Britain Names Prosecutor For War Criminals

LONDON, May 29 (AP) - Prime Minister Churchill today named Britain's chief prosecutor of German war criminals but held an impatient House of Commons the trials should not begin until they are properly arranged and a method agreed upon between the great powers.

Attorney General Sir David Maxwell Fyfe, who was nominated to the big powers board of prosecution, will serve with Justice Robert H. Jackson of the United States Supreme Court and the representatives of France and Russia yet to be chosen.

Mr. Churchill's implication that the trials of Hermann Goering and other Nazi leaders would have to wait until various details were worked out among the Allied powers supported a statement by Justice Jackson Monday that they could not start for "some time."

A member of Mr. Churchill's own Conservative party, Lt.-Col. Anthony A. Marlowe, led the Commons chorus against the seeming delay in getting started when he demanded of the Prime Minister whether he would see that high Nazi were "dispatched with maximum speed, and pending that, they are maintained in prison cells and not in hotels."

A responsible source reported that Britain and the United States were conferring with Russia on the procedure to be employed in bringing prominent Nazis before an international military tribunal, but that no hard and fast decision had been reached.

Claims Secret Pact Between Vichy, London

MONTREAL, May 29 - Professor Louis Rougier, who says he negotiated an agreement between the Vichy and London Governments in 1940, set in an interview today that a book which he has written on the subject has as its only object "to favor French reconciliation."

Professor Rougier was in Montreal on the occasion of the publication of his book printed by a Montreal publishing firm.

His book, entitled "Accords Petain-Churchill," deals with the misadventure which he says he accomplished in the fall of 1940 on behalf of the Vichy and London Governments. The book of the secret agreement was adhered to until Marshal Petain became a prisoner.

"There can be no real reconciliation in France without the truth," Mr. Rougier said.

"My book contains documents which have remained until today unknown by the French public as well as the English, American and Canadian public. The time has come to reveal them and at the same time to serve the truth which will be the foundation of the French reconciliation."

"Frenchmen and the public at large must be made to know that one of Adolf Hitler's greatest mistakes was to give France an armistice and that this armistice was won the war," Mr. Rougier stated.

"Every one also must know that the so-called Vichy collaboration was often the mask of an agreement between the author, as intermediary for Marshal Petain, and Prime Minister Churchill."

Mr. Rougier said that every day a German plane used to land at Vichy bringing "the news of the day" and "Vichy had to resist."

"It was a real Vichy resistance which kept the Allies in North Africa where the Allied troops succeeded because of Weingand's army until the total occupation of France."

Mr. Rougier said that if his book is admitted into France, it will "enlighten" members of the high court judging Marshal Petain on a high treason charge.

The author's book reproduces photostatic copies of telegrams, letters and the final memorandum of an agreement allegedly reached between the author, as intermediary for Marshal Petain, and Prime Minister Churchill.

The agreement with Prime Minister Churchill, Mr. Rougier said, provided mainly for permission for French shipping to resume trade between France and North Africa.

The British Government, he said, not to take further steps, either by force or through agitation, to separate French colonies from Vichy French colonies which had remained under Vichy jurisdiction.

PACIFIC WAR UNLIKE CAMPAIGN IN EUROPE

MANILA, May 29 (CP) - The Pacific campaign is a leap-frogging war of dozens of amphibious operations, jungle slugging matches sprinkled over a front hundreds of miles long with ever-lengthening supply lines across thousands of miles of sea.

On a broad scale it is probably the ultimate in continuous combined operations with army, air and naval forces hitting the Japanese co-ordinated blows they could never have anticipated.

It resembles the war in Europe only in that the offensive which grows in size by months follows the same tried principles of warfare - flanking, envelopment, disruption of communications and destruction - and in its maximum use of air power both for support of ground forces and blasting of enemy supplies and their production centres.

OSLO, May 28 (Reuters) - Vidkun Quisling, his eyes staring into nothing and his voice sibilant raved above a whisper, faced his first legal examination Saturday in the battle for his life.

He is not to be tried until Aug. 28, which gives the state three months in which to bring definite charges against him.

The judge told the court he decided to hold Quisling in custody until the trial for fear that Quisling if left at liberty might destroy the proof of his guilt.

