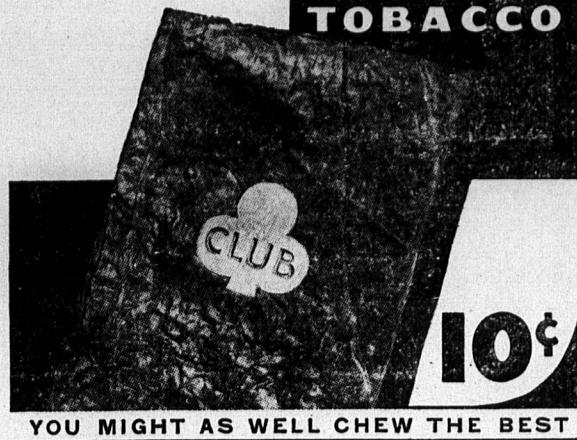

Joe Louis wins Edward J. Neil Memorial Award

NEW YORK, Dec. 10 (AP)—For his record-breaking reign of boxing and the job he did in turning back seven challengers this year, Joe Louis today won the Edward J. Neil Memorial Award as the man who did the most for the sport in 1941.

The Boxing Writers Association of New York, making the annual award in memory of the Associated Press Sports Writer and War Correspondent who was killed in Spain in 1938, voted the trophy by acclamation for the first time in the four years it has been awarded. The previous winners were Jack Dempsey, Billy Conn and Henry Armstrong.

The writers voted on their rankings of the champions and contenders in seven of the eight divisions, excluding only the fly weights. They were:

QUEBEC, Dec. 10 (CP)—Don Peniston, Coach of Quebec Aces of the Quebec Senior Hockey League, announced today that Bill Reay, a left winger from Winnipeg, will report to the Aces Friday.

Reay played with Omaha in the American Association last year but was unable to obtain a passport to return to the United States this season. He was ordered by Jack Adams, Manager of the Detroit Red Wings in the National Hockey League to report to Quebec Aces, but instead he went to Sydney, N. S., where he was scheduled to coach the Millionaires club.

Since going to Sydney, however, the player has decided to come to Quebec.

MONTREAL, Dec. 10 (CP)—Quebec Aces moved back into a first-place tie with Cornwall Flyers in the Quebec Senior Hockey League standings tonight when they rode to a smashing 6-0 victory over Montreal Royals in the first game of a doubleheader. Canadiens defeated Pats 4-1 in the nightcap to move into third place.
