Violence Flares In Week-Old Lake Strike

DETROIT, Aug. 21 — (AP) — A. T. Wood, president of the Lake Carriers' Association, professed today to see a weakening of the National Maritime Union's (N.M.U.) week-old strike as the first major picket-line violence occurred in Duluth.

A score of men were injured in a sharp three-minute scuffle between 65 policemen and a group of N.M.U. pickets at the ore docks of the Duluth, Missabe and Iron Range railroad. The officers were armed but no shots were fired.

Seven other pickets were booked on disorderly charges as a result of the melee which broke out when police went to the assistance of a driver whose automobile was moving through the picket line.

It was the first disorder of consequence since the walkout began Aug. 15, although there have been sporadic clashes in Detroit, Cleveland, Chicago and Ashtabula, O.

Mr. Wood, whose association operates 316 vessels on the lakes, said strike gains made by the N.M.U. "have been completely offset by the increased rate at which Great Lakes seamen are remanning struck vessels."

While acknowledging one new walkout, Mr. Wood said five ships returned to service, thus reducing the association's total of strike-bound vessels from 46 to 42.

It was the first decrease in strike effectiveness claimed by the association since the walkout began in a demand by the N.M.U. for a short vacation week for its 2,500 fresh water seamen.

The union stood pat on its claim that 120 lakes' vessels are tied up. N.M.U. officials contend that any ships returning to service are "seriously undermanned" by young boys or an insufficient complement of officers.