At 12 noon the prisoner, flustered and heavy-lidded, was brought into the dock and the bespectacled judge Gunnar Gulbransen took his seat. Some 200 people sat in silence in the small court room as Quisling, speaking in a low voice told the judge "I am not guilty - not guilty. I have not committed any crime against Norway or the Norwegians."

Quisling, a man of 58, looked in good health. Both he and the judge and the lawyers observed all rules of politeness. Quisling's eyes looked so strange, staring into an apparent void.

He protested against being detained until his trial. "I fought five years for Norway's cause," he said. "It is shameful that I should be locked up."

Among the provisional charges brought against Quisling are his declaration of war against Russia, and giving information to the enemy.

Dominion Vote May Beat 1940 Record Figure

OTTAWA, May 29 (CP) - Interest of Canada's serene overseas in domestic issues and the platforms of political parties asking their support points to a heavy vote in the federal general election, June 11. The impact of war between the Allies and the Germans on the home front also has heightened interest in national affairs, leading to the expectation that the popular vote this year will reach the highest figure yet to be recorded.

In the 1940 federal election 4,620,280 voters exercised their franchise, compared with a poll of 3,826,000 in the 1930 election. Since the turn of the century, the number of voters has increased by 3,667,764, a 95 per cent increase in Canada's population and extension of the vote to women in 1921.

Such as increased foreign trade and domestic unemployment, have contributed to the development of an interest in government together with the provision of better facilities. In the early years of the century the growth in the population was slow.

In the 1904 elections, due mainly to interest in the transcontinental railway project - a factor also in the 1908 election campaign together with tariff problems - the vote rose to 1,030,186. The total of ballots cast rose again in 1908 to 1,783,856. There was a considerable increase in voting in 1911, due to interest in the burning question of reciprocity with the United States. In 1911 1,307,828 votes were cast.

1917 Election

Three factors in the war election of 1917 - the proposed union government, conscription and the women's franchise - resulted in the sharpest rise in the popular vote since that time. In 1917 the total vote was 1,883,222, including the ballots of some 250,000 soldiers.

The federal election of 1921 was notable in that Canadian women then exercised their vote for the first time. Their ballots swelled the popular vote to 3,119,306, compared with 883,222 in 1917. In the two succeeding elections there was little increase.

The coming of the depression years brought with it the vexatious problem of unemployment and focused attention upon Canada's domestic economy. The electorate's interest in these topics brought total votes cast in 1930 to 3,922,481 and in 1935 to the highest recorded prior to the 1940 election.

Churchill Gives Parly To Members Leaving Cabinet

LONDON, May 28 (Reuters) - In the cabinet room at 10 Downing Street which was especially decorated with four beautiful chandeliers of double-poles, Prime Minister Churchill tonight gave a party to the Labor and Liberal ministers leaving his coalition Government.

It was a gay gathering at which new members of the caretaker cabinet laughed and joked with their predecessors in office. Every one, particularly Mr. Churchill, seemed in the highest spirits.

Appropriately enough the renovators and decorators were busy members of the new government appeared. Leaning out of the first floor windows were men in white coats and behind them pots of paint could be seen against a spring cleaning background of dusk sheets.

This new effort to make everything spick and span seemed to harmonize with the politics of the occasion.

Tea and cocktails were provided at the party and most of the ex-cabinet members of the all party government - Clement Attlee, Ernest Bevin, Herbert Morrison and the rest - will be on the opposition benches in the Commons ready to fight the Government every inch of the way on all issues that will arise in the next 11 parliamentary days.

Urges Dominion Airport Program

WINNIPEG, May 29 (CP) - A Canadian airport construction program sponsored by the Dominion Government was urged here today by G. R. Patterson of Toronto, general manager of the Aeronautical Institute of Canada.

Addressing the mid-Canada air conference, he suggested that the Dominion Government should establish a fund of perhaps \$10,000,000 against which any community can draw on a basis of \$2 for every \$1 spent on airport construction.

Mr. Patterson said 400 Canadian communities would be put on the post-war aviation map through such a program. It would provide approximately 3,000,000 man-days labor in the preparation of landing facilities alone.

The tremendous investment in aviation training during the war should be salvaged for Canada's future benefit. Roughly 10 per cent of approximately 40,000 young Canadians hoped to find some form of employment in post-war aviation.

National and international services would provide jobs for more than 5,000 but development of feeder lines and small airport facilities would create thousands of jobs, Mr. Patterson said.
