MRS. ALEX. ACORN

When word came to Dundas and
the surrounding districts that Mrs.
Alex. Acorn of Primrose had died,
not only was it a shock to the
people but all were saddened by
it. Mrs. Acorn was in the Prince
Edward Island Hospital for a few
days under observation, where the
treatment seemed to benefit her.
From the hospital she was brought
to her daughter's home, Mrs. Har-
old Bulpitt, Roseneath. In three
or four days time she became seri-
ously ill and died on June 28th,
aged 71 years. Mrs. Acorn was the
former Katherine McKinnon of
Strathcona. On June 29th, 1905,
she became the wife of Alex. Acorn,
the officiating clergyman was the
late Rev. M. N. McLeod, a native
of Cape Breton. Mrs. Acorn mar-
ried a true Christian character.
She was a member of the Dundas
United Church, and of the W. M.
S. Her place in the sanctuary of
the Lord was seldom vacant even
at times when the weather was
not very pleasant. Mrs. Acorn
possessed a kind, pleasant dispo-
sition, she was loved by all. In the
home she was an ideal wife and
mother. She has left to mourn, be-
sides her husband, two daughters,
Christens, Mrs. Harold Bulpitt,

Roseneath, Florence, Mrs. Louis
Jenkins, Little Pond, two sons,
Donald A. and Elliott, both of Car-
digan. Mrs. Malcolm Bushan,
Seattle, Washington, and Mrs. John
Longawa, Saint Barba, California,
are sisters, and eight grand child-
ren. The funeral service was con-
ducted by her pastor, the Rev. M.
D. MacLeod, assisted by Mr. Saver
Christensen. At the request of the
family, Mr. Walker Burdett, sang,
"Will the Circle be Unbroken" and
Messrs. C. B. Clay, Walter Burdett,
and Herb McLeod sang, "Under
His Wings". The pall bearers were,
Albert Acorn, John J. Acorn, Dan-
iel McKinnon, Edward Bulpitt,
John Jenkins and Norman W. Mc-
Leod. The funeral was largely at-
tended, testifying to the esteem in
which she was held. The burial
was in charge of the McKinnon

1,286 Will Attend
Liberal Convention

OTTAWA, June 23 - (CP) - The
1,286 delegates to the August na-
tional convention of the Liberal
party will represent 10 fewer rid-
ings than actually exist.
Convention officials decided to
stick with the old parliamentary
divisions - 241 single-member con-
stituencies and two double consti-
tuencies - which elected 245 mem-
bers of parliament in 1945. Since
then redistribution has increased
the number of single-member rid-
ings to 251, with Halifax and
Queens (P. E. I.) still electing two
members each.

Selection of delegates will re-
quire a party convention in each
constituency, and some have al-
ready been held. The same machi-
nery will be used to select dele-
gates as is used in selecting party
candidates for an election.

Each single-member riding will
name three delegates and Halifax
and Queens six each. That will
provide 735 of the 1,286 persons
entitled to vote at the national
convention. The others will be:

Leaders of provincial Liberal parties	9
Leaders of national Liberal bodies	3
Presidents of provincial associ- ations	9
Three officers each from: Provincial Young Liberal As- sociations	27
Provincial Women's Liberal As- sociations	27
University Liberal Clubs	45
Members of Provincial legisla- tures and candidates	122

The successful and defeated Lib-
eral candidates in the last general
provincial election in each prov-
ince, select their own delegates to
the convention, one for every four
provincial constituencies.
