VANCOUVER, Dec. 20. — Glenn C. Hyatt, broker, of Vancouver, informed the Customs Commission to say that he had handed \$42,000 by Harry Reifel, sr., president of the British Columbia Breweries and Distilleries, for Liberal campaign funds. The money had been given to him in three cheques, which were transferred by him immediately to the Liberal party. The purpose of Mr. Reifel in turning the money over to him instead of giving it directly to the party was that the vouchers would not show that it had been paid for political purposes, said Mr. Hyatt.

North Wiltshire Telephone Meeting

The annual meeting of the North Wiltshire Telephone Company was held in the hall on Wednesday evening, Dec. 1st. Though the roads were almost impassable a large number of shareholders were present.

Mr. James G. McLeod president, was in the chair and spoke of the satisfactory condition of the line. Two experts, Messrs. Watson and Lorne Watson, had gone over the line lately and removed all obstacles interfering with the wires.

Then Secretary Treasurer, G. B. Noy read the minutes of the previous meeting which were adopted.

The principal speakers of the evening were Mr. Willie Clark and Mr. Edgar Easter. Both spoke along the same lines viz. that every one who was not a shareholder should become a shareholder in this province.

Mr. Easter also as a side line specialized in cobbler potatoes and is sometimes referred to as the potato king of Hampshire.

Mr. Clark acted as attorney on technical points, pointing out to the meeting that when any telephone company received a government grant of the public taxes that a shareholder could install a box any time he desired by notifying the Secretary Treasurer; also that a resident who was not a shareholder could become a shareholder upon his paying a share of the costs of a proportionate share of the costs of construction. By authority on law it was agreed to admit all who applied for boxes to the Secretary, the same privileges as present box holders. The next on the program was owing to the line being very heavily loaded all batteries would be kept up to standard.

Box holders are requested to keep their lines in good condition and in the busy farming season the phone must be used for business only and when using the phone users should never lose sight of the three minutes rule and always think of the other fellow waiting. Family gossip should be done at the fireside, not over the phone. The phone was constructed at a heavy cost to its shareholders for their convenience, not for one or two who may think they are the whole owners. It was then moved, seconded and carried, that one dollar per year be levied on all box holders for the running of the line without delay. The board of directors were re-elected as follows: James G. McLeod, President; H. G. Watts, Geo. Kilson, Robert Tremere, Wm. Clark, Walter Clark, G. B. Noy, Secretary Treasurer.

Packers bought a few at \$11.75 with thick smooths with \$2.00 bonus for selects.
