THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 23—Some further reductions in egg prices are reported today although in some quarters there is a feeling that the market has about reached the bottom for the time being. Toronto. A car of British Columbia eggs is offered on spot here today at extras 41 firsts 39, pullets extras 36 delivered. Sales of graded fresh eggs from Ontario country points are made at extras 40, firsts 35 pullet extras 32, seconds 17 delivered in free cases.

MONTREAL—Egg receipts here today were 1,410 cases as compared to 247 cases on the corresponding day last year. The market is unchanged in tone and price and there is a feeling here that values are about at the bottom for the present. Turkeys are selling well and are cleaning up rapidly.

ST. JOHN—Fresh egg prices continue to decline on this market with stocks accumulating. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 43 to 45, firsts 36 to 38, seconds 26 to 30 delivered cases returned. There is a good demand for poultry of all kinds with stocks moving freely and prices steady. Selected turkeys nine to twelve pounds are selling to retailers at 32 cents per pound.

HALIFAX—Receipts of local eggs have been light over the week end, but with demand only fair. Prices are unchanged. The poultry market is very active and while supplies have been heavy, there is a keen demand especially for turkeys, geese and ducks with higher prices looked for.

CHICAGO spot, 26 December 14 3-4 January 13 5-8.
MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 23—Retail prices of butter were higher. Carlot quotations on fresh eggs were mainly lower, while cheese and potatoes were unchanged on the produce and dairy market here today. The increase in butter prices to retailers announced yesterday went into effect today, solids being 33 cents and prints 34 cents a pound, both up one cent. Eastern townships number one pasteurized in carlots was quoted at 30-1-4 to 30-1-2 cents a pound. Receipts were 210 boxes.

British Columbia carlot prices of fresh eggs were lower, extras selling at 44 to 45 cents unchanged and firsts at 37 cents off three cents while pullets were down two cents at 33 to 35 cents a dozen carlot prices of Ontario fresh eggs were up slightly, extras being quoted at 42 cents unchanged, firsts at 35 cents off one cent and pullets up one cent at 33 cents a dozen. Receipts were 1,410 cases Ontario cheese was unchanged at 11 to 11-1-4 cents a pound and receipts were 268 boxes New Brunswick green mountain potatoes were unchanged, being quoted in carlots at eighty cents per ninety pounds bulk and to retailers 90 cents per eighty pound bag.

The President reported that the cause of line trouble was that a number of connections from the main line to residences were below standard. Some have been repaired but a

few box holders have neglected to attend to their house connections. Some boxes have been burnt out by electric storms caused by the electric fuse being removed, or never put in when box was installed. It is the duty of every box holder to keep the connections from the main line to his box in proper order. The \$2.00 assessment is to be used only for main line upkeep.
