Scout News and Notices

Twenty-one Wolf Cubs and nearly as many dogs attended the first spring hike of the 69th Winnipeg Club Pack.

The latest success of the Montreal Wolf Cub Pack and Scout Troop, of St. Christopher House, was the winning of the Mowat Trophy at the annual Quebec Musical Festival.

An 18 year old American Boy Scout who wants to be a missionary and a bookkeeper turned clergyman, are on a canoe preaching mission down the lower Mississippi river, for the benefit of steam-boat dwellers. They are cooking and camping out Scout style.

Contributions by the 180th Toronto Wolf Cub Pack and Scout Troop, of St. Christopher House, were a feature of a Parents' Night entertainment by boys representing twenty-six different nationalities. Music was supplied by St. Christopher House Boys' Harmonica Band.

A hiking Boy Scout patrol at Todeval Singh, Jaipur, India, saw a young calf fall into a pond full of crocodiles. The boys promptly rushed to the rescue. One Scout distracted the attention of the crocodiles by wildly waving a white cloth while the others pulled the calf from the water.

A new Boy Scout Reformation Camp for southwestern Ontario will be opened near the Forestry Station at St. Williams, Norfolk County, May 16. The project was launched by the Norfolk County Council and Chamber of Commerce. The Council will provide 90 acres of land for planting this year and will add some 30 additional acres each subsequent year. The Council also voted a grant of \$75 toward the incidental expenses of launching the camp and bringing the Boy Scouts Association in in the 100 selected boys for the opening camp. The enterprise, which duplicates highly successful Scout reformation work in other parts of the province, is the backing of

the provincial Department of Lands and Forests.

Each week Scouts of the 2nd Moose Jaw Troop gather the comic sections of the week-end papers and present them to the Children's Shelter.

The 1st Khargpur Boy Scout Troop have again done an eight-day hike in a rugged and climbing to a height of 8,300 feet.

A burlesque "International" football match, "The Allies" vs. "The Nazis" was organized by Boy Scouts of St. Lucia, B.W.I., in aid of the Red Cross Fund. We understand the Allies won, 4-0.

The Handbook of the Boy Scouts of America is said to be one of the four "best sellers" of all time. Since its first publication in 1910, more than 6,000,000 copies have been printed and bought by American Boy Scouts. Only the Bible exceeds its sale in the United States.

The Boy Scouts of Picton, N.S., have been presented with the historic flagpole from which the Royal Standard flew for the first time in Nova Scotia during the visit of the King and Queen in 1939. The donor, Mr. W.T. Ferguson, had the pole painted silver and the date and event recorded in Old English lettering. The flag-staff will be erected and a new Union Jack dedicated and broken out from the masthead on a suitable public occasion.

A province-wide camp cooking competition for Boy Scout patrols is being organized by the Canadian National Exhibition this year. The contest calls for the preparation of a meal for six boys, the menu to include broiled beefsteak, boiled potatoes, a fresh vegetable, stewed fruit and coffee. Preplaces may be built of logs or stones, and various camp kitchen gadgets used at Scout camps will be permitted. Scouts entering the contest will be admitted to the grounds free.

Governors Rule India Provinces

CALCUTTA, May 5 (CP) - Governors, assisted by advisers from the civil service continue to exercise administrative and legislative powers in the seven provinces of British India where Congress party ministers resigned last October in protest against failure of Great Britain to make a specific declaration of policy regarding Indian independence.

As they are expressly following the main outline of the previous ministries' programs, their proceedings have aroused little criticism in the Congress press. The provinces affected are Bihar, Orissa, the United Provinces, the Central Provinces, the North West Frontier Province, Madras and Bombay.

In Assam when the Congress Coalition government resigned it was found possible to form an alternative government and the ministry of Sir Mohammed Saadulla, supported by the Europeans, is firmly in the saddle. In Bengal and the Punjab there has been no attempt this year by the Congress opposition to move votes of non-confidence. This is taken as indication the governments of Sir Sikand-
