ST. PATRICKS CELEBRATION

Tignish honored the Feast of Saint Patrick as usual, in a worthy and appropriate manner. In the morning the members of the A. O. H. paraded to the church, where High Mass was sung by Rev. A. J. McDougall. After the services the parade reformed and marched to the A. O. H. hall, where members were addressed by Pres. J. A. Brennan, who complimented them on their grand turnout, and referred in eloquent terms to the loyalty and devotion of Erin's sons to the memory of their patron Saint. In the evening the drama "Eileen O'Connell" was presented to an overflowing audience in Tignish Hall, and seldom, if ever, has an amateur performance been staged in Tignish that met with such general approbation. Although it was the initial performance of many of the cast, they took their parts like veterans, and compared most favorably with their predecessors of former years.

Albert Brennan, as Mr. Moriarty, personified the true Irish gentleman in his usual capable manner, and Bryan O'Farrell found his true prototype in Francis Hughes, who as a comedian has no superior and whose sallies of wit at the expense of John Thomas the blooming Hinglish man caused that gentleman, whose part was admirably taken by Mr. Henry Perry some anxious moments. B. C. TOWNS IN TROUBLE

Unless they are given immediate financial relief, many of the larger cities and towns of British Columbia will be in the hands of receivers before they can receive their share of liquor profits, the Municipal Committee of the Legislature was told by the executive of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities.
