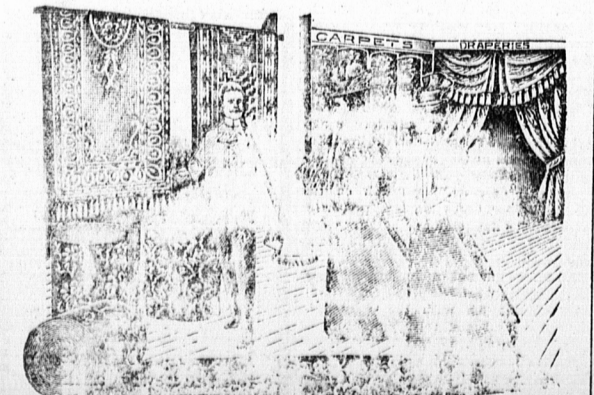

THE EMBROIDERED SHIRT-WAIST SUIT.

The shirt-waist suit takes to itself more and more elaboration as the season progresses. A very smart one in white mohair is embroidered in mountmelick embroidery that stands well out from the background, the work being done in the old porcelain blue shade of embroidery silk. There is a collar and chemisette in white tuckered mousseline de soie, this mounted upon a chiffon lining; and the shirt waist is embroidered around this opening on either side, the fastening being accomplished to one side of the chemisette opening. The sleeve is a very loose full puff to the elbow, where a fanciful cuff meets it, and mousseline ruffles make a finish over the hand. The skirt is arranged in pleated gores, the embroidery appearing to excellent advantage on the plain portion of the front and the two-side gores. The skirt is somewhat longer in the back than is usual with the shirt-waist costumes; but the sheerness of the mohair and the elaborate character of the embroidery are counted upon to make the gown as suited for afternoon as well as for morning wear.
