An adjourned meeting of the P. E. Island Fish and Game Association was held last night. President, A. E. Morrison in the chair. Among others present were Messrs W. W. Stanley, James McMillan, Gilbert Gaudet, Isaac Carter, John McLaren, Aneas A. McDonald, Thomas Morris, Charles Dalziel, Frank Riggs, John Pierce, and Frank Fraser.

It was agreed that the sum of \$10 be awarded by the Association for information that will lead to conviction for violation of the Game and Fisheries Act.

Mr. J. M. Haynes of the firm of Gaudet & Hazard was appointed attorney to have charge of the Association's prosecutions.

Notices regarding the above matters are to be printed and distributed about the city and province.

The collection of dues was among other matters discussed and it was decided to make a canvas of the amounts now about due.

Further Details Of The Grilse's Battle With Seas

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND MEMBER OF THE CREW NOT DROWNED AS FIRST REPORTED.

Further details of the safe arrival of the Canadian torpedo boat Grilse at Lunenburg after a terrific battle with the seas in which six of her crew were swept overboard, state that E. Clements, the wireless operator, who lost his life, was endeavoring with Simon A. McLean of Georgetown, P. E. I., the other operator to erect a new aerial, one having been swept away. While so engaged there came the terrific wave that carried away the mast and Clements was knocked overboard and washed away. It is pleasing to learn that the report that Mr. McLean lost his life was incorrect.

The first intimation of the Grilse's arrival at Shelburne was when the continued toots of her whistle were heard. Word soon spread and hundreds of citizens rushed to the wharf to welcome the men.

The Grilse was on her beam ends several times. At one time she went over so far that the sea rushed into her tunnels. It was while she took this terrible roll that the chief engineer, Wilkinson, was heard to exclaim: "It's all over," and he sprang into the sea never to return.

Great credit is given to P. Swarbrick, engine room artificer, who was on duty from the time the Grilse left Halifax, all through the storm, and on the loss of his chief achieved wonders in again getting the vessel underway.

The chief quartermaster comes in for great credit and the men who sat around the warm fires in the Atlantic House and Shelburne House of how he stood at the wheel for fifty hours. Since Monday night not one of the crew had a wink of sleep. They arrived only in possession of the clothes in which they stood, for great coats and all other clothing had been ruined by water and oil. Some of the sailors declare that the engines were running under water for nineteen hours.

To show the stuff of which British sailors are made a little story must be told of the arrival of the Grilse in Shelburne. The crew was landed. A crowd thronged around, anxious to grip the hands of those who had fought through the storm so bravely. One man in the crowd was heard to say: "Well, I'll bet they won't want to go to sea any more." 
