martha Franklin and Jean De Brige.

The ever interesting News Weekly, Aesop's Fables and an excellent musical program by the Prince Edward Orchestra makes this a delightful mid-week program which will be repeated this afternoon and evening.
