At the third Quarterly Official Board of the Granville Circuit held at Pleasant Valley on 29th of March a cordial and unanimous invitation was extended to Rev. Geo. Selzer to remain another year. The Board freely expressed their gratitude for and appreciation of the great work he had done among them. Mr. Selzer has accepted the invitation subject to Statutory Committee.

A VERY interesting and instructive missionary meeting was held in the basement of the First Methodist Church last evening. The speakers dealt with the missionary work in various countries as follows: E. T. Higgs took up home life in India; W. W. Welner, Indian mission in the Northwest; W. V. Newson Japan; Dr. Smallwood, Africa; H. H. Hamilton, China. Solos by Miss Nettie Ross and Mrs. McNair, and choruses by the choir were given between the addresses.

THE regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The teachers' report showed the enrolment for the past month to be 1195, an increase of 24 over the preceding month. The average attendance was 907, the percentage of attendance 88. There were 237 cases of tardiness, six cases of truancy and 30 cases of corporal punishment. Vernon Crockett was granted leave of absence until his health would permit him to resume work, and D. McKinnon was appointed his substitute.

THE marriage took place at the residence of A. S. Prowse, Sydney, on Tuesday of his daughter, Miss Lottie, and Mr. Aker, formerly of Eidershouse, but now of the firm of Aker Bros., Sydney Mines. The ceremony was performed by Rev. A. J. Vincent. The bride was assisted by Miss L. Pount, of Charlottetown. The groom's partner and brother, George Aker, was best man and the bride's sister, Miss Estlin, was flower girl. The groom's gift to the bride was a pearl dressing case and to the bridesmaid a necklace and locket. The presents from relatives and friends were numerous and costly and included a handsome upholstered couch for the groom's fellow boarder at the Coronation Hotel, of Sydney Mines.

This funeral of the late James Kenless leaves his residence Chestnut Street tomorrow (Wednesday) morning at a quarter to nine to the Cathedral, thence to the R. C. Cemetery.

The Lady Laurier is the pride of her officers and crew, and well may they be proud of her, for nothing better of her class sails the Canadian seas. Splendidly appointed in every way, of modern design and equipment, she is well adapted for the service. Just at present she is being got ready for a trip around the shore, and into the Bay of Fundy, looking after buoys and taking coal and other supplies to the light houses. On her return she will probably bring the crew of the wrecked steamer E. Holt from St. Paul's Island. Captain Johnson is commander of the Lady Laurier. Halifax Mail.

The church at York was crowded Sunday evening to hear the Rev. C. P. Cheek, of Ethiopia. His address, which was along the line of missionary effort in the dark continent and descriptive of the different tribes that still grope in the darkness of heathenism, was ably delivered and very much appreciated. Mr. Cheek, who is a graduate of Oxford, spent some time among the heathen tribes of Africa, endeavoring to overcome the superstition and prejudices of those simple people by the power of the Gospel. Ethiopia boasted an ancient civilization, indicating that of Egypt, Greece and Rome. Its population of 32,500,000, which is mostly Christian, neither intolerance nor polygamy is allowed. Before the meeting closed the speaker favored the audience with singing in his native tongue as well as in English.

The death took place at Pownal on Wednesday, the 23rd March, 1904, of Mary Grace McMillan, beloved wife of George E. Jenkins and daughter of the late Capt. Neil MacMillan, of Wood Islands aged 32 years. The funeral services which were held on Friday were conducted at the home by the Rev. J. O. Spurr, assisted by the Rev. Richard Opie, and at the grave by the Rev. A. S. Stewart of Wood Islands—where the interment took place. The large number of friends who gathered at both the house and the grave evidenced the esteem in which the deceased was held.
